CHAPTER ONE – DEMOGRAPHIC & RECREATION TRENDS ANALYSIS

1.1 INTRODUCTION

A key component of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan (“Plan”) is a Demographic & Recreation Trends Analysis. This provides the Town of Tiburon’s Parks and Recreation Department (“Town”) insight into the general makeup of the population served and identifies market trends in recreation. It also helps quantify the market in and around the Town and understand the types of parks, facilities, and programs / services that are most appropriate to satisfy the needs of residents.

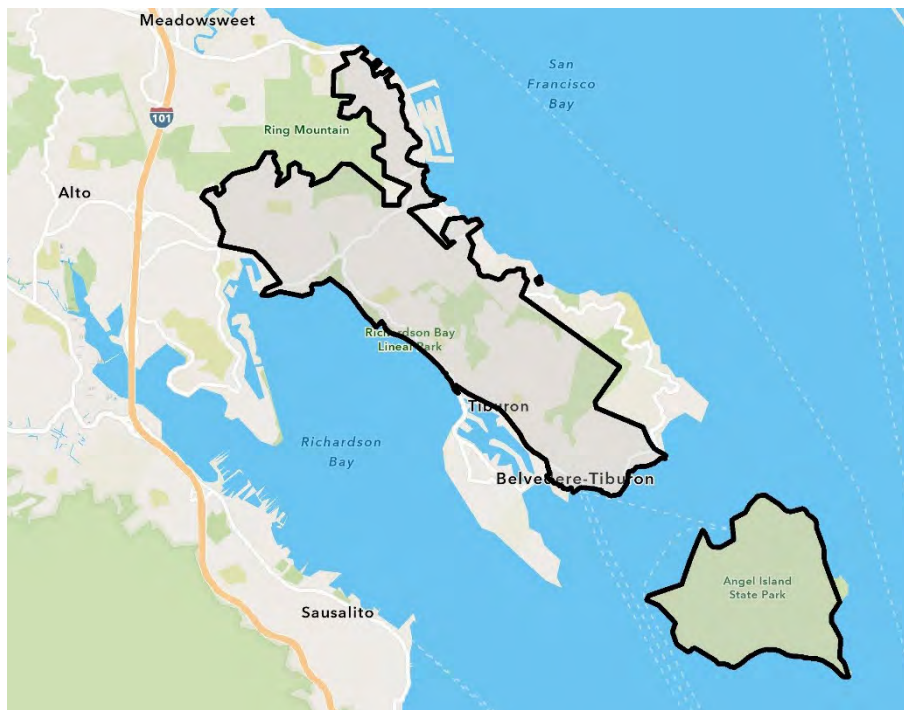
This analysis is two-fold – it aims to answer the *who* and the *what*. First, it assesses the demographic characteristics and population projections of Town residents to understand *who* they serve. Secondly, recreational trends are examined on a national, regional, and local level to understand *what* the population served wants to do. Findings from this analysis establish a fundamental understanding that provides a basis for prioritizing the community need for parks, trails, facilities, and recreation programs.

1.2 DEMOGRAPHIC ANALYSIS

The Demographic Analysis describes the population within the Town. This assessment is reflective of the Town’s total population and its key characteristics such as age segments, race, ethnicity, and income levels. It is important to note that future projections are based on historical patterns and unforeseen circumstances during or after the time of the analysis could have a significant bearing on the validity of the projected figures.

1.3 METHODOLOGY

Demographic data used for the analysis was obtained from U.S. Census Bureau and from Environmental Systems Research Institute, Inc. (ESRI), the largest research and development organization dedicated to Geographical Information Systems (GIS) and specializing in population projections and market trends. All data was acquired in October 2023 and reflects actual numbers as reported in the 2010 and 2020 Census. ESRI then estimates the current population (2023) as well as a 5-year projection (2028). PROS utilized straight line linear regression to forecast demographic characteristics for 2033 and 2038.

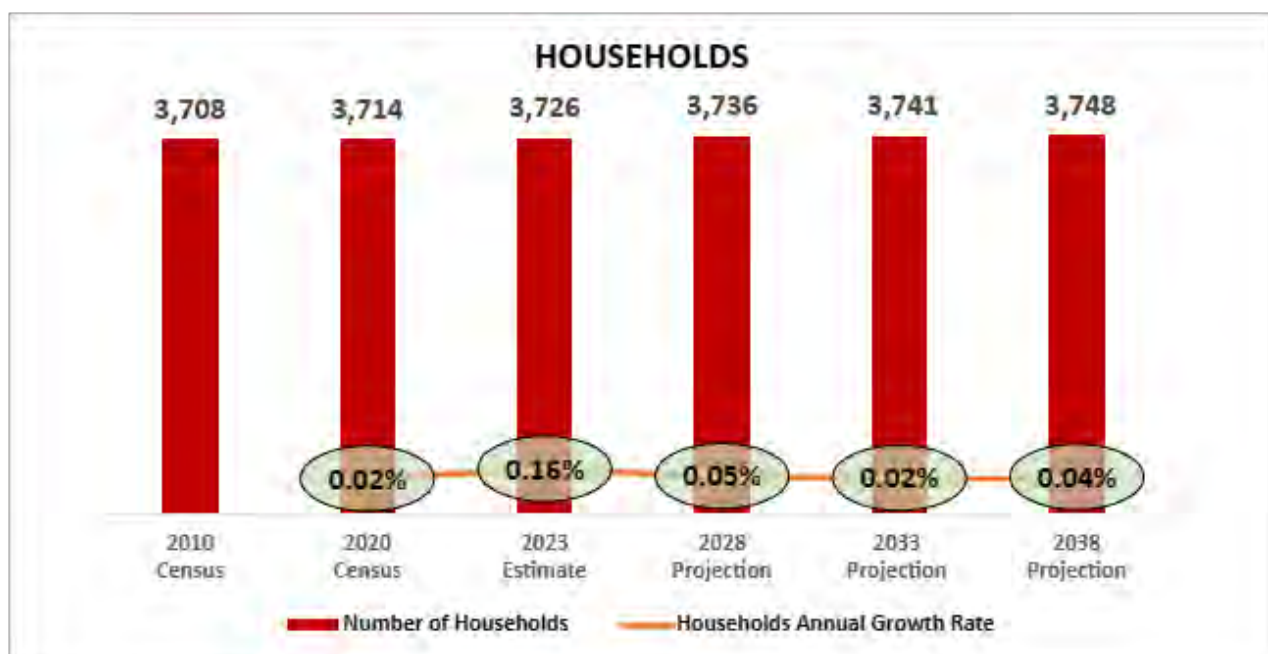
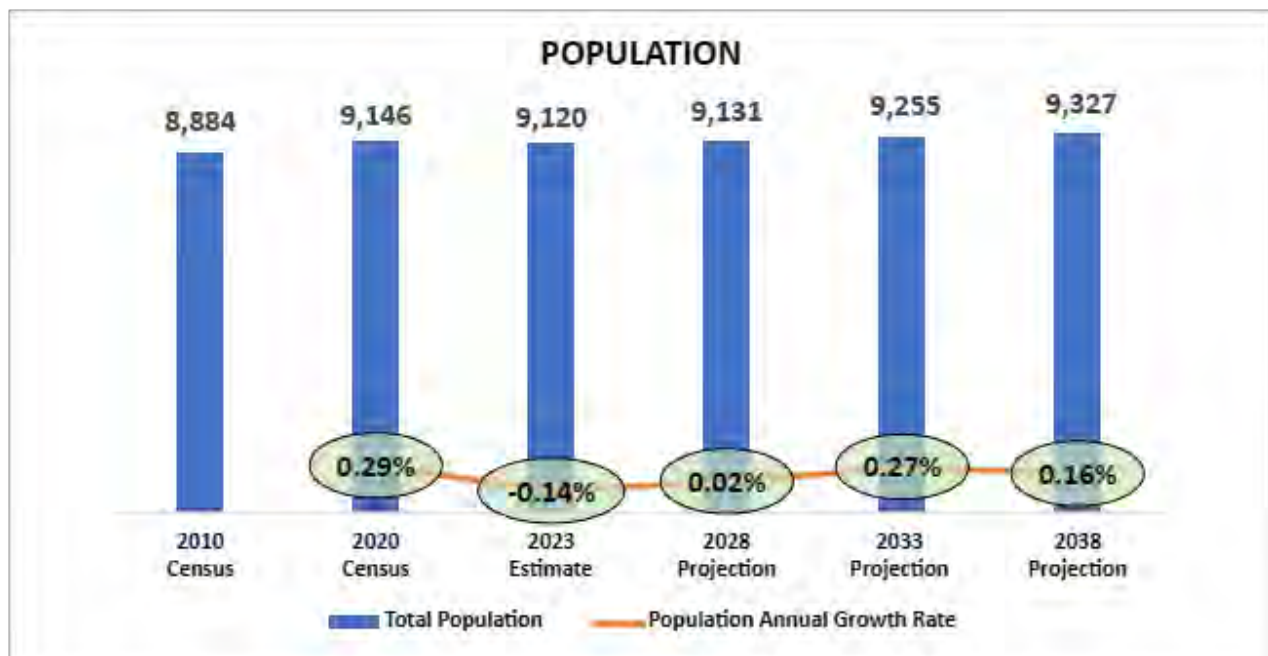


TOWN POPULACE

POPULATION

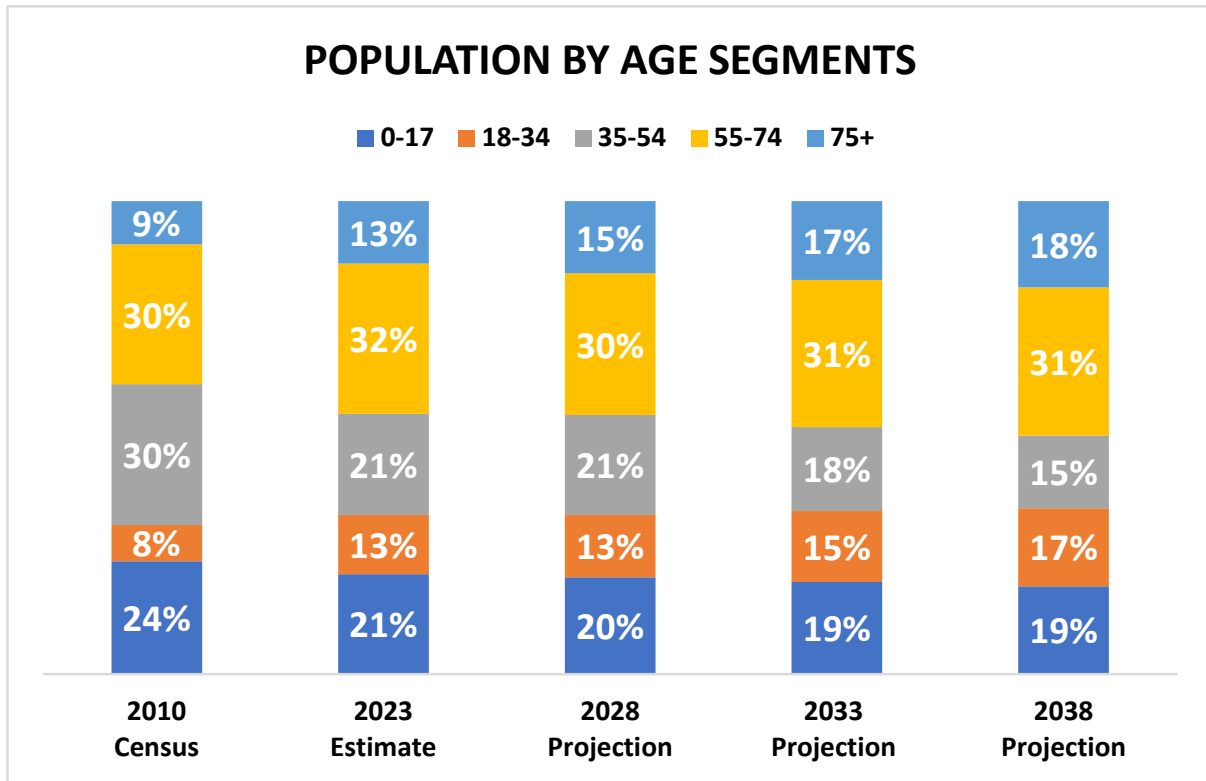
The Town's population has experienced a slight increase (2%) in the last 13 years, from 2010 to 2023. This is well below the national annual growth rate of 0.81% (from 2010-2023). Like the population, the total number of households also experienced a small increase, (1% over the 13 years; national average = 0.80% annual growth).

Currently, the population is estimated at 9,120 individuals living within 3,726 households. Projecting ahead over a 15-year period, we are anticipating a 2% growth, which is well below the national average. By 2038, the Town's population is projected at 9,327 residents living within 3,748 households.



AGE SEGMENT

Evaluating the Town's age segmentation, the population has become slightly older in the last 13 years. In 2010, the 55+ population made up 39% of the population, whereas today it makes up 45% of Tiburon's populace, an increase of 6%. The 2023 population has a median age of 48.3 years old which is much older than the U.S. median age of 38.5 years. The aging trend is projected to continue over the next 15 years as the 55+ age segment is expected to represent 49% of the total population (an increase of 4% over 2023) years as the 55+ age segment is expected to represent 31% of the total population.



RACE AND ETHNICITY DEFINITIONS

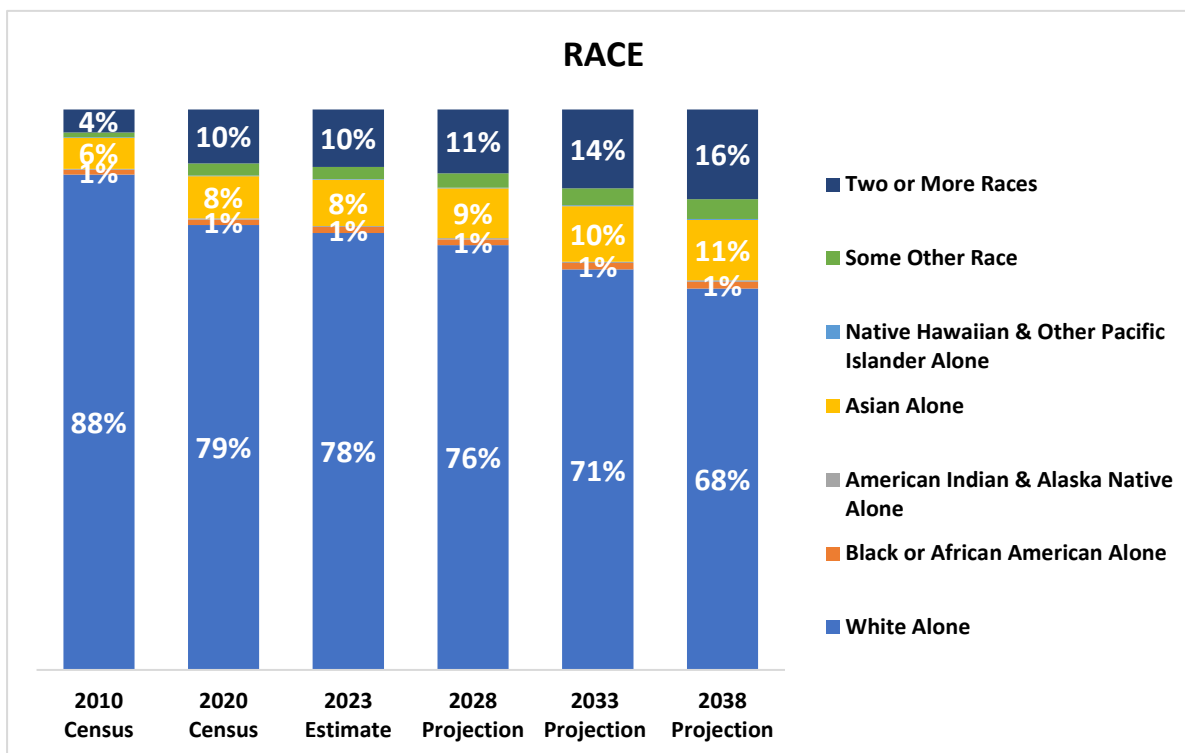
The minimum categories for data on race and ethnicity for Federal statistics, program administrative reporting, and civil rights compliance reporting are defined below. The Census 2020 data on race is directly comparable with data from the 2010 Census. The latest (Census 2020) definitions and nomenclature are used within this analysis.

- **American Indian** - This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America), and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment.
- **Asian** - This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of East Asia, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent including, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippine Islands, Thailand, and Vietnam.
- **Black Alone** - This includes a person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa.
- **Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander** - This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands.
- **White Alone** - This includes a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.
- **Hispanic or Latino** - This is an ethnic distinction, a subset of a race as defined by the Federal Government; this includes a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, South, or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.

Please Note: The Census Bureau defines Race as a person's self-identification with one or more of the following social groups: White, Black, or African American, Asian, American Indian, and Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, some other race, or a combination of these, while Ethnicity is defined as whether a person is of Hispanic / Latino origin or not. For this reason, the Hispanic / Latino ethnicity is viewed separate from race throughout this demographic analysis.

RACE

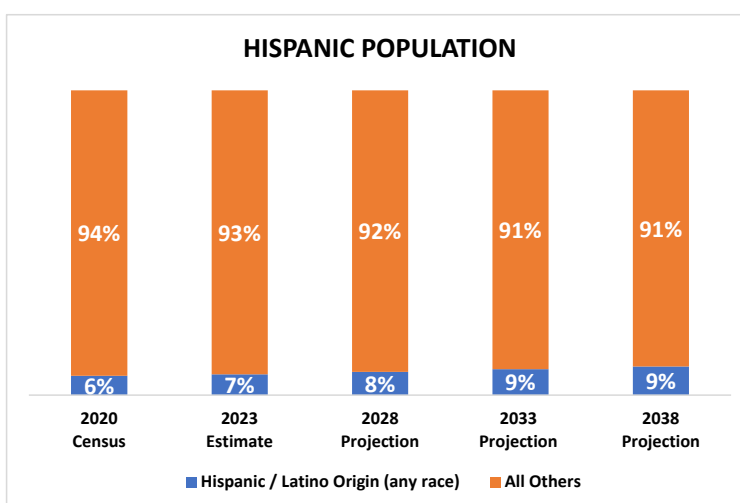
Assessing race, the Town's current population has diversified over the last 13 years as the White Alone population has decreased by 10%. Though still the largest racial segmentation in the Town, the White Alone population represents 78% and the largest minority is Two or More Races (10%), a 6% increase over 2010. The predictions for 2038 expect the population to become more diverse, with the Two or More Races population increasing by 6% while the White Alone population will decrease by 9%.



ETHNICITY

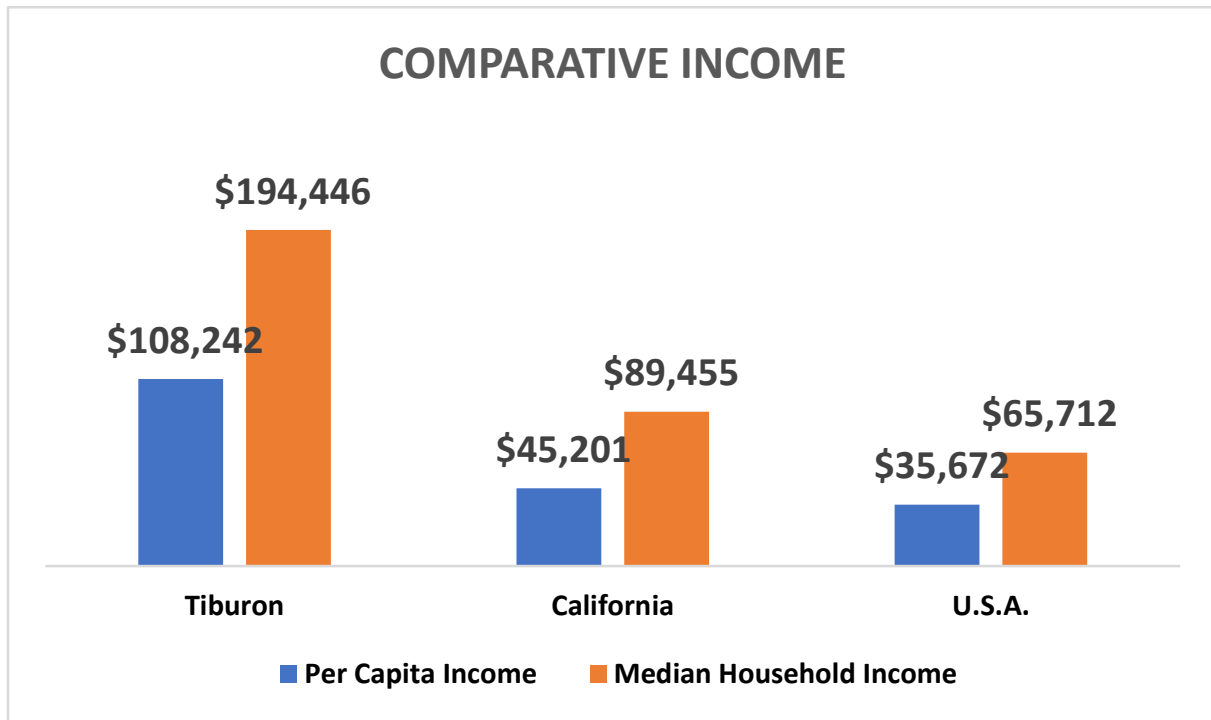
The Town's population was also assessed based on Hispanic/Latino ethnicity, which by the Census Bureau definition is viewed independently from race. It is important to note that individuals who are Hispanic/Latino in ethnicity can also identify with any racial categories identified above.

People of Hispanic/Latino origin has increased by 2% over the last 13 years and currently represents approximately 7% of the Town's population, which is below the national average (19% Hispanic/Latino). The Hispanic/ Latino population is expected to slightly grow to 9% of the Town's total population by 2038.



HOUSEHOLD INCOME

As seen below, the Town's per capita income (\$108,242) and median household income (\$194,446) are both higher than the U.S. averages as well as the averages of the State of California. The per capita income is that earned by an individual while the median household income is based on the total income of everyone over the age of sixteen living under the same roof. Though these above average income characteristics indicate that the average household may have more disposable income, residents are still likely to be price conscious and have a need to understand the value that correlates with quality-of-life indicators.



TIBURON DEMOGRAPHIC IMPLICATIONS

The following implications are derived from the analyses provided above. Each implication is organized by the outlined demographic information sections.

POPULATION

The population is projected to remain the same and is projected to experience a population increase of only 2% over the next 15 years. This is well below the national average over the same time. With a consistent population, park and recreation services will need to strategically reinvest and maintain existing parks and recreation facilities.

AGE SEGMENTATION

Tiburon currently has an unbalanced age segmentation with the largest group being 55+ (45%). Over the next 15 years, the Town is projected to become even older as the 55+ segment will make up 49% of the population in 2038.

RACE AND ETHNICITY

A diversifying community will focus the Town on providing traditional and emerging programming and service offerings.

HOUSEHOLDS AND INCOME

With median and per capita household income averages above that of MSA and national averages, it would be important for the Town to prioritize providing offerings that are first class with exceptional customer service while seeking opportunities to create revenue generation.

1.4 NATIONAL RECREATION TRENDS ANALYSIS

The Trends Analysis provides an understanding of national, regional, and local recreational trends as well recreational interest by age segments. Trends data used for this analysis was obtained from Sports & Fitness Industry Association's (SFIA), National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), and Environmental Systems Research Institute, Inc. (ESRI). All trend data is based on current and/or historical participation rates, statistically valid survey results, or NRPA Park Metrics.

NATIONAL TRENDS IN RECREATION

METHODOLOGY

The Sports & Fitness Industry Association's (SFIA) *Sports, Fitness & Leisure Activities Topline Participation Report 2023* was utilized in evaluating the following trends:

- National Recreation Participatory Trends
- Core vs. Casual Participation Trends

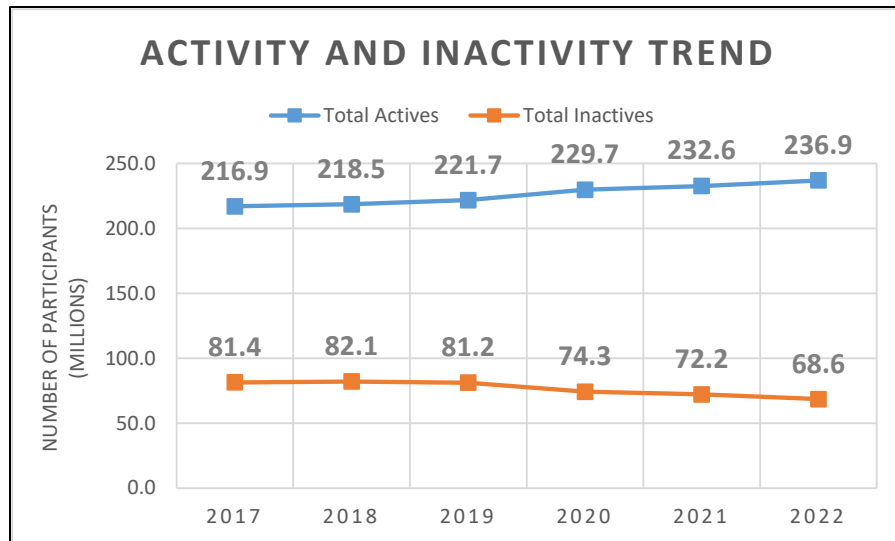


The study is based on findings from surveys conducted in 2023 by the Sports Marketing Surveys USA (SMS), resulting in a total of 18,000 online interviews. Surveys were administered to all genders, ages, income levels, regions, and ethnicities to allow for statistical accuracy of the national population. A sample size of 18,000 completed interviews is considered by SFIA to result in a high degree of statistical accuracy. A sport with a participation rate of five percent has a confidence interval of plus or minus 0.32 percentage points at a 95 percent confidence level. Using a weighting technique, survey results are applied to the total U.S. population figure of 305,439,858 people (ages six and older).

The purpose of the report is to establish levels of activity and identify key participatory trends in recreation across the U.S. This study looked at 120 different sports/activities and subdivided them into various categories including, but not limited to, sports, fitness, outdoor activities, and aquatics.

OVERALL PARTICIPATION

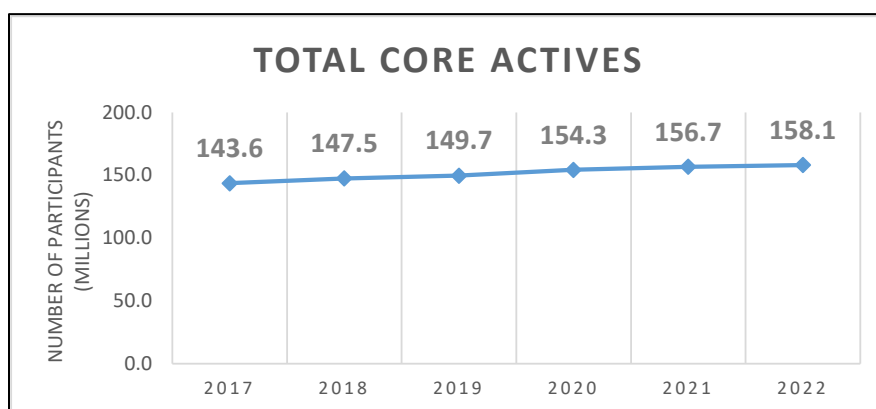
Approximately 236.9 million people ages six and over reported being active in 2023, which is a 1.9% increase from 2021 and the greatest number of active Americans in the last 6 years. This is an indicator that Americans are continuing to make physical activity more of a priority in their lives. Outdoor activities continue to thrive, recreation facilities reopened, fitness at home maintains popularity, and team sports are slowly reaching pre-pandemic participation levels. The chart below depicts participation levels for active and inactive (those who engage in no physical activity) Americans over the past 6 years.



CORE VS. CASUAL PARTICIPATION

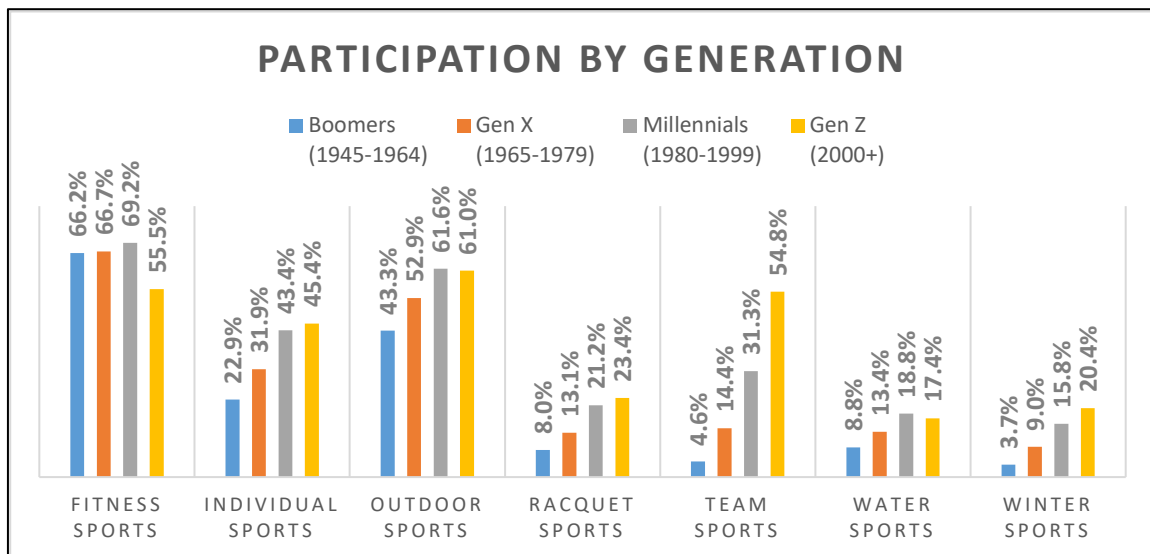
In addition to overall participation rates, SFIA further categorizes active participants as either core or casual participants based on frequency of participation. Core participants have higher participatory frequency than casual participants. The thresholds that define casual versus core participation may vary based on the nature of each individual activity. For instance, core participants engage in most fitness activities more than fifty times per year, while for sports, the threshold for core participation is typically thirteen times per year.

In each activity, core participants are more committed and tend to be less likely to switch to other activities or become inactive (engage in no physical activity) than casual participants. This may also explain why activities with more core participants tend to experience less pattern shifts in participation rates than those with larger groups of casual participants. Increasing for the fifth straight year, 158.1 million people were considered CORE participants in 2023.



PARTICIPATION BY GENERATION

The following chart shows 2023 participation rates by generation. Fitness sports continue to be the go-to means of exercise for Boomers, Gen X, and Millennials. Over half of the Gen X, Millennials, and Gen Z generation participated in one type of outdoor activity. Team sports were heavily dominated by generation Gen Z and a third of Gen X also participated in individual sports such as golf, trail running, triathlons, and bowling.



HIGHLIGHTS

Team sports are continuing to recover due to shutdowns during the pandemic. Team sports participation rate increased to 23.2% which is near 2019 participation levels. Pickleball continues to be the fastest growing sport in America by doubling its participation in 2023. Following the popularity of pickleball, every racquet sport also increased in total participation in 2023.

Americans continued to practice yoga, attend Pilates training, and workout with kettlebells. Many started indoor climbing, while others took to the hiking trail. The waterways traffic had an increase of stand-up paddlers, kayaks, and jet skis. Gymnastics, swimming on a team, court volleyball, and fast-pitch softball benefited from the participation boom created from the Olympics.

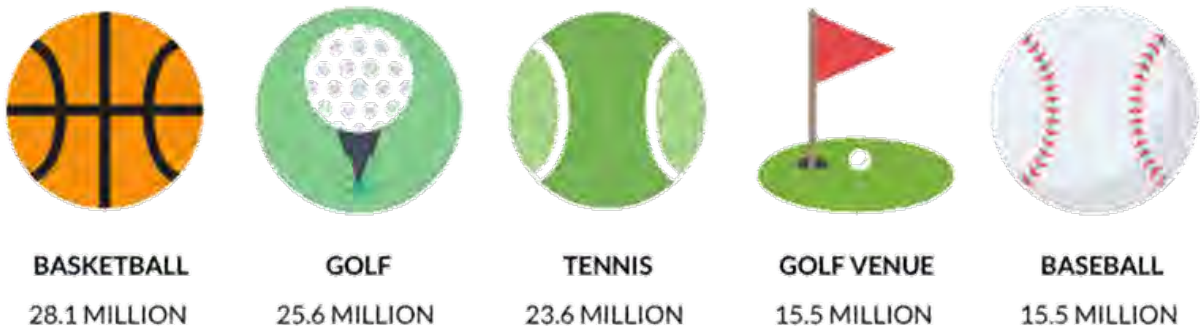
Water sports had the largest gain in participation rates. Activities such as jet skiing, scuba diving, and boardsailing/windsurfing all contributed to the 7% increase. Outdoor sports continued to grow with 55% percent of the U.S. population participating. This rate remains higher than pre-pandemic levels with a 51% participation rate in 2019. The largest contributor to this gain was trail running, having a 45% increase over the last five years.

NATIONAL TRENDS IN GENERAL SPORTS

PARTICIPATION LEVELS

The top sports most heavily participated in the United States were basketball (28.1 million), golf (25.6 million), and tennis (23.6 million) which have participation figures well more than the other activities within the general sports category. Baseball (15.5 million), and outdoor soccer (13.0 million) round out the top five.

The popularity of basketball, golf, and tennis can be attributed to the ability to compete with small number of participants, this coupled with an ability to be played outdoors and/or properly distanced helps explain their popularity during the COVID-19 pandemic. Basketball's overall success can also be attributed to the limited amount of equipment needed to participate and the limited space requirements necessary, which make basketball the only traditional sport that can be played at most American dwellings as a drive-way pickup game. Golf continues to benefit from its wide age segment appeal and is considered a life-long sport. In addition, target type game venues or golf entertainment venues have increased drastically (86.2%) as a 5-year trend, using golf entertainment (e.g., Top Golf) as a new alternative to breathe life back into the game of golf.



FIVE-YEAR TREND

Since 2017, pickleball (185.7%), golf - entertainment venues (86.2%), and tennis (33.4%) have shown the largest increase in participation. Similarly, basketball (20.3%) and outdoor soccer (9.2%) have also experienced significant growth. Based on the five-year trend from 2017-2023, the sports that are most rapidly declining in participation include ultimate frisbee (-31.5%), rugby (-28.1%), and roller hockey (-25.4%).

ONE-YEAR TREND

The most recent year shares some similarities with the five-year trends; with pickleball (85.7%) and golf - entertainment venues (25.7%) experiencing some of the greatest increases in participation this past year. Other top one-year increases include racquetball (8.0%), badminton (7.1%), and gymnastics.

Sports that have seen moderate 1-year increases, but 5-year decreases are racquetball (8.0%), gymnastics (7.1%), and court volleyball (4.2%). This could be a result of coming out of the COVID-19 pandemic and team program participation on the rise. Like their 5-year trend, rugby (-5.8%), roller hockey (-4.0%), and ultimate frisbee (-2.2%) have seen decreases in participation over the last year.

NATIONAL TRENDS IN GENERAL FITNESS

PARTICIPATION LEVELS

Overall, national participatory trends in fitness have experienced growth in recent years. Many of these activities have become popular due to an increased interest among Americans to improve their health and enhance quality of life by engaging in an active lifestyle. The most popular general fitness activities in 2023 also were those that could be done at home or in a virtual class environment. The activities with the most participation was walking for fitness (114.8 million), treadmill (53.6 million), free weights (53.1 million), running/jogging (47.8 million), and yoga (33.6 million).



FIVE-YEAR TREND

Over the last five years (2017-2023), the activities growing at the highest rate were trail running (44.9%), yoga (23.0%), Pilates training (14.0%) and dance, step & choreographed exercise. Over the same period, the activities that have undergone the biggest decline in participation include group stationary cycling (-33.4%), cross-training style workout (-32.1%) and non-traditional/off road triathlons (-28.1%).

ONE-YEAR TREND

In the last year, fitness activities with the largest gains in participation were group-related activities, cardio kickboxing (8.5%), Pilates training (5.8%), and group stationary cycling (5.5%). This 1-year trend is another indicator that participants feel safe returning to group-related activities. Trail running (5.9%) also saw a moderate increase indicating trail connectivity to continue to be important for communities to provide. In the same span, fitness activities that had the largest decline in participation were cross-training style workout (-5.3%), bodyweight exercise (-2.6%) and running/jogging (-2.4%).

1.2.5 NATIONAL TRENDS IN OUTDOOR/ADVENTURE RECREATION

PARTICIPATION LEVELS

Results from the SFIA report demonstrate rapid growth in participation regarding outdoor/adventure recreation activities. Much like general fitness activities, these activities encourage an active lifestyle, can be performed individually, and are not as limited by time constraints. In 2023, the most popular activities, in terms of total participants include day hiking (59.5 million), road bicycling (43.6 million), freshwater fishing (41.8 million), camping (37.4 million), and wildlife viewing (20.6 million).

FIVE-YEAR TREND

From 2017-2023, sport/bouldering (174.8%), camping (42.5%), skateboarding (41.3%), day hiking (32.7%), birdwatching (28.6%) has undergone large increases in participation. The five-year trend also shows activities such as indoor climbing (-51.4%), adventure racing (-32.2%) to be the only activities with double-digit decreases in participation.

ONE-YEAR TREND

The one-year trend shows most activities growing in participation from the previous year. The most rapid growth being in sport/boulder climbing (151.1%), BMX bicycling (8.3%), birdwatching (6.8%), and in-line roller skating (4.7%). Over the last year, the only activities that underwent decreases in participation were indoor climbing (-56.9%), adventure racing (-6.1%), and overnight backpacking (-0.9%). 1.2.6 NATIONAL TRENDS IN AQUATICS

PARTICIPATION LEVELS

Swimming is deemed a lifetime activity, which is why it continues to have such strong participation. In 2023, fitness swimming remained the overall leader in participation (26.3 million) amongst aquatic activities.



FIVE-YEAR TREND

Assessing the five-year trend, fitness swimming (-3.2%) and swimming on a team (-3.4%) experienced moderate decreases due to the accessibility of facilities during COVID-19. While aquatic exercise (2.1%) saw a slight increase in participation during this same time.

ONE-YEAR TREND

In 2023, all aquatic activities saw moderate increases in participation which can be asserted to facilities and programs returning to pre-COVID-19 pandemic levels. Swimming on a team (2.8%), aquatic exercise (2.7%) and fitness swimming (2.5%) saw moderate increases in participation.

1.2.7 NATIONAL TRENDS IN WATER SPORTS / ACTIVITIES

PARTICIPATION LEVEL

The most popular water sports / activities based on total participants in 2023 were recreational kayaking (13.6 million), canoeing (9.5 million), and snorkeling (7.4 million). It should be noted that water activity participation tends to vary based on regional, seasonal, and environmental factors. A region with more water access and a warmer climate is more likely to have a higher participation rate in water activities than a region that has a long winter season or limited water access. Therefore, when assessing trends in water sports and activities, it is important to understand that fluctuations may be the result of environmental barriers which can influence water activity participation.



FIVE-YEAR TREND

Over the last five years, surfing (37.8%), recreational kayaking (28.7%), stand-up paddling (13.6%) and white-water kayaking (9.0%) were the fastest growing water activities. From 2017-2023, activities declining in participation were water skiing (-14.9%), snorkeling (-12.0%), boardsailing/windsurfing (-11.6%), and sea/touring kayaking (10.6%).

ONE-YEAR TREND

In 2023, water skiing (-0.6%) was the only water activity to see a decrease in participation. Activities which experienced the largest increases in participation in the most recent year include jet skiing (7.6%), scuba diving (7.4%), boardsailing/windsurfing (7.2%), and surfing (6.6%).

1.5 NON-PARTICIPANT INTEREST BY AGE SEGMENT

In addition to participation rates by generation, SFIA also tracks non-participant interest. These are activities that the U.S. population currently does not participate in due to physical or monetary barriers, but is interested in participating in. Below are the top five activities that each age segment would be most likely to partake in if they were readily available.

Overall, the activities most age segments are interested in including Camping, Bicycling, Fishing, and Swimming for Fitness. All of which are deemed as low-impact activities, making them obtainable for any age segment to enjoy.



1.6 RECREATION TRENDS FOR THE SENIOR POPULATION (55+)

Today, Tiburon is diverse with greater and contrasting needs and desires. The Parks and Recreation Department has evolved to ensure that all members of the community are able to benefit from their vast holdings of open space, recreation facilities and service offerings. One area of growing interest is serving the expanding population of older adults.

As mentioned previously, 31% of the population in Tiburon will be 55+ by 2038.

The findings in a research report produced by NRPA affirms that parks and recreation is a vital service provider to older adults, and yet there remains significant opportunity to do much more. Some of the key findings in the report indicate that more than nine in ten park and recreation agencies report that they offer facilities, activities and programming that cater to older adults. These activities vary, including providing older adults with chances to socialize with others, ways to stay healthy and active, and opportunities to serve others in their communities. Following is a list of activities that are among those most often geared to older adults:

- Exercise classes
- Field trips, tours, vacations
- Arts and crafts classes
- Opportunities to volunteer
- Special events and festivals targeted at older adults.
- Group walks
- Paid job opportunities to lead exercise classes, work in recreation centers or at parks.

As noted above, the list of activities varies from active to passive and everywhere in-between.

Where Tiburon can make a real, lasting difference is in providing evidence-based chronic disease prevention and/or management programs that keep older adults healthy and active for years to come. The trend to accomplish this is for the Department to offer these types of programs for older adults in Tiburon, including those focused on enhanced fitness, diabetes management, living with arthritis and improving balance.

The wide breadth of service offerings for older adults should reflect the broad population served. This includes The Woodlands following a wide definition of “older adults” when designing and marketing offerings — in many cases starting with adults as young as 55 years old.

Furthermore, Tiburon may be unique in ensuring that the needs of underserved older adults are met. The Department can be a critical, lifesaving resource for lower and/or fixed income segments of the older adult population. This can include transportation to and from activities and facilities and low-cost or free fitness programs.

Tiburon could consider developing programming for older adults with key partners. To best serve this population, partnerships can include, but not limited to:

- Area agencies on aging
- Retirement communities
- Senior meals providers

- Hospitals and doctors' offices
- Local health departments
- Health insurance companies
- Community-based organizations (e.g., faith-based)

But even with these partners, Tiburon will have hurdles that must be overcome before providing more services to older adults. The most common challenges are the result of inadequate resources, including facility space shortages, insufficient funding, and inadequate staffing. These resource constraints will become even more acute as the older adult population grows and the demand for these services increases.

1.7 LOCAL TRENDS – GENERAL SPORTS MARKET POTENTIAL

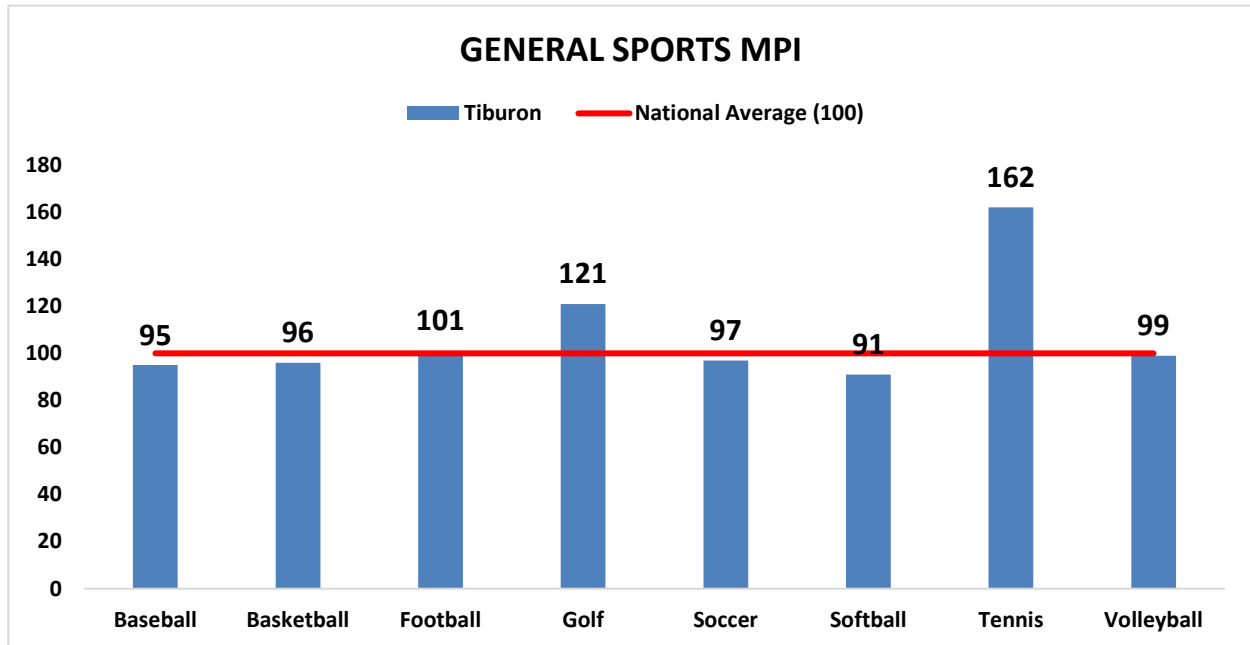
ESRI's 2023 Sports and Leisure Market Potential Data measures the demand for recreation activities as well as expected consumer attitudes towards these activities by Town of Tiburon residents. The MPI shows the likelihood that a resident of the Town of Tiburon will participate in certain activities when compared to the US National average. The Town is compared to the national average in three (3) categories – general sports, fitness, and outdoor recreation. PLEASE NOTE: The participation by Tiburon residents in these activities is not restricted geographically to the Town of Tiburon. For example, a Tiburon resident may participate in an activity offered by the City of Mill Valley.

Overall, Tiburon demonstrates below to above average market potential index numbers. Looking at the three categories (general sports, fitness, and outdoor activity), Tiburon's MPI percentages show that Tiburon has strong participation rates when it comes to fitness and outdoor recreation activities; general sports (except for tennis and golf) are mostly below the national averages.

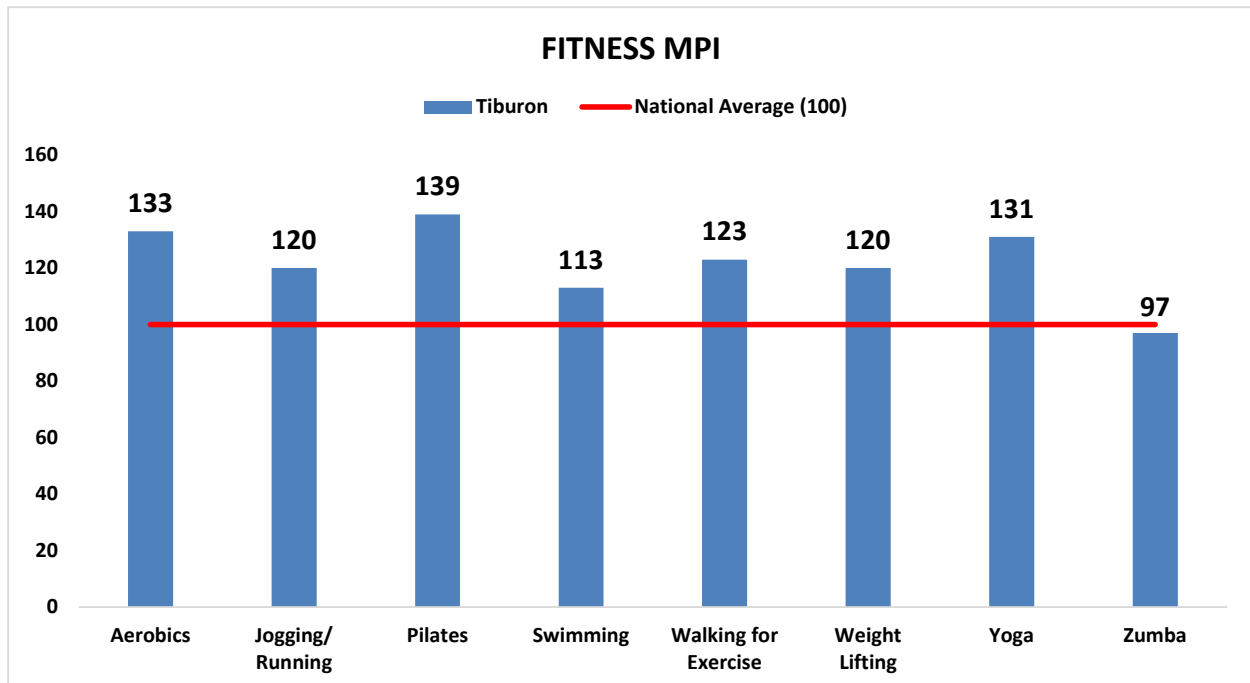
Activities with MPI numbers greater than the national average are significant because they demonstrate that there is a greater potential that Tiburon residents will actively participate in offerings if the Town or surrounding communities provided these activities. Activities with MPI numbers lower than the national average are also significant because they demonstrate that there is either a lower potential that Tiburon residents will participate in these activities or the opportunity to participate in these activities is not available to them.

This data should be interfaced with other key findings derived during the master planning process to determine an appropriate level of service for park acreage and amenities for the Town of Tiburon. Other key factors that determine level of service include, but are not limited to demographic projections, resident need as determined by the community engagement process, current level of service (existing park and amenity inventory), and access to existing parks and amenities.

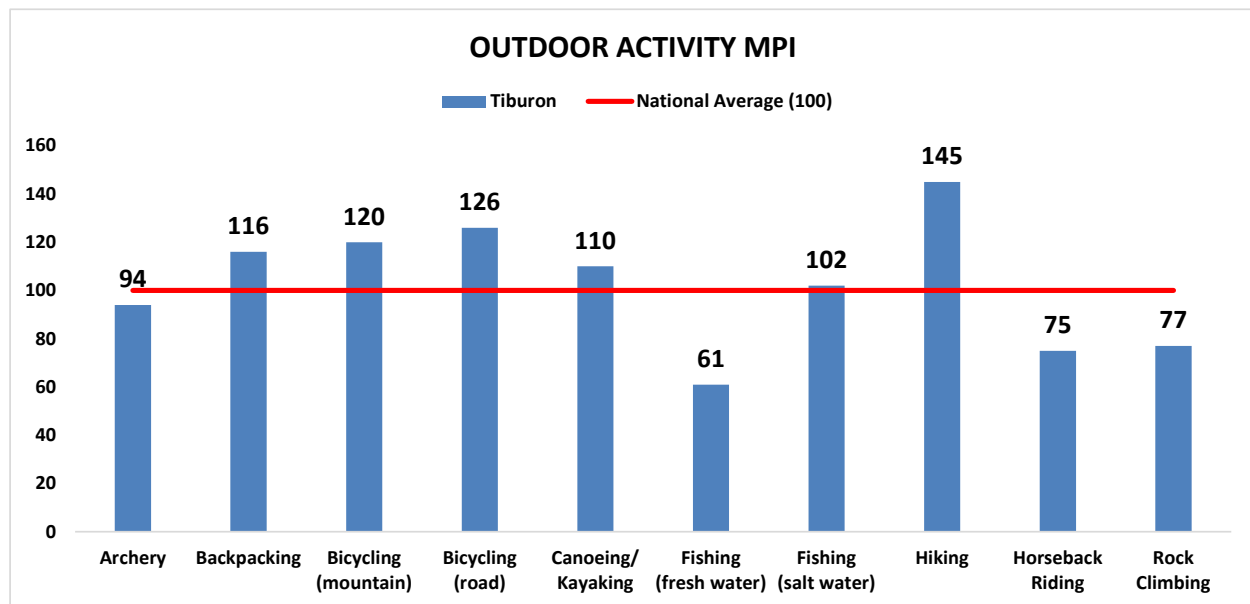
2023 GENERAL SPORTS MARKET POTENTIAL INDEX

1.8 RECREATION TRENDS SUMMARY

It is critically important for Tiburon Parks and Recreation to understand the local and national participation trends in recreation activities. In doing so, the Department can gain general insight into the lifecycle stage of recreation programs and activities (emerging, stable, and declining) and thereby anticipate potential changes in need and demand for the programs and activities that it provides to the residents of Tiburon. Here are some major takeaways for local and national recreation trends:

- Hiking remained the most popular outdoor activity OVERALL nationally and locally. This activity will continue to grow in popularity in Tiburon.
- All listed aquatic activities have experienced strong participation, both locally and nationally. Competitive swimming saw significant increases in casual participation.
- Basketball is the most participated in sport nationally while tennis is the most participated in sport locally.
- Tackle football has gained participants nationally over the last five years, but MPI numbers are slightly above the national average.
- Fast-pitch and slow-pitch softball saw slight increases in participation nationally over the last year, however, participation locally is below average.
 - PLEASE NOTE: Individual MPI numbers are not available for fast-pitch and slow-pitch softball.
- Outdoor recreational activities are on the rise nationally and many of these activities are popular locally, including hiking, biking, and backpacking.
- Based on national measurements, income level has a positive impact on activity rate. Higher income households tend to have higher activity rates.

WRT, as a member of the PROS Team, conducted citywide mapping to reveal patterns and inform policy direction for the Tiburon Parks and Recreation Master Plan update. This memorandum summarizes the findings and presents a sequence of maps. Maps are based on data about the park system provided by the City of Tiburon and demographic data from the US Census. Maps cover the following topics: parks and open spaces (by type); distribution of recreation amenities; access to parks; trail system and bike network; land cover; sensitive natural communities and wetlands; fire threat; flood hazards and projected sea level rise (City of Tiburon); flood hazards and projected sea level rise (Richardson Bay subarea); flood hazards and projected sea level rise (downtown subarea). Highlights are summarized below, followed by corresponding maps.

Parks & Open Spaces (by type)

Tiburon's parks are classified in 4 categories:

1. Community Parks (Town of Tiburon)
2. Recreation Centers (Belvedere-Tiburon joint Recreation Committee)
3. Regional Parks (Marin County)
4. State Parks (California)

The nine (9) community parks are maintained and operated by the Town of Tiburon and are all located on the southwest side of the peninsula adjacent to Richardson Bay. The two (2) recreation centers are also located in the southwest portion of the town, closer to Downtown. Within the sphere of influence are two (2) regional parks operated by Marin County Parks, on the northeast side of the peninsula. Finally, Tiburon has one (1) state park, Angel Island, which is the largest natural island in the San Francisco Bay.

Tiburon's open space is classified in 3 categories:

1. Public Open Space (Town Fee or Easement)
2. Public Open Space (Marin County OSD)
3. Private Open Space



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There are several public open spaces ranging from XX acres to XX acres scattered throughout the ridgeline that are operated and maintained by town fee or easement, including Middle Ridge Open Space and Pt. Tiburon Marsh Open Space that are located in the midst of the Town. There are also two (2) public open spaces operated and maintained by Marin County OSD, Old Saint Hilary's Open Space and Ring Mountain Open Space. In addition to the publicly accessible open spaces, there are several privately owned and operated open spaces throughout the peninsula ranging in size.

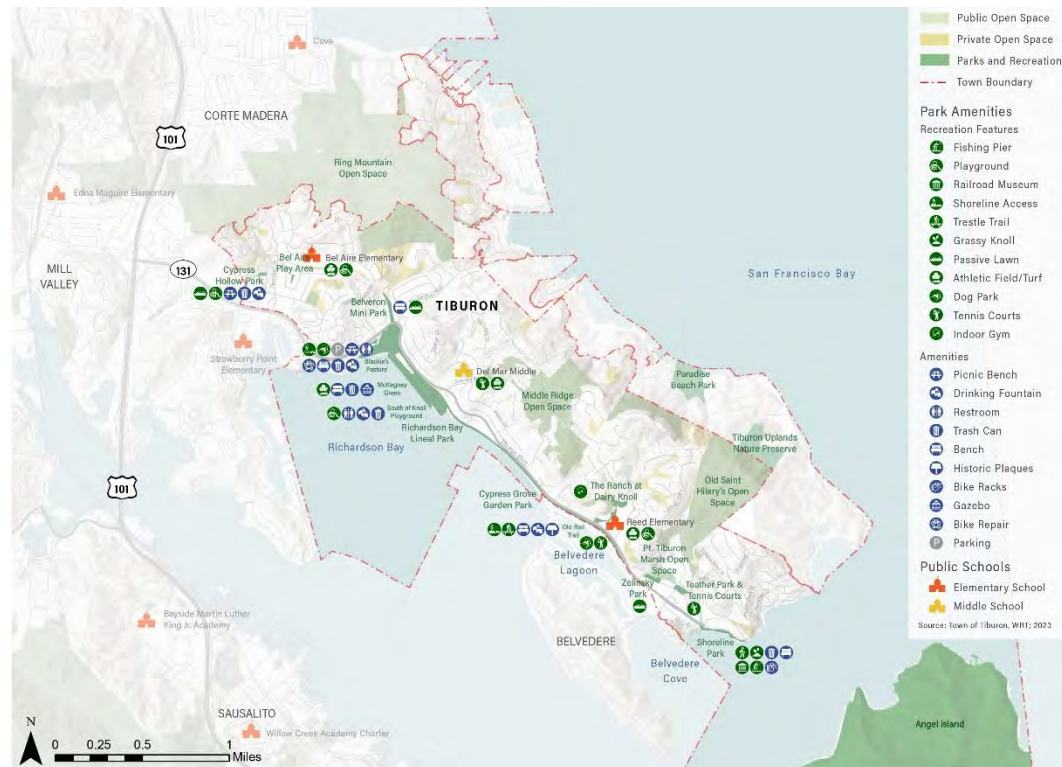


The map above shows the distribution of the Town of Tiburon's parks and open space system. Notably, the parks are not evenly distributed with most of the community parks and recreation centers concentrated along Richardson Bay and regional parks located on the north side of the peninsula. This leaves the center of the peninsula with open spaces (public and private) to serve the residents.



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Distribution of Recreation Amenities



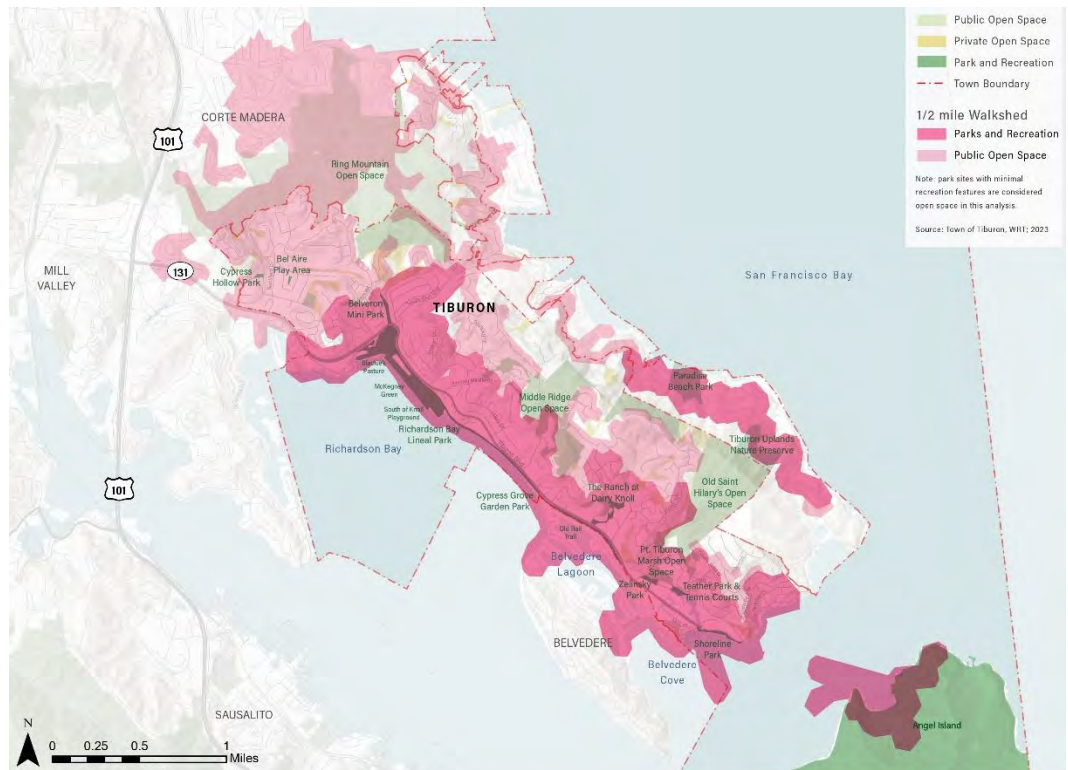
The Tiburon parks and recreation system provides a range of recreational features and amenities. However, most of these amenities are concentrated along Richardson Bay Lineal Park. This includes Tiburon's only athletic field and playground, that are not part of a school, at McKegney Green and South of Knoll. This area of Richardson Bay Lineal Park is well supported by amenities, such as picnic benches, drinking fountains, benches, and a public restroom. Tiburon also has shoreline access at two locations – Blackie's Pasture and Old Rail Trail – and a fishing pier at Shoreline Park.

Despite the majority of park amenities and recreation features being concentrated along the southwest edge of the town, there are several schools with facilities available to the public and other recreation centers that offer playgrounds, athletic fields, tennis courts, and even an indoor gym at The Ranch at Dairy Knoll.



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Access to Parks (1/2 mile)

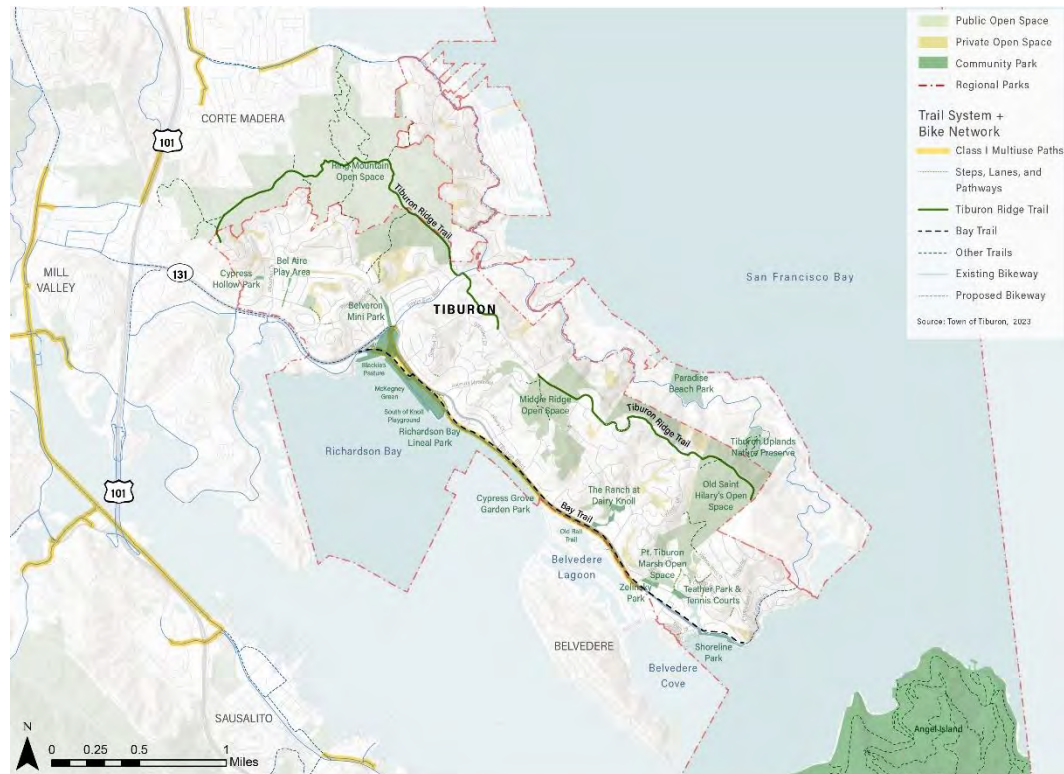


Neighborhoods located in the north and middle of the peninsula have the most consistent access to public open spaces, and the neighborhoods in the southwest have the best access to parks and recreation centers, including Richardson Bay Lineal Park and the downtown parks. While most of the town is within 1/2 mile walkshed of a public park or open space, much of the town has inadequate access to park amenities and recreational features due to the public open spaces having minimal recreation and park amenities.



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Trail System & Bike Network



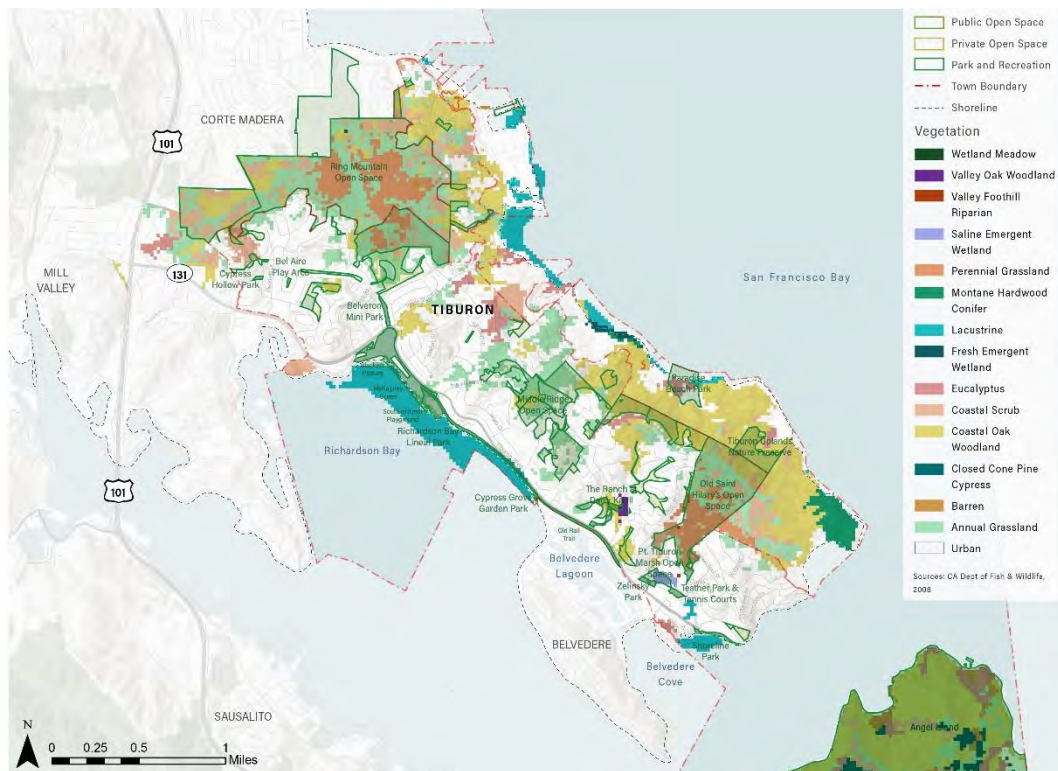
The regional Bay Trail runs down the southwest side of the peninsula through Richardson Bay Lineal Park, from Shoreline Park up to Blackie's Pasture. This stretch of the trail consists of an existing bikeway and Class I Multiuse Paths for both pedestrians and bicyclists. The Bay Trail is supported by an existing bikeway connects to multiple routes in adjacent communities and loops around the north side of the peninsula and will eventually connect to the Bay Trail at the southern end.

The three larger public open spaces are supported by the Tiburon Ridge Trail that runs through Ring Mountain Open Space, breaks in the urban environment, and picks up again connecting through Middle Ridge Open Space and Old Saint Hilary's Open Space. XX miles in total length, the trail is intermittently connected by informal steps, lanes, or pathways providing access to surrounding communities.



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Vegetation (land cover)



Tiburon has a diverse vegetation palette, with 15 different classifications of land cover within the town. Behind "urban," the most common vegetation categories are coastal oak woodland, annual grassland, perennial grassland, and coastal scrub, covering most of the area in the open spaces and northeastern area of the peninsula. While most of the shoreline is urban, lacustrine is the second most common vegetation, particularly adjacent to parks, such as near Richardson Bay Lineal Park, Shoreline Park, and the two regional parks on the north side of the peninsula.

In lower elevation areas, there are a couple of small patches of saline emergent wetland and fresh emergent wetland are present. Located on the north side of the point of the peninsula there is an area of montane hardwood conifer. Off the coast on Angel Island the most common land cover types are coastal oak woodland, eucalyptus, closed cone pine cypress, and annual grassland.



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Wetlands & Ridge Uplands

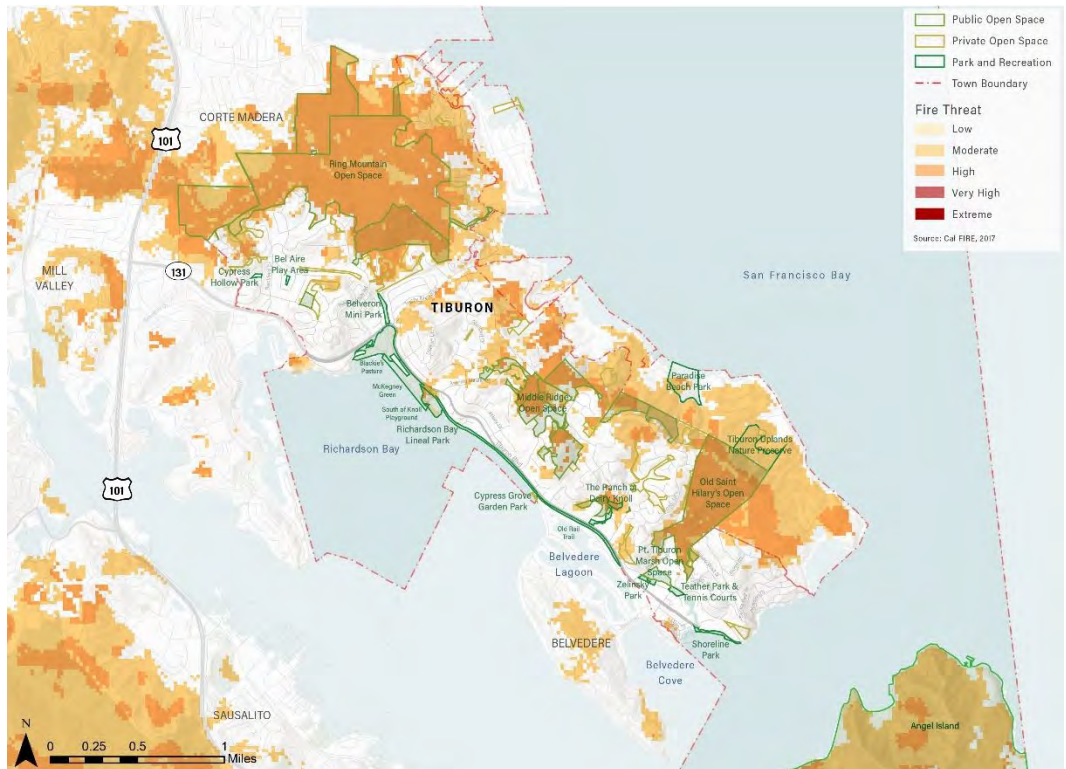


Tiburon has 7 different classifications of wetlands and ridge uplands. The most prominent is the ridge upland greenbelt that spans across all of the open spaces and adjacent areas in the center of the peninsula. Within this zone, riverine tributaries are also present along the slopes of the ridgeline, connecting down to the waterfront and off of the coast where estuarine and marine wetland and deepwater are located. Tiburon also has a small number of freshwater ponds, forest/shrub wetland, and emergent wetlands. The three (3) ponds are all located near the tip of the peninsula whereas the freshwater forest/shrub wetlands and freshwater emergent wetlands are distributed throughout the town, mostly at the lower elevations within or near the larger open spaces.



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Fire Threat



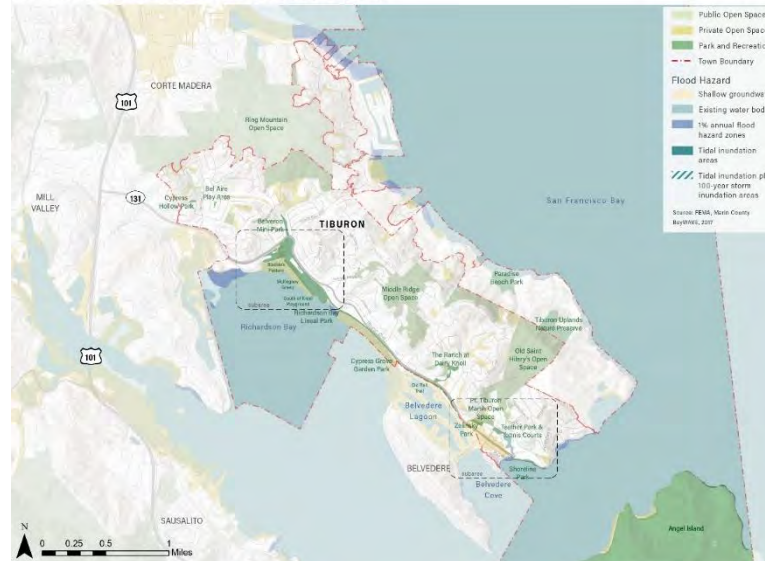
Tiburon faces moderate to high fire threat throughout the town limits. The threat is strongest within the three large public open spaces that are classified as "high" and means that fires could start rapidly and spread quickly. The moderate fire threat exists in the community adjacent to the open space features, spanning along the northern edge of the town beginning on the west side and continuing down to the tip of the peninsula. Fire hazards lessen as it approaches the coastline and in the more densely populated areas in the south.



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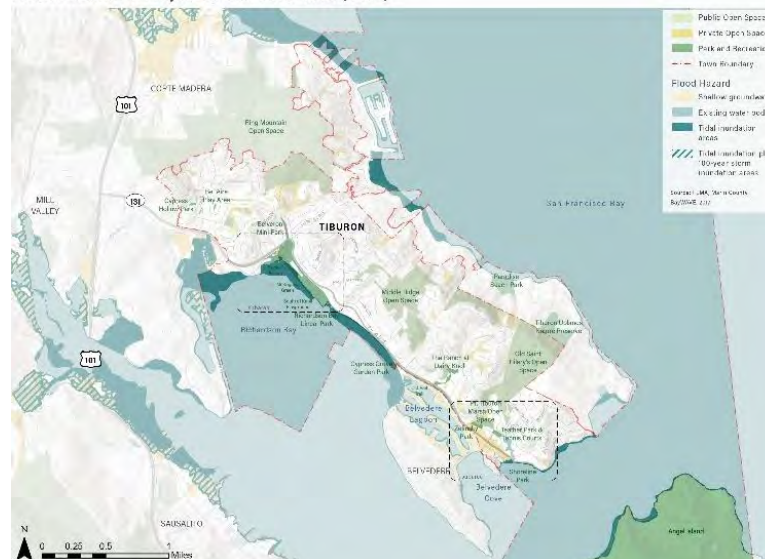
Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (Citywide)

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (+0")



The Town of Tiburon is vulnerable flood hazards, tidal inundation, and sea level rise. The map to the left shows the base flood hazards conditions, this map does not include the assumptions of sea level rise. Without taking those conditions into effect, we can see the flood hazard zones are largely contained near the shoreline, impacting Richardson Bay Lineal Park and the downtown area.

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (+10")



Adding in sea level rise projections show that the areas affected increase. At the projected +10" level, a large portion of Richardson Bay Lineal Park is classified as tidal inundation areas.



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Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (+20")



The inundation areas grow under the projected +20", encompassing more of Richardson Bay and creeping further into downtown, as well as storm surge inundation areas.

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (+60")



At projected +60", the area of inundation grows drastically encompassing the entire entrance area at Blackie's Pasture and the shoreline. Downtown is also vulnerable to sea level rise due to the amount of area with shallow ground water. This condition is particularly threatening due to water inundation coming from the sea and belowground. With a projected +60" sea level rise, the entirety of downtown will be underwater, as seen in the subarea maps below.



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Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (Richardson Bay Subarea)

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise - Richardson Bay Subarea (+0")



At the base flood hazards conditions, the Richardson Bay subarea is vulnerable to shallow groundwater collecting through Blackie's Pasture, impacting the entrance to the Lineal Park.

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise - Richardson Bay Subarea (+10")



Adding in sea level rise projections show that the areas affected increase. At the projected +10" level, storm tidal inundation areas are largely contained along the shoreline.



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Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise - Richardson Bay Subarea (+20")



At the project +20", storm inundation areas grow further, particularly at Blackie's Pasture.

Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise - Richardson Bay Subarea (+60")

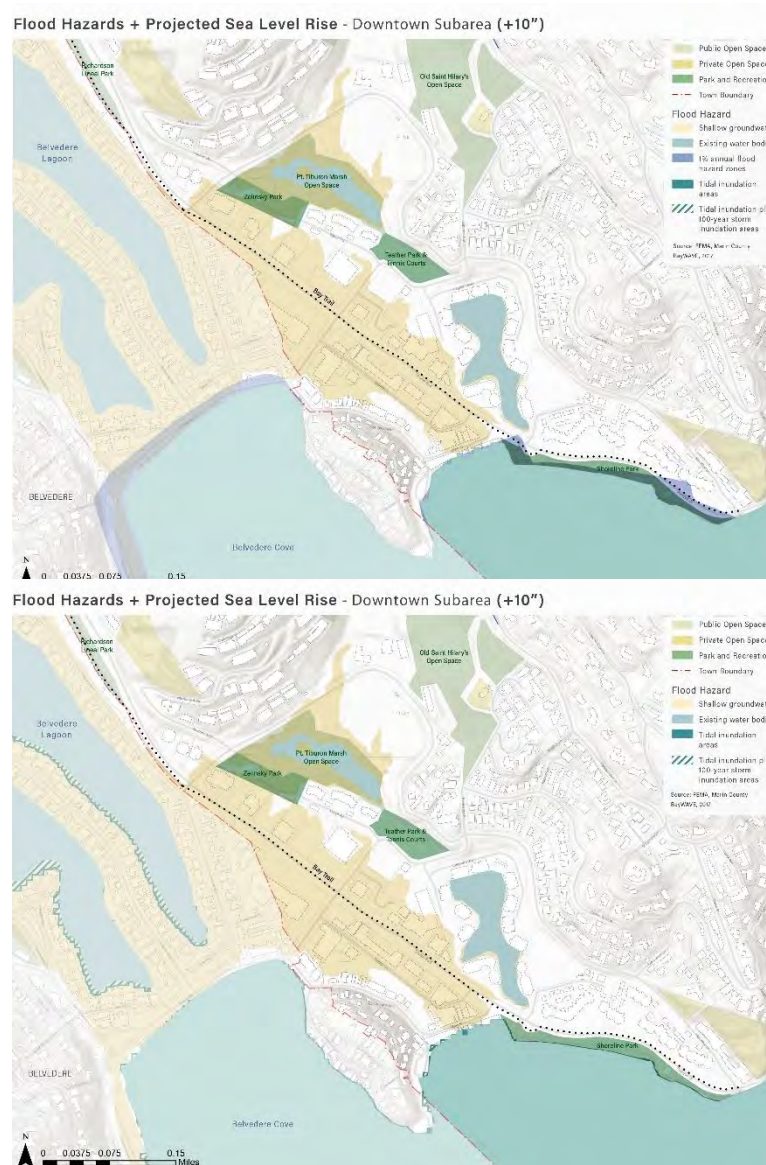


At projected +60", the storm inundation area grows drastically encompassing the entire entrance area at Blackie's Pasture and the shoreline.



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Flood Hazards + Projected Sea Level Rise (Downtown Subarea)

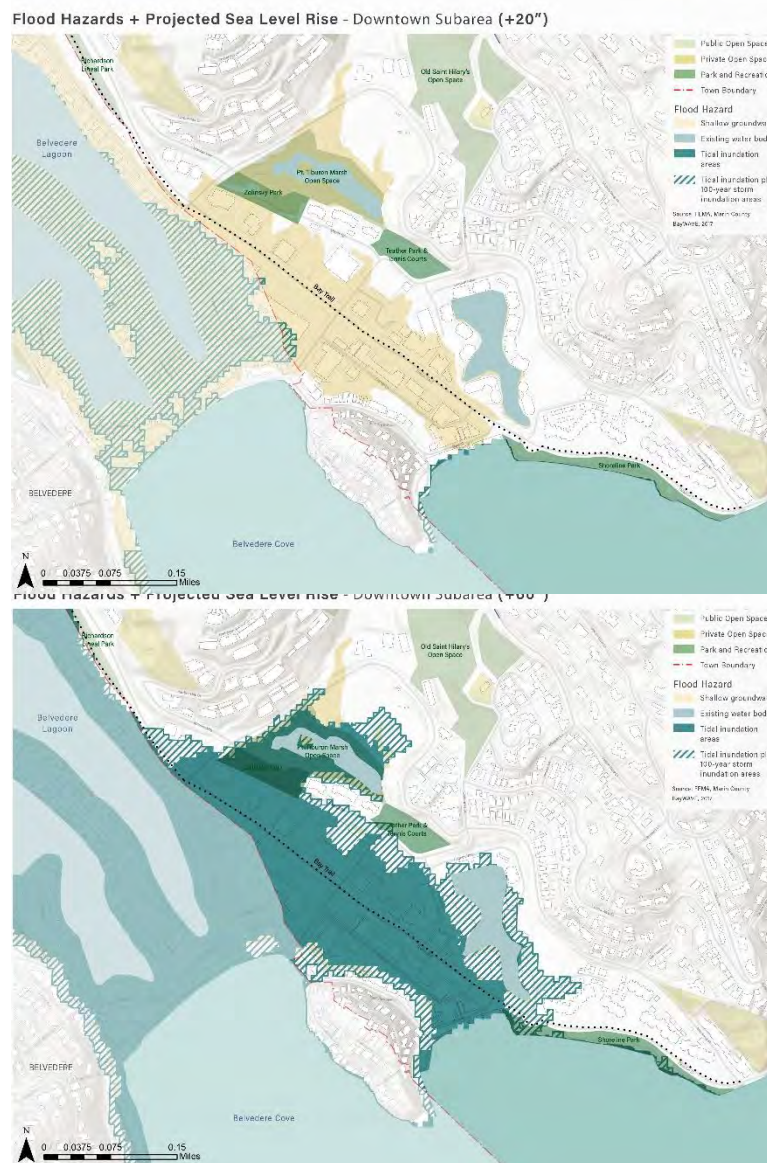


At the base flood hazards conditions, the Downtown subarea is extremely vulnerable to shallow groundwater collecting around Tiburon Avenue, impacting the main downtown core and Zelinsky Park and Shoreline Park.

At the projected +10" level, storm tidal inundation areas grow along the shoreline.



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At the project +20", storm inundation areas grow drastically, encroaching further inland and impacting more buildings along the shoreline.

At projected +60", the area of inundation grows drastically encompassing nearly all of downtown and impacting all of the surrounding parks.

Tiburon is undertaking a master plan for its parks and recreation system. The master plan will focus on Town-owned parks as well as recreational programming provided by The Belvedere-Tiburon Recreation District (known as The Ranch), but it will also address the larger open space and recreation context. To support the master plan process, WRT conducted on-the-ground assessments of the parks owned and operated by the Town of Tiburon. Altogether, the team visited and evaluated 10 distinct parks. The parks and open space system, including areas not owned and operated by the Town of Tiburon, is shown in Figure 1. Tiburon's network of paths and trails is shown in Figure 2.

The assessment documents recreation amenities, and qualitatively evaluates parks based on access and connectivity, condition and maintenance, functionality, and sense of safety and comfort. This memorandum summarizes the findings of the assessment and provides preliminary suggestions for possible improvements. Attachment A details the scoring criteria, and Attachment B provides a table indicating each park's score in each of the four primary categories of analysis.

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METHODOLOGY

WRT conducted parks and open space assessments over the course of two days, on Tuesday, August 1st and Wednesday, August 2nd, 2023. The team assessed the following Town of Tiburon parks and open spaces. Although there are more parks and open spaces within Tiburon, only areas managed by the Town were evaluated.

In the field, the team used a spreadsheet organized around four categories:

1. Access & Connectivity
2. Condition & Maintenance
3. Functionality
4. Safety & Comfort

Each category, in turn, was comprised of several more specific characteristics, detailed in Table 1. The evaluation of parks was more detailed than the evaluation of open spaces because parks are the primary emphasis of the master plan. Characteristics that were evaluated for both parks and open space areas are indicated with an asterisk.

All features were scored using rating scale of 1-10 was used in the field to classify the criteria as:

-  Great (8.1 - 10)
-  Good (6.1 - 8.0)
-  Fair (4.1 - 6.0)
-  Poor (0 - 4.0)



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In addition to the score, descriptive field notes were added, and photos were taken throughout the park and open space system to illustrate the findings in the spreadsheet.

In the office, scores and notes were reviewed and refined so that aggregated scores could be calculated for each category. Each site was given an overall score using the same range ranking the parks and the open spaces and trails from great to poor. If a category was not relevant to a



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park, that park was not given a score for that category in order not to incorrectly weight overall category averages (e.g. if a park did not have a playground, the category “Playground Condition” was left blank—and not included in scored calculation—as opposed to being scored as 0).

This parks and open space assessment provides a qualitative understanding of how Tiburon’s parks function today. This assessment is complemented by a Facility Assessment (Mack5) and a Maintenance Assessment (PROS).

PARKS ASSESSMENT

Strengths of Tiburon’s Parks

Our assessment found some consistent strengths across the park system.

- The parks are clearly well-used and well-loved. We observed people using each park, and many people in total using the park system.
- Parks are well-maintained. When benches, bathrooms, trash receptacles, playgrounds, and trees and plants are present, they are in great condition.
- Parks are welcoming and open, with few barriers at edges for users to enter the park.
- All parks have a sense of safety and comfort, and little to no evidence of derelict use.
- Many parks include unique, and beautiful, natural features that define the landscape of Tiburon. At the same time, the parks each have distinct attributes.
- The parks within the Richardson Bay Lineal Park (Blackie’s Pasture, McKegney Green, South-of-the-Knoll Park, and the Old Rail Trail) are well-connected and cohesive.

Areas for Improvement

Despite having many strengths, we also found some deficiencies across the park system.

- Several parks have limited visibility from streets or interaction with neighborhoods.



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- There is a lack of consistent and useful signage throughout the park system.
- Some parks feature large areas of grass without associated uses or programs. There is opportunity to better utilize these spaces.
- Many of the parks would benefit from additional trash receptacles, seating, water fountains, and bathrooms.
- There is an absence of neighborhood-oriented park spaces.

Key Findings and Park-by-Park Evaluation

The sections below go into greater detail about the assessment's key findings in the areas of access and connectivity, condition and maintenance, functionality, and safety and comfort. For each topic, key themes are discussed at a systemwide scale, followed by a summary of park scores.

Access and Connectivity

Signage, Wayfinding and City Branding

There is great opportunity for signage and branding throughout the park system. Many parks, like Cypress Grove Garden Park, Cypress Hollow Park, Belveron Mini Park, and Bel Aire Park have no signage at all. This makes it difficult to find or know that these parks exist, and what they have to offer.

Shoreline Park, Teather Park, McKegney Green, South-of-the-Knoll Park, and Zelinsky Park all have some signage but it is not clear or helpful. Shoreline Park has signs that indicate rules and some historical information at the museum, but no signs identifying the space as Shoreline Park. Teather Park has one sign that identifies it as Teather Park, but it is engraved in a rock that sits on the ground near the bench area. This rock is not prominent or very visible and is likely overlooked often. Zelinsky Park has one sign, with historical information about Zelinsky, the man. There is no signage identifying the space as Zelinsky Park.

The parks within Richardson Bay Lineal Park have the most signage. However, the only directional signs are on the Old Rail Trail, and the design of these signs does not make information clear. The historical signs along the trail are awkwardly oriented at times.



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Signage is not consistently designed, and thus does not create a unified identity for the system. There are no maps of the park system, which would be helpful for wayfinding. Even small and subtly-placed signs would help to bring cohesion to the park system and establish the less-known and less-frequented parks.

Some parks also suffer from digital illegibility. For example, Cypress Hollow Park is difficult to find on online map services and internet searches, and is referred to by different names. Cypress Grove Garden Park is identified as Bramble Beach on online map services.

Surrounding Bicycle and Pedestrian Network

The parks located along the Old Rail Trail, and within the Richardson Bay Lineal Park, are very well-connected for cyclists and pedestrians by this trail. However, there is room to improve the surrounding bike and pedestrian network. There are few clear and safe pedestrian and cyclist access points to enter the Lineal Park system. Much of the park is adjacent to Tiburon Boulevard and the road works as a barrier for pedestrian and cyclist access. Shoreline Park, although not a park of the Richardson Bay Lineal Park, is also very well connected to bike and pedestrian networks.

Teather Park and Zelinsky Park are fairly accessible for cyclists and pedestrians, but not as obviously as the Richardson Bay Lineal Park system and Shoreline Park. These parks are well-connected but could benefit from improved pedestrian network (crosswalks, etc.) and designated bicycle parking.

Parks that are farther from the shoreline are not well connected for cyclists or pedestrians. The bicycle lane and sidewalk network does not extend to these parks that are more deeply embedded in residential neighborhoods. However, it is possible to cycle or walk on the road.

Parking

There is a designated parking lot at Blackie's Pasture that functionally serves the entire Richardson Bay Lineal Park. This lot works well for Blackie's Pasture, but is often full and does not meet the demand for the entire Lineal Park at peak use times. McKegney Green and South-of-the-Knoll Park do not have designated parking and are only accessible by parking and walking or biking. The Lineal Park and subarea parks could benefit from more parking opportunities along the system, paired with more access points into the system.

In the downtown area, Teather Park has a designated parking lot. This lot may be larger than necessary to serve the tennis courts and small park area. Part of this lot space could be repurposed for a greater use. Zelinsky Park benefits from the ample parking at both the library

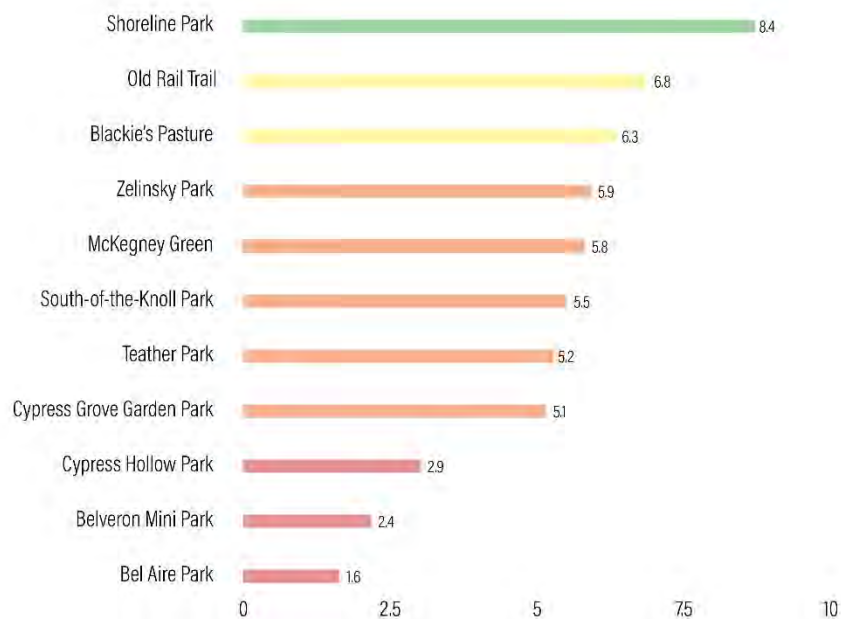


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and Town Hall lots. Shoreline Park does not have designated parking but is close to Tiburon Main St. Parking; there is limited parking at the museum within Shoreline Park.

The parks that are located deeper within residential areas do not have designated parking, but these parks are generally oriented to the immediate neighborhood, and may be reached on foot or by parking along the street. In certain places, the path from parking on the street and walking to the park entrance can be awkward—like in the case of Belveron Mini Park—although this is more due to lack of sidewalks and pedestrian network. These parks, that serve as smaller neighborhood parks, should not necessarily have designated parking and were not marked down for that lack.

Condition

Recreational Amenities

When recreational amenities are present, they are well-maintained and in good condition. All amenities—sports fields and courts, playgrounds, bike paths—are all in good working order and are frequented by users. Playgrounds have wear but are not broken down.

Tree Canopy and Vegetation

Tree canopy and vegetation is mostly in good condition. There is a variety of trees and plants in many of the parks, and they are well-kept and healthy looking. There is opportunity to expand the tree canopy and provide more shaded areas. Native plants are present and established in many of the hillside areas. There is opportunity to improve grass and lawn condition. There are irrigated and non-irrigated lawns in the parks. Grass and lawn conditions vary throughout the park system; there are mowed, aerated, dry, brown, overwatered, and mushy areas.

At Cypress Hollow Park, there is a dirt area that used to be grass—there is room to improve this, if desired. However, the dirt area is working well as is. Overall, there is no need for tree canopy



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and vegetation improvements but, if desired by the Town and community, there are improvements that can be made.

Trash Receptacles, Seating, Benches, and Water Fountains

Trash receptacles are in good condition and seem to be frequently emptied. There is no visible trash overflow. At some parks there are dog bag dispensers; when present, the dispensers are full and in good condition.

There are many picnic tables and benches throughout the park system and they are almost all in good condition. Some tables and benches show wear but are still sturdy and working well. The benches at Teather Park are the exception—these benches do not have back support and are warping.

The few benches at Bel Aire Park are piecemeal and have been placed in the park space by surrounding neighbors. They are not standard benches and not in as good condition as the benches put in place by the Town in other parks.

When water fountains are present, they are clean and working well.

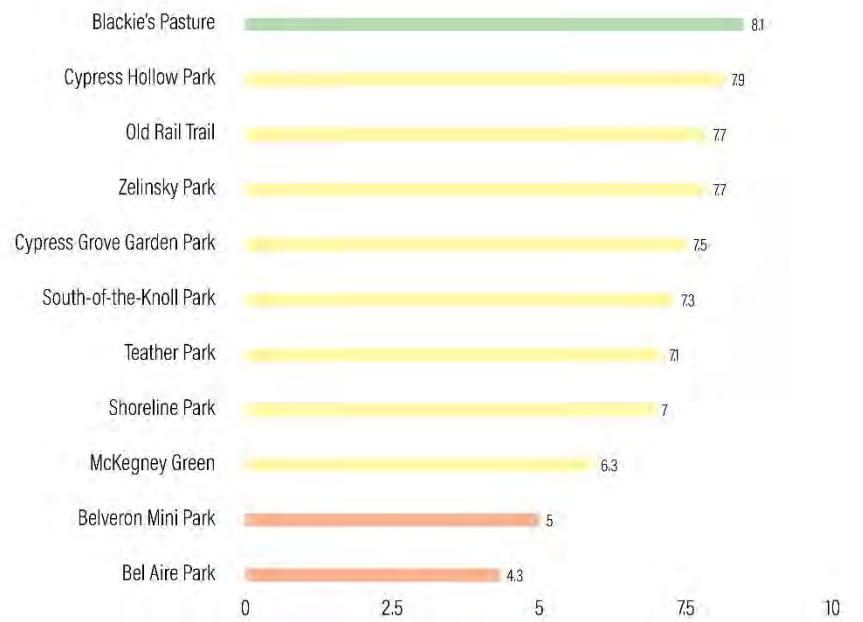
Restrooms

Building condition assessment is covered in more detail in a separate assessment by Mack5. In general, permanent restrooms were found to be in good condition, functional, and well-maintained. All bathrooms were well-stocked. Some parks did not have permanent restroom buildings, but did have one or two portable restrooms. These portable restrooms were in reasonably good condition, but did have some trash on the ground or floor. Parks without restroom facilities were not scored in this category.

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Landscaping, paths, and all available amenities—bathroom, trash receptables, seating, water fountain, bike repair station—are all in great condition at Blackie's Pasture (left). Benches are in good condition; paving and landscaping are in okay condition at Belveron Mini Park (right).

Functionality

Relevance and Variety of Uses

Many of the parks are being used for, and allow for, a variety of activities, creating positive, synergistic places. Other parks have limited uses but those uses are specific and intended. For example, McKegney Green is used only as an organized sports field but functions very well. Other parks, like Belveron Mini Park, have limited use, do not function well, and have opportunity to be put to better and higher use.

There is space within the well-functioning parks for a wide variety of uses. Shoreline Park, South-of-the-Knoll Park, Teather Park, and Zelinsky Park all function well but have space that could be used for different activities. For example, there is ample lawn space at South-of-the-Knoll Park that could be repurposed, although this park has functionality today as a playground and picnic area and place to walk.

The less formal parks—Belveron Mini Park and Bel Aire Park—are unplanned and do not currently serve any uses beyond casual walking space. There is great opportunity here to provide more activities and uses in these spaces.



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Compatibility with Neighbors

Almost all parks have good compatibility with their neighbors. Parks that could create a noise issue, like the tennis courts at Teather Park, are shielded well from surrounding residential areas. Zelinsky Park is especially well suited to its neighbors—the library and town hall—and is additive to its surroundings. The parks that are more deeply embedded in neighborhoods are positioned well to serve as neighborhood parks if improved.

Amenity Adjacencies

Amenities within the parks are arranged in a functional way. Benches, restrooms, water fountains, and trash cans are located in proximity to one another. The amenities, when present, are easy to navigate and utilize. For example, trash cans are placed near seating for ease of use.

Activation

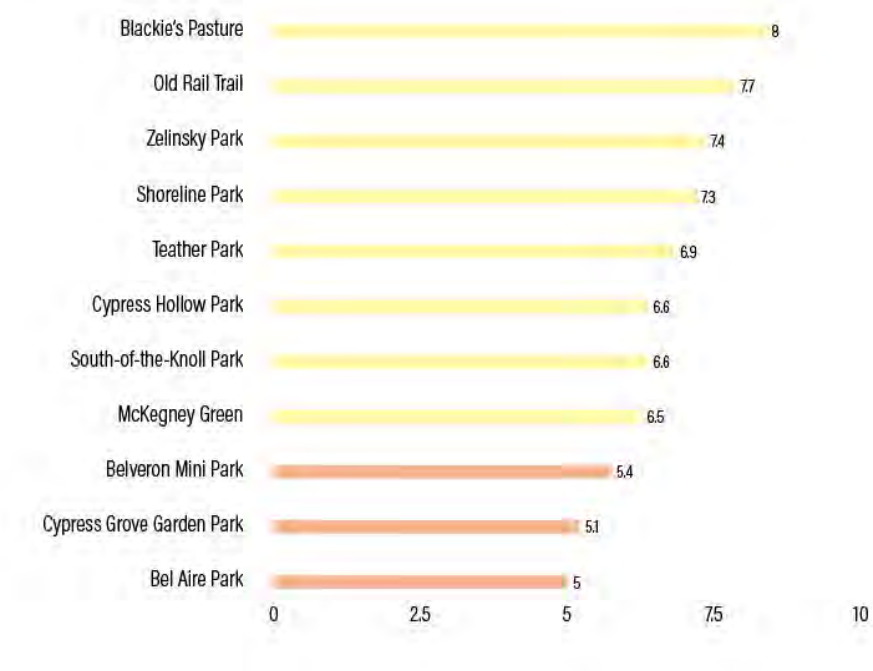
Every park was observed being used. The parks within the Richardson Bay Lineal Park were extremely well-used and frequented. Belveron Mini Park, Teather Park, Zelinsky Park, Cypress Hollow Park, Bel Aire Park, and Cypress Grove Garden Park were observed with far fewer users, but this is somewhat proportional to their size. There is opportunity to promote more activation and awareness of these parks. The least amount of use was observed at Belveron Mini Park, with one user there for a very short time.

It is hard to predict uses at other times, but it can be reasonably assumed that all the parks experience greater use on weekends than on weekdays.

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The trail is very well-used for a variety of activities (Old Rail Trail, left). Although McKegney Green functions very well as an organized sports field, it is single-use and lack shade and amenities that would improve the spectator experience (McKegney Green, right).

Safety + Comfort

Sense of Safety and Nighttime Safety

Although the parks were not observed at nighttime, there are design factors that contribute to feelings of safety that we observed. In many of the parks there was lighting and little to no evidence of illicit or unauthorized use. There are not security cameras present, but there are many park users that contribute to a sense of safety. Having people present and able to see a park space—“eyes of the street”—is important to create a sense of comfort and security. Town staff was observed working in some of the parks, and this also adds to a sense of safety. Park users can assume that they will be visible to others, potentially Town officials, as they use the parks.

There is room for design improvements that could bolster sense of safety and some of the parks. The physical layout of Bel Aire Park and Belveron Mini Park create environments that could easily be used for illicit or unauthorized activities. These parks are secluded, hidden from the sightlines of passersby. There is no lighting present. In a community that is less safe than Tiburon, these parks would likely feel unsafe and create feelings of discomfort.



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Pedestrian and Cyclist Safety

There are opportunities to improve pedestrian safety within and around the parks. Old Rail Trail is used by bikers as well as pedestrians. The speeds of bicycles and the narrowness of the trail may create feelings of discomfort and potential safety issues for some trail users.

Elsewhere, there are opportunities to better connect the parks to surrounding neighborhoods and sidewalks. More crosswalks and automated crossing signals could increase pedestrian safety and allow people to walk to parks and feel safer, especially along the Richardson Bay Lineal Park. Tiburon Boulevard is a barrier for pedestrians.

Mitigation of Views and Noise from Surroundings

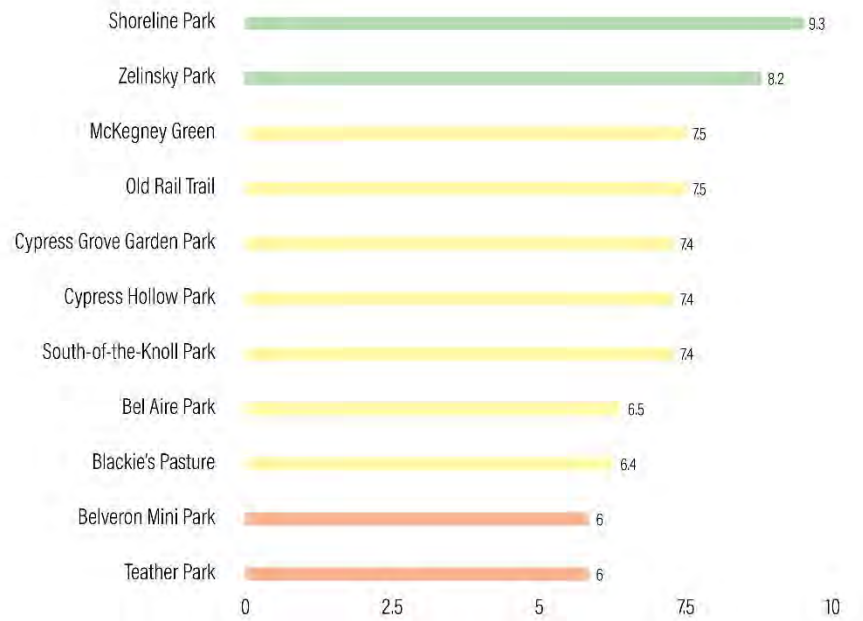
For the most part, the views surrounding all the parks are beautiful. The parks in the Richardson Bay Lineal Park benefit from bay views. Views into surrounding areas, neighborhoods and downtown, are not disruptive to the parks. There is opportunity for improvement between Blackie's Pasture and McKegney Green, where a water facility sits. This separates what could be a continuous park system. This issue could be improved by repurposing the space or shielding the facility from the parks.

Noise from surrounding streets is not an issue for parks that are adjacent to streets with lower speed limits and/or light traffic. The parks that are adjacent to Tiburon Boulevard, however, could be improved by greater noise screening from this road.

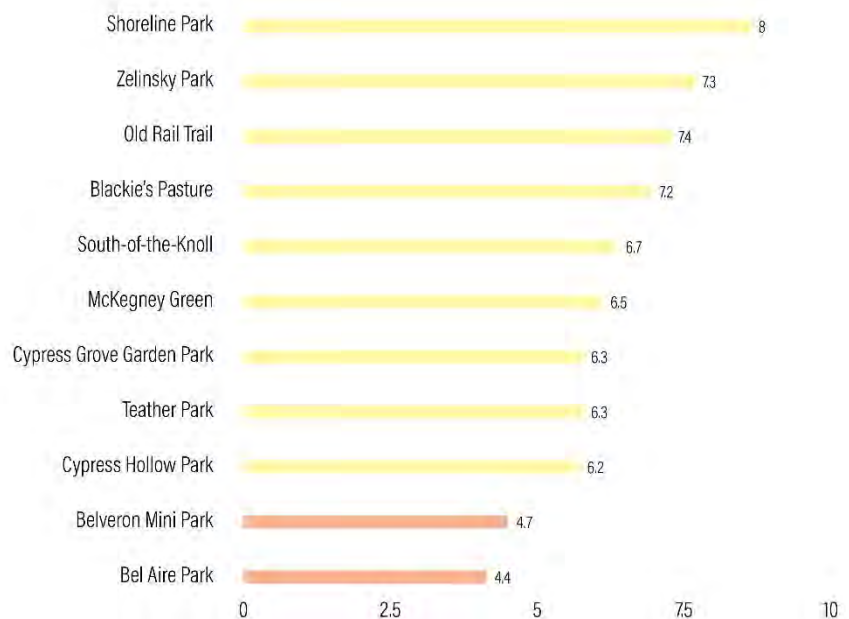


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Overall Scoring and Takeaways

Tiburon's parks are well-used and functional. The majority of the parks scored within the "Good" range and no parks scored in the "Poor" range. Lower-scoring parks in our assessment would benefit from the addition of neighborhood-oriented recreational functions and clearer identity and visibility.

Preliminary Recommendations for Parks

- Implement a branding and wayfinding system to all parks to consistently identify parks, amenities, and routes, increase awareness of less-used parks, and create a stronger Tiburon parks identity.



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- Repurpose underused space to better serve the community and a variety of activities and uses.
- Improve access to and along Richardson Bay Lineal Park spaces.
- Place additional seating, water fountains, trash receptacles and bathrooms at parks where they are not currently present.
- Explore ways to provide neighborhood-serving park amenities.

OPEN SPACES ASSESSMENT

Town of Tiburon open spaces were assessed in the following categories:

- Adjacent Bike Routes/Sufficient Bicycle Parking near Entrance
- Accessibility/Parking in or Adjacent to Entrance
- Proximity/Connectivity to Regional Trail
- Clear Directional Signage and Mapping

What's Working for Town of Tiburon Open Spaces

Trailheads are open and accessible, with no barriers for pedestrians and cyclists. It is possible to walk, bike or drive to trailheads, though designated bicycle or vehicle parking is not available at trailheads. The informal travel routes to and from trailheads is functional: people are using the open spaces. However, there is opportunity to improve and formalize these networks. Some of the trailheads have trash receptacles, which look to be well-maintained and are not overflowing. Some trailheads have signage indicating that the space is a Tiburon open space.

Tiburon open spaces benefit from being adjacent to Tiburon parks and proximate to regional open spaces and trails. There is a great opportunity for the Tiburon open spaces to better connect to and build upon this larger system.

Although the interior of the open spaces was not assessed, from general observation Tiburon open spaces offer beautiful views, more open and flexible recreation areas and trails. The larger open spaces are well-used for a variety of activities (a group of rock climbers was observed).



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Areas for Improvement for Open Space System

- Town of Tiburon open space access points and trailheads do not have formal car or bicycle parking. Typically, there is room to park along the adjacent street.
- In many cases, trailheads cannot be accessed from bike lanes or sidewalks.
- Tiburon has a well-connected system of open space trails, but there is little orientation or identity.
- Town of Tiburon open space access points lack helpful signage. There is an opportunity to integrate with the County's open space wayfinding system.
- Although trash receptacles are available at trailheads, there is room to add more amenities and make the open spaces more usable.

Preliminary Recommendations for Open Space System

- Implement a branding and wayfinding system for trails and trailheads to increase awareness, legibility, and connection between Tiburon open spaces, County open spaces and parks. This may include formalizing the naming of Tiburon's open spaces.
- Add trailhead amenities—signage, trash receptacles, bicycle parking, and seating.
- Highlight, through mapping and signage, the possible pedestrian routes to access open spaces. Improve the safety (crosswalks, traffic calming, etc.) of these routes where necessary.
- Explore opportunities to create stronger trail connections between the shoreline and Downtown and the open spaces along Tiburon Ridge.

MAINTENANCE ASSESSMENT



PARK MAINTENANCE ASSESSMENT

Parks and amenities that are clean and functioning efficiently are a critical element to delivering high quality programs and services. The Town of Tiburon's Public Works Department maintains 55 acres of developed parks, 257 acres of open space parks and 1.57 miles of paved trails.

PARKS MAINTENANCE LINES OF SERVICE

The core lines of service (functions) performed by the Parks Maintenance Division are numerous and complex. The lines of service are as follows:

MAINTENANCE MODES AND STANDARDS

Regular maintenance requires unit-based quantification for most major resource requirements and provides methods for projecting future resource needs. The Town's maintenance efforts as detailed are expansive and address diverse aspects of maintaining high-quality parks, amenities, and infrastructure to preserve the integrity of public assets and their meaningful use. The prevailing objectives of a standards-based park maintenance program are presented below but not in order of importance:

- Maintain and improve the sites, grounds, facilities, and structures of the Town's parks system to provide optimal and enjoyable use.
- Provide landscaping and general maintenance for a multitude of Town amenities, including but not limited to, landscaped beds and turf, urban open spaces, urban forests, and selected park buildings and structures.
- Be responsive to maintenance needs of the Town's open-space tracts. Particular attention must be paid to access points, trail repair, erosion control, and trash removal.
- Protect and preserve the value of Town assets so that long-term maintenance costs are minimal due to extending the service life of those assets.

Many of the objectives assigned to the Park's maintenance teams go beyond the traditional responsibilities of park maintenance employees.

It is recommended that all park maintenance agencies adopt a system of park and grounds maintenance levels wherein functions are organized into a tiered structure with three different levels of service. These levels are referred to as maintenance modes, and each has a unique standard that dictates routine maintenance tasks and their frequency. The appropriate maintenance mode is assigned to each park or site, which creates a framework for organizing and scheduling tasks and responsibilities at each location. A description of each of the maintenance modes is provided below:

MAINTENANCE MODE/LEVEL 1

Maintenance Mode/Level 1 (Mode/Level 1) applies to parks or sites that require the greatest level of maintenance standard in the system. These parks or sites are often revenue producing facilities, such as the athletic fields, where the quality and level of maintenance has a direct impact on the park facility's ability to maximize revenue generation.

MAINTENANCE MODE/LEVEL 2

Maintenance Mode/Level 2 (Mode/Level 2) applies to parks or sites that require a moderate level of effort and maintenance standards in the system. These include developed and undeveloped parks with amenities that are heavily used such as trails, community and pocket parks, and special-use facilities found in the Town's parks system.

MAINTENANCE MODE/LEVEL 3

Maintenance Mode/Level 3 (Mode/Level 3) applies to parks or sites that require a nominal level of effort and maintenance standards in the system. These generally include undeveloped parks with minimal amenities.

PARK MAINTENANCE KEY FINDINGS

MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT PLAN

Through the review of data and workshops with staff, the PROS Consulting team determined that the Parks Division does generally try to operate within the maintenance modes identified above. Parks maintenance also generally follows a written set of routine park and grounds maintenance standards. However, a formalized, documented, detailed maintenance management plan does not exist. A formalized maintenance management plan includes not only maintenance modes and standards for each park but also tracks the performance of the work against a set of defined outcomes as well as the costs expended to achieve each outcome. A maintenance management plan is typically memorialized within an asset-based work order management system.

COMPUTERIZED MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Though a formalized maintenance management plan is not established, parks maintenance in the Town of Tiburon currently utilizes a Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS) to track routine/scheduled work. The CMMS not only documents maintenance and asset replacement schedules but can track the time and resources required to perform work in the field.

EQUIPMENT AND STORAGE

The Division does not lack the necessary equipment or resources to perform tasks. However, the location of the Corporation Yard where equipment and vehicles are stored is not centrally located within the Town and creates inefficiencies for the park maintenance division due to traffic and travel time.

STAFFING LEVELS

Parks: The Parks Maintenance Division is comprised of approximately 4.5 full-time equivalents (FTES) - 3 full-time employees and 1.5 part-time FTEs - dedicated to maintaining the parks system.

As noted above, Tiburon should allocate funding for approximately 5.51 FTEs to maintain its park and trails system - 1 FTE more than is currently approved.

ANNUAL PARK OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE FUNDING

Based on analysis conducted by the project team as summarized in the table below, annual operational funding for parks and trail maintenance is approximately \$100,000 under the recommended funding level.

PARK MAINTENANCE KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

FORMALIZED MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT PLAN

It is recommended that the Town develop a formalized maintenance management plan that details the outcomes of park and trail maintenance work and the maintenance standards (tasks and frequencies) that are necessary to achieve the outcomes.

DEVELOPED PARKS AND TRAILS MAINTENANCE COST OF SERVICE

It is recommended that the Parks Maintenance Division develop line-item budgets for each functional area of work, with specific focus on Community Parks, Mini-Parks, Open Space Parks, Paved Trails and Linear Parks.

ANNUAL PARK MAINTENANCE FUNDING AND STAFFING

It is recommended that the Park Maintenance Operation be allocated an additional \$109,000 annually for enhanced management and maintenance of parks. Of this funding, approximately \$80,000 should be allocated for the addition of 1 FTE.

I am writing to you regarding Bel Aire Park or the ""Children's Play Area"" as it is described on the Tiburon Bel Aire neighborhood city map I received when I purchased my home. The Bel Aire Park is in terrible shape. The holes on the ground have created a walking hazard for children and adults alike and the tall weeds covering the entire area have become breeding grounds for ticks that can carry Lyme disease. Many of the neighbors including myself, no longer walk their dogs at the park due to this reason. The unmanicured shrubs and bushes along the perimeter have been ignored for far too long. I am not in favor of new play structures, but I would like to see at least some landscaping improvements. A lawn area with plants along the perimeter as well as a few new benches would greatly enhance the enjoyment of the Bel Aire Park.

Please maintain the existing parks (Cypress Hollow) with grass

Also- ensure space for dogs in addition to kids

Protect open space (eg blackies)

I have just now read about the proposed amphitheater and swimming pool at blackies pasture, on the very day that there is a meeting scheduled to determine whether to approve this. It is outrageous but here as a resident living within walking distance of this area I have not been informed about this proposal. I am firmly opposed to this development for so many reasons, including impact on Richardson bay, increased traffic in an already highly impacted area, noise pollution, trash from vendors, lack of parking that is already impacted for local families trying to use the path and soccer fields. This would be a total disaster and it is embarrassing for our town how poorly information has been distributed to residents, ie not at all. Please count my strong NO when tallying feedback. And please pause this unfair process until proper, individual mailed notification has been sent to every resident from Reed ranch road down to the tip of Belvedere, as they will all be negatively impacted.

The Town wants to turn itself into CONEY ISLAND !!!! ????? Blackies Pasture abuts the most congested part of the EXISTING commute route into and out of TIBURON on a daily basisincluding the undersized intersection that includes Trestle Glen BLVD!!

Tiburon is a RESIDENTIAL AREA with 2-lane roads and very little off street parking. Has the Town Council lost it's collective minds!!! I didn't see a mention of erecting a 200' high roller coaster, so maybe that was an inadvertent omission? NO!

MY HUSBAND AND I HAVE BEEN IN THE REEDLANDS FOR 30 YEARS. COMMUNITY EVENTS LIKE THE REED SCHOOL FUNDRAISER IN BLACKIE'S CAUSE A LOT OF NOISE. MY CONCERNS ARE MAINLY FOR ANYTHING THAT CAUSES EXCESSIVE NOISE AND LIGHTING AT BLACKIES AFTER SUNDOWN. THE AMPITHEATRE WOULD BE MOST CONCERNING FOR THESE ITEMS BUT ALSO PARKING AND LET'S NOT FORGET TRAFFIC ON TIBURON BLVD WHICH IS CURRENTLY A VERY SIGNIFICANT ISSUE AND CANNOT WITHSTAND ADDITIONAL LARGE TRAFFIC INCREASES.

since I can't go to the City Hall meeting tonight, here's my thoughts.

I'm concerned about the exercise station put directly behind my house . Can u please move it to a different location not blocking my view? There are also trees or bushes added to the map behind the exercise station that

may also block my view. You are welcome to come to my house, and I can show you what I can see from my windows. I don't have a problem with anything else as long as it is not blocking my very expensive view. thanks much.

As residents of Virginia Drive, we overlook the wildlife preserve that belonged to the Sanitation District. We are shocked that the preliminary design would propose putting any structures (pickleball, tennis, bathrooms etc.) over what was previously a wildlife preserve. It seems to us that a natural view and peaceful setting should be maintained for the homeowners across the street for example with picnic areas, sitting areas, soft landscaping, a natural-themed playground, or a dog park. The natural element of the preserve should remain and any structures should be built closer to the existing structures, further down and out of sight. We thought as homeowners our natural views would be protected by the town.

We would be happy to share the view from our home with the consultants who are coming up with this plan to provide more context. To our knowledge, we are not aware that they approached anyone on our street when they came up with the preliminary design.

One thing we were pleased to see in the preliminary design is that it removes the dangerous accident-prone curve out of the bike path that is also in our view. We have seen many collisions and spills on the existing curve and we are happy to see that the preliminary design will help preserve tears of young children crying.

We hope this can be a topic of discussion in the meeting tonight.

This selfish proposal is totally insensitive to neighbors of Blackie's Pasture and will have horrendous negative impacts on them. The proposal will generate a huge increase in traffic. The Blackie's Pasture parking lot already is too small to handle the existing number of cars. The proposed ""outdoor amphitheater"" will generate unacceptably high noise levels, especially if allowed to be used as a ""concert venue,"" no matter what purported ""mitigation"" measures are proposed. The same problems will result from both the proposed ""sports field"" and the proposed ""swimming pool complex."" Any single component of this plan will have a huge negative impact on the nearby community. If more than one of the components is implemented, the impact will be multiplied several fold. My wife and I will vote AGAINST any and all members of the Town Council who support this bloated, selfish, insensitive, and totally misguided plan. P.S. An ""environmental education center"" and remodeling of the Blackie's Pasture bathrooms would have far less negative impacts and are not objectionable.

We are appalled to learn about this proposed project & oppose it. Has no one considered parking, noise & congestion for people living in proximity of Blackie's Pasture & that this will devalue their home values. Blackie's Pasture has traditionally been open space with a soccer field that many people have enjoyed over the years. There has been a small amount of fundraisers including bands over the years that have resulted in occasional calls to the police for music continuing past its designated time. It shouldn't become a recreational park with large crowds & outdoor vendors which takes away from the original concept of Blackie's Pasture. This is not a well thought out plan & truly only benefits people who don't live in the vicinity. This proposed plan will not generate that much revenue for the town of Tiburon & truly only creates much nuisance for many locals.

Please NO ARTIFICIAL TURF in our beloved Tiburon in any of our parks. Crazy amounts of water needed to cleanse them, and they are neither kid nor dog friendly.

I've seen the daily maintenance it takes in San Francisco to keep even a small dog park with artificial turf clean.""

Blackie's Pasture doesn't need any improvements. No more buildings such as amphitheaters or swimming complexes. We need open, green space. More concrete is not the solution.

I use Blackie's Pasture regularly like so many others, appreciate its openness and lack of commercialism. It is a beautiful natural open space and I oppose any new construction that goes beyond the footprint of buildings already in the space.

Beyond my primary priority of as much walk/run/cycle trail mileage as possible, I heard that beach/sand volleyball courts are proposed as part of the Town of Tiburon Master Parks & Recreation plan. I wholeheartedly support this and encourage the town to make these a high priority. Adding sand volleyball courts to the McKegney Field/Blackie's Pasture area would be a fantastic new addition to Tiburon's outdoor recreation and would be a low noise, low environmental impact and all-age recreational activity. The addition of beach volleyball courts would also bring important revenue to the town's local businesses.

I sent you an email yesterday with a letter in support of sand/beach volleyball courts. Thank you for your consideration.

I've been following the Tiburon Parks & Rec Master Plan and have vested interest as my family lives very close to the spaces under discussion (we live just off Stewart Drive). We've lived here for over a decade, and have kids 5 & 7 years old at RUSD. We are very excited!!

I wanted to reach out to offer a suggestion for pattern matching with what has been accomplished with Tunnel Tops in the Presidio, SF. It's similar waterfront, mile-long walking path incorporating natural elements to create space for parks (called Outpost), walking paths with natural elements like stones, boulders, native plants & flowers, even a Field Station for education & to help build community.

I was curious if this Tunnel Tops Presidio project right across the GG bridge has already been reviewed? If not, I'd love to share more about why it's so special, what we can learn from it, and/or be helpful finding someone from this Tunnel Tops project to consult with us.

A Community Garden would be terrific. Mill Valley has one at Hauke Park and it works well. It is surrounded by fencing so animals and poachers can't get in. As food gets more expensive, and people need to grow their own because transportation systems are interrupted, and drought and flooding have affected agricultural areas, every piece of available land to grow food will be critical. Why not be an example of how to adapt for the future with a beautiful Community Garden. Water for irrigation would have to be available. Marin Master Gardeners could advise you, of course.

I look forward to seeing how Tiburon uses the new open space.

We agree there needs to be improved parks for children/teens in locations that provide parking lots and bathrooms. Cypress Hollow park was designed as a local walking access park. Congestion on the streets with large groups is dangerous and large parties should require signups and fees or limited to 10 people max. Restrictions for parking in designated spots is needed so that emergency vehicles can access the neighborhood at all times.

Please plant many more Coast Redwoods!

I would like to see the par course return to the waterfront. I used to enjoy the various stations when I first moved here in over 20 years ago. Adults and teens need ""play structures"" as well. I enjoy the one in Strawberry near Ricardo and Seminary."

I've been a homeowner on Blackfield Dr. for over 35 years. The Bel Aire neighborhood was developed by William Blackfield (hence Blackfield Dr), and the streets are named after Blackfield's wife and kids. William Blackfield

deeded the central vacant lot to the neighborhood in perpetuity to be enjoyed as an undeveloped area for multi passive use. Over the years, the lot has been used for playing catch, kite flying, informal softball/soccer, birthday parties, Easter egg hunts, etc.

The Blackfield family attended many of the block parties we had in the 1980's and 1990's and spoke about our neighborhood and how the wonderful vacant lot is, as it gives kids and adults of all ages a multi-use place to use as needed.

I have seen the proposed ideas for improvement. The point is that this area needs to remain public open space for multi-use as intended and deeded by William Blackfield.

A proposed paved path would bisect the lot and destroy the multi-use capacity of the area. This is not needed and would limit the use of this open space.

A proposed walkway around the perimeter is not needed as well. It would also limit the full use of the space.

This area does not need new drainage. It already has drainage at the south end that works well when needed.

I served as chair of the Tiburon Parks and Open Space Commission for 15 years, so I'm well aware of the history of this public multi-use lot.

I also think dog owners need to know that this isn't a dog park, but an open space park for everyone.

We lost two necklaces on McKegney field. Both gold. One had a small snake in the middle and the other had these pink stones in the front of the necklace (about 1/3 of the total necklace). They were lost about 2 weeks ago.

I would like to recommend that the park (dog park) at the bottom of Lyford Drive be fenced. I have never seen anyone use the park except dog owners. If the area is considered a dog park, it would be much safer for our furry friends if it could be fenced. I know of several dogs, including my own, who have run into the street and I don't take my dog there anymore because I don't think it's safe.

My idea is:

I have lived in Marin long enough to remember when Larkspur Landing was basically an empty space. It is now a vibrant destination. One of the things the developer did to attract visitors was to promote a food truck and live music schedule.

I realize they are a mall and we are a residential community but I think it would be fun to have live music and a couple of food trucks once a month in the summer on the field by the statue. I think it might even attract people from the city who might be encouraged to bring their bikes on the ferry and ride to Blackies and make a day of it. Our downtown could benefit from this as well.

Just some thoughts!

We've noticed both adults and kids not having enough space in Piper Park (Larkspur) to play beach because the courts are frequently filled up. It'd be great to have 2-3 courts locally here in Tiburon. My daughter

would like to submit her recommendation to the town. is the best way to do that an email to David Eshoo OR would you recommend something different? thanks so much. With the growing popularity of beach volleyball here in town/Marin, opportunity for increased revenue for the town through reservations and appeal to both adults and kids, we'd love to see this come to fruition! tx so much

Please consider installing a set of traveling rings as part of the Linear Park design. Our family used the ones in Santa Monica when we lived there and they are fun and a great way to be active and get exercise.

I have sent in my responses earlier, but I recently found out that the old walking paths from street to street up the hill to the Martha Property are actually city property, and so could fall under the new Master Plan. We regularly use the ones that are open, but some homeowners have closed off the access to their sections. Please look into getting those reopened. That would be SOOO much better than walking with the cars! Thank you!

We use three parks often. Cypress Hollow is in our neighborhood, and in the mornings we use it as a dog park. We've lived here 24 years and while the grass wasn't great, there was grass. Now it is just dirt and weeds, and the only control on the weeds seems to be the gophers. Could we at least weed wack the weeds? With the tree branches trimmed high note, grass should do well here but there needs to be some serious preparation for it. Anyway my suggestion is to prepare and sod cypress hollow park as a first priority, for kids, dogs, to prevent soil erosion and for sanitary reasons.

The so called Meadow is a wonderful space, well used by dogs and their owners. Just keep it mowed.

And Blackies is a treasure- no suggestions there.

I would like to advocate for the restoration of the several existing walking trails in Tiburon. Our neighboring community in Belvedere and others have viewed walking paths in their built up areas to be a major asset and are directly supported by their recreation committees. In Tiburon we have several public paths in my area of Hillhaven that have great potential but have been ignored by the Town of Tiburon , so have become blocked or otherwise unusable by the public. In maps of the Hillhaven subdivision held by the Town, walking pathways (called 'lanes') are designated to allow public walking access away from roads to different parts of Hillhaven. For example from downtown Tiburon up to the edge of the Martha property. Such lanes have a land value of several million dollars using an average price per sq ft applicable to Tiburon land and could become a superb recreational asset if your work were to include advocacy for the work needed to repair and open them up for public use. There are enormous added benefits including emergency and fire egress (strongly supported by the Tiburon fire Chief). At previous Hillhaven community meetings there have been majorities in favor of opening these trails. However to date this support has not translated into the work and relatively little funding needed.

I have been in touch with the Town on this topic before but unfortunately have not been able to schedule time to join public meetings arranged by yourselves.

I would much appreciate your thoughts on this topic and I am happy to provide more information and detail

1) Please allow dogs on McKegney field during non-game hours. This park is unused about 80% of the time I visit. I have a dog (Loaf) and in order to get to well-maintained grass she can run on, we have to walk about an hour each way to get to the second field at Blackie's. This is also because there is no crosswalk to blackies near Reed Ranch Road. It would be super helpful to at least allow a section for dogs.

2. Please allow better access by bike and pedestrians to get to parks (see above). As someone who grew up in Tiburon, it was hard getting anywhere without a car - being able to access by bike would really improve young (and people unable to drive/without car access).
3. Please maintain grass/trail better at Jefferson drive field. This space could be really improved to be a nice sitting/dog playing/pedestrian access
4. More park areas would be great, even if they're small (like the Jefferson dr one)

Thanks for your work improving the parks!

A municipal pool!! Percentage wise a vast majority of 94920 residents do not belong to a private swim club. With the town now owning the old ponds it's time to build an aquatics facility for Tiburon and Belvedere residents.

Even among young families enrolled in RUSD, only roughly 20% of families are members of a private tennis club. Swimming is an essential life skill and an aquatics facility is great for all demographics unlike many other proposed projects that are for very specific ages and physical abilities. Please seriously consider a municipal aquatics facility for 94920!!

Regarding the grassy field area inside Claire Way in the Belair neighborhood. Please improve this green area located between Claire Way in the Belair neighborhood to serve our community better. Please include benches and picnic tables and shade trees and small play structures for young kids to safely play in. It will improve this green space by making it more inviting for neighbors to gather and meet one another and in turn build friendships and a sense of community. It has been under resourced for decades and that is a shame.

It would be lovely to have a bouldering wall in the town as park of an outdoor adventure space. The outdoor adventure space could have an outdoor racquetball court for the racquet sport lovers in town.

Our family loves the Tiburon Park. There is one thing we hope the Committee will consider. It would be great if we could build an outdoor fitness court similar to what has been built at the Marina Green. I have attached the link below of the fitness court at the Marina Green.

We feel this would be welcomed by teenagers to adults throughout Tiburon and Belvedere (unfortunately, we don't have space in Belvedere for something like this). It will hopefully bring more neighbors to spend time in our beautiful park.

For example, my son comes back every so often from college to visit for the holidays. He exercises religiously, but he cannot afford to join a gym since he is a college student. He would love to have a free fitness court where he could do his run and then a workout.

Similarly, I run along the paths of Tiburon Park five days a week. I would very much like to have the outdoor fitness court where I could do some upper body work to complement my run. I am not an avid gym rat so I don't need a gym membership. But to be able to do a few exercises each time I go for a run around Blackie's Pasture, McKegney Green, etc would be fantastic.

Our entire family feels that this would be a great addition to Tiburon Park and will bring more people from our community to use it more regularly. We hope you feel the same.

Adding a skatepark alongside the existing parks would be a fantastic idea for the community. I believe that it would give kids the opportunity to skateboard and scooter, thus encouraging them to spend more time outdoors rather than playing video games all day. I appreciate you considering this suggestion. Thank you.

Tiburon visionaries years ago preserved the area known as the rail trail and Blackies Pasture for open space to enjoy and be close to the water and views. Almost every day, pleasant enough, the main parking lot is full, and on weekends it's packed. A lot of people will never have the ability to hike the Martha property open space. Please don't turn this one piece of ""open space"" accessible to all into an amusement park. Supporting and maintaining the existing activities would keep this beautiful gem.

First off, thank you for all the work you have done to make our town so beautiful, accessible and enjoyable for all.

Second, we would love to contribute our hopes and priorities for the lineal park/Blackie's pasture area. We moved to this house, which opens onto the Tiburon bike path, mainly for its proximity to nature. We treasure the fact that we can take our young daughter out for a walk and observe an incredible array of migrating shorebirds, including endangered species, mallard ducks, meadowlarks, rays, and seals. We notice many other people enjoying the peace that comes from getting in touch with nature and taking a moment away from hectic modern life.

We feel that adding more built structures such as an indoor rec center or pickleball center, with additional parking and driving access along the bike bath, would significantly change the character of the area for the worse. Instead of offering a place where people can find peace, get in touch with nature, and learn about this incredibly vital and unique Audobon bird sanctuary, it would put the focus on indoor activities, cars, and concrete. Children already spend the vast majority of their days indoors doing highly structured activities, and research shows that they benefit from opportunities for child-led free play outdoors, particularly in nature. Tiburon should continue to provide these opportunities in its parks.

Ideas that we like include: increased signage to indicate things like on and off-leash dog areas and protected bird nesting areas, additional workout stations, and beautifying the sanitary ponds area. What if these ponds could become a botanical garden, or a beautiful pond that would continue to draw wildlife such as nesting ducks and egrets for children to observe?

Hello! Appreciate all of the work you are doing to consider the parks and recreation space in Tiburon. As a mom of two small kids living in the Bel Aire neighborhood, I am extremely interested in what possibilities there are for the open field space off Karen Way. Right now it is an often overgrown field that doesn't feel like it's living up to its potential. I'd love to see a playground incorporated into the space, or perhaps even a paved/gravel/woodchip trail through the middle with an area off to one corner with wood chips and picnic tables. This would allow for more of our community to come together and interact in a safe space, while also allowing people to walk through the space safely. For those who like to use it as a dog run, there is still plenty of space for that as well. I think there are a lot of options to get creative with this space while also minimizing costs if need be. A playground would be especially helpful as kids from the neighborhood could ride their bikes or walk to this space. It is hard for my 2-year-old to ride up the two hills to get to Cypress Hollow Park, which means I then have to drive up there and park. I'm sure those neighbors would appreciate an alternate option for those of us living on Blackfield/Karen/Cecilia/Leland/Claire. Greatly appreciate the consideration and I'm happy to provide more input, if helpful. Thank you for all you are doing!

I hope you are well. Thank you for your time and commitment to enhancing the Tiburon community. I had the opportunity to review the plan and wanted to share some observations.

For context, I think we all agree that Tiburon is fundamentally a residential community. The residents that use the park grounds day-to-day are families/caregivers with small children and work-from-home/retired residents of

Tiburon. Everyone else in Tiburon is either at work or in school during the day. I think it is helpful keeping this context in mind when allocating time and resources to particular areas and features.

The recent enhancement to the Belvedere Park playground is a perfect example of an improvement where it matters most as evidenced by the children and families that frequent the park everyday.

In the plan, however, "teen hang", "skate park", "volleyball and pickleball courts", "art installations" may have significant detrimental outcomes that undermine the community's interests and park enhancement objectives. Keeping the aforementioned day-to-day residents in mind, these types of suggestions create venues and facilities for NON-Tiburon residents at the expense of Tiburon residents - which is not in the community's interests. The other issue I see with these types of facilities is that it increases the daily traffic from non-residents which will result in more noise and loitering in areas which are currently very tranquil and beautiful.

Generally speaking, I think allocating the community's physical and financial resources to the day-to-day resident profile will serve our collective interests the most and bolster what attracts people to live here - a beautiful, peaceful place for families to live. Apologies if I missed anything in the Master Plan objectives and I am happy to speak with you in person to further the dialogue and help anyway I can.

I would love to see shaded areas to sit near Harvey's Garden and the water. In the summer, it can get quite warm and there is no escape from the heat.

I am a resident of Tiburon. The Belveron Mini Park joins the back of our property. I think the area is wild and needs some management to contain the invasive growth. Please look into planting trees that would provide shade, protection from the fierce winter wind and stop or slow down the growth of invasive plants. Trees would also create a serene natural setting for a hike and bike trail loop. A trail can be made for learning bike skills and gaining strength. It doesn't need to be a "pump track" just a trail with humps and a couple of switchback turns.

I love all the ideas for the Old Rail Trail and Blackies Pasture. I think activities for middle school kids could be scattered around. A climbing wall, tetherball, 4 square court, basketball, etc.. where people could bring their own balls if need be.

If a new playground is built anywhere in Tiburon please make it be unique. I saw the new playground structure across from Chrissy Field. They used driftwood or at least something that made it look very natural.

As for a place to paddle or swim from, I think the whole area around Blackies Pasture is too shallow. It would need to be dredged.

That's all for now... I think the plan is shaping up to be something great for generations to come. We need to think deeply especially since we have such limited space.

My husband, daughter and I live in a house adjacent the Tiburon bike path and are just catching up on all the proposed ideas for the lineal park development. Are you still taking feedback from residents? If so, is email the best way to do that?

I am writing to ask that Tiburon incorporate Pickleball courts in its new Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Hundreds of residents play pickleball. Hundreds. And we play 3-4 times a week.

Pickleball builds community ties unlike any other activity I've witnessed in the almost 30 years I've lived here. We play together and we have built strong bonds. These bonds go way beyond pickleball. We support community members who are ill, need transportation, or need pet sitting, or just about anything else.

Most of us have to drive elsewhere to play--clogging up traffic on the one road in and out of here.

Its time we build a recreational facility to support our community rather than assuming everyone can join expensive clubs or drive to other towns to exercise. (Heck, TPC has a \$28K initiation fee and a five year waitlist!)

This is a great opportunity for Tiburon and many of us stand ready to help make the vision of a real multi-purpose recreational facility come to life.

Let's do this! If we do, we'll be that much closer to becoming a Blue Zone community.

I'd like to put in a word in favor of the idea of building some pickle ball courts in Tiburon. My dad put in a pickleball court at their summer place in Washington state in 1984 and it was the site of many wonderful parties, tournaments, etc. We need more ways to bring the community together and what's better than a racquet game that can be played and enjoyed by all ages? From what I understand there are quieter paddles/balls available, so people need to be encouraged to use that type of equipment. End of story. Build it and they will come.

I strongly support adding six dedicated pickleball courts to the Tiburon Community. I have either resided or owned property in the Tiburon Peninsula for my entire life, some 62 years! I am also a former ranked junior and collegiate tennis player who has whole-heartedly embraced transitioning to pickleball. Pickleball is a great way to stay active and fit, and it creates community. Who wouldn't want any of those things where they live?

Six courts approximately cover the space for two to two-and-one-half tennis courts. It's not massive by any means, but at 6 courts its scale is meaningful enough to create a community. Six pickleball courts can serve three times the amount of people when compared to two tennis courts. That's quite a benefit and very efficient space utilization.

I understand that a possible site is the sanitary district adjacent to Blackie's Pasture. That's an excellent choice., The anticipated noise created by pickleball would likely be completely mitigated by the traffic noise along Tiburon Boulevard. If there are better site options, I'd support those too.

Please include pickleball courts in the master plan. This wonderful sport is inclusive, approachable and spans age groups providing a wonderful asset to the health and well being of our community. Other Marin cities have embraced Pickleball - please join them!!

My thoughts are that the Tiburon community would be delighted to have a 6 court pickleball facility. When we moved to Santa Rosa in 2011, pickleball had just started on 2 tennis courts, cross striped for pickleball, in the Town of Windsor. Having played in our former Virginia community, we helped grow the sport there. In the following years, we were pleased to promote and support courts' development in Cloverdale, Healdsburg, Santa Rosa, Occidental, Sebastopol, Guerneville, Rohnert Park and Petaluma. Working with city government to increase the courts' popularity has been a rewarding experience. Many times, city officials came out to watch or play pickleball, learning the sport's appeal firsthand.

Park in Larkspur). To the extent that the courts are a draw for non-Tiburon residents, this could be a boon to local businesses as people coming to the area might stay for lunch or shopping.

It would be a huge plus for so many Tiburon residents...not only to be able to play the sport itself, but also to improve the overall quality of life with new friends.

I fully support the plan for the addition of the Pickleball courts in Tiburon.

Would love the town to consider the installation of pickleball courts for the community. This is a growing sport which can be played and enjoyed by all ages. Since playing for the past three years I have played with teenagers, those in mid-life and those considered ""elderly"" and I have made so many new friendships and met so many people I never would have. My life has been enriched tremendously and I love that the much ignored older generation could have some space dedicated to something they can actively engage in. Our aging population should be considered just as much as our young soccer, baseball and lacrosse players.

Hi, While I live in East Corte Madera, much of our leisure time is on the peninsula with old school parent friends. Pickleball is one of the sports we are still able to easily do with them. It also increases ones network of friends. More courts are always better - especially ones with a bit of wind/weather protection. Thank you for reading!

As mentioned, I am with American Ramp Company, we design and build skateparks, bike parks, and pump tracks across the country. Our team is currently working with Marin County on an asphalt pump track, and our construction team is wrapping up a concrete skatepark over in American Canyon. We have been working on a lot of these projects in the Bay area so it is no surprise there has been some interest from the community for a facility like this.

I will be in the area next week meeting with some of your neighboring cities and going on site walks. I would be happy to meet with you or your team if you have any questions about these types of facilities.

6 dedicated pickleball courts

It would be incredible to have six dedicated pickleball courts incorporated into this plan, as the sport is growing immensely in popularity. And it spans many different ages. I think it's a wonderful sport for the community. You just need to be mindful of where you place them in terms of wind (or add weatherproof fences). Or maybe have an indoor facility that is covered, so residents can enjoy it year round!

Love all the ideas. For the playground at Shoreline Park by the ferry, I think you'd need a small fence around it to keep all the dogs off the leash out as well as keeping kids from running in the street. We have lots of fun taking our kids in that area, and the main struggles as a parent are that there are a lot of off leash dogs and cars that are not paying attention to cross walks, etc. A natural kind of park could be nice too to go with the pretty view! Fun idea too for parents who may be waiting for a table or trying to kill time before a ferry or a fireworks show or even just a fun place to get ice cream and go to.

I was just accidentally kicked out of the 2/29 Zoom meeting, while the administrators were trying to move me to the Bel Aire breakout room -- and now I'm unable to log back in. My main thoughts on Bel Aire: a designated play/picnic area and a designated dog area. The play/picnic area could be very simple -- a swing set and a shaded picnic table. Either the dog or play/picnic area should be fenced in, to prevent dangerous encounters between dogs and kids. Thank you!

The Bel Aire Play area should remain as it is. A play structure, whether for smaller or older children is not feasible because of the large storm drain pipe that runs down the center of the area. Any structure would need to be pushed to the edges and impinge on surrounding homeowner's privacy and noise levels. There are close play structures at Bel Aire school, Cypress Hollow playground and Strawberry Point school, making the need for a playstructure, unnecessary as RUSD has demographics predicting decreased enrollment. BA Park is in a dense neighborhood of one car garages, making parking difficult. Bel Aire enjoy the open use of an off street play area with room for baseball, soccer and dog play. A previous attempt by non Bel Aire Tiburon residents to gate the entry way was objected to by Bel Aire homeowners. The push for the play structure seems to be coming from Cypress Hollow, a less dense neighborhood with plenty of on street parking, and no storm drain pipe running right through the middle of the park. Leave Bel Aire park alone.

I would like to advocate that this initiative by Tiburonparks.com includes restoring existing trails on public land in Tiburon so they become usable. Communities like Belvedere benefit hugely from their walking trail network. Yet Tiburon has public land (worth by some estimates millions of dollars) that was provided for trail use but is now overgrown and inaccessible for public use. I recommend that part of our plan is to restore and make use of this

existing public asset. The benefits in terms of health, pollution reduction, road safety, fire escape routes and children getting outside safely are immeasurable.

The Town of Tiburon knows all these trails and I can list many of them - they link different parts of Tiburon - and with relatively little expense could be cleared and upgraded to become safe walking paths for daily use by the community.

I am sorry I could not attend your February meeting to make these points in person and pass on the significant community support I have seen when the issue has been raised at my local Hillhaven homeowner meetings - and in discussion with our Fire Department

For the safety and respect for the human residents of Tiburon, I strongly suggest that signage be posted where dogs are allowed off leash and where they are required to be on leash. And, it would be most helpful if the leashed areas were patrolled & enforced often enough for dog owners to pay attention to the signs. Unleashed dogs are so frequently encountered that they are becoming a nuisance.

I think we should take a look at what Sausalito Rec. Dept. has accomplished to create community events. There's a list of approx. 10 events that bring the community together, many of which are located in one of Sausalito's parks.

Please let me know how I can get more involved with the planning and ground work.

What is the status of private open space? Is it supposed to be available for public access? If so, why isn't there signage indicating where and how to access these open spaces?

Also, there is a trail easement from the top of Mateo Drive to the Ring Mountain preserve that should be indicated on the map of trails. It runs between the residence at the top of Peligrinelli Drive and the residence at the end of Taylor Road. Years ago, the Town required the owner of the property at the end of Taylor Road to move a fence that was blocking the easement. I don't know if maintenance of it is considered the responsibility of the Town or of the local residents.

I noticed that barbeques are not allowed at Blacky's Pasture which I don't understand as the Parks Dept should provide a barbeque at each picnic table as is provided at Paradise Park.

Executive Summary

Overview

ETC Institute administered a needs assessment survey for the Town of Tiburon during the summer months of 2023. The survey will help determine parks and recreation priorities for the community.

Methodology

ETC Institute mailed a survey packet to a random sample of households in Tiburon. Each survey packet contained a cover letter, a copy of the survey, and a postage-paid return envelope. Residents who received the survey were given the option of returning the survey by mail or completing it online at *TiburonSurvey.org*.

After the surveys were mailed, ETC Institute followed up with residents to encourage participation. To prevent people who were not residents of Tiburon from participating, everyone who completed the survey online was required to enter their home address prior to submitting the survey. ETC Institute then matched the addresses that were entered online with the addresses that were originally selected for the random sample. If the address from a survey completed online did not match one of the addresses selected for the sample, the online survey was not included in the final database for this report.

The goal was to collect a minimum of 250 completed surveys from residents. The goal was exceeded with 407 completed surveys collected. The overall results for the sample of 407 households have a precision of at least ± 4.6 at the 95% level of confidence.

The major findings of the survey are summarized in the following pages.

Town of Tiburon Parks and Recreation Facilities Use

Use Overview. Respondents were provided with a list of 18 Tiburon parks and recreation facilities and asked to select all the locations their household had visited within the last year. The highest percentage of respondents (87%) report visiting Blackies Pasture followed by the Old Rail Trail (79%), the library (72%), and open space trails (68%).

Satisfaction and Investment. Respondents who had visited the park/facility were then asked to rate their overall satisfaction. Respondents were most satisfied (rating “satisfied” or “very satisfied”) with the library (98%), Shoreline Park (97%), and McKegney Green (97%). Each of the parks/facilities received mostly satisfactory ratings. Respondents were then asked to select three parks/facilities they believe should receive the most attention from the town over the next two years. Blackies Pasture (52%), the Old Rail Trail (36%), and open space trails (30%) were the three items selected most often.

Barriers to Use. Respondents were asked to select all the reasons that prevent their household from using parks/facilities more often. Not being aware of the park or trail locations (31%), lack of desired features (20%), and lack of parking to access parks/trails (17%) were the three barriers most often selected by respondents.

Open Space Improvements. Respondents were asked to select all the potential improvements that would make open spaces more attractive for use. Restrooms (45%), water fountains/refill stations (41%), and trailhead and wayfinding signage (40%) were the three items selected most often.

Recreation Programs/Activities Participation

Participation Overview. Twenty-five percent (25%) of respondents report participating in recreation programs/activities offered by the Belvedere Tiburon Joint Recreation Committee (The Ranch) over the past year. Of those respondents who participated, the highest percentage of respondents (38%) report participating in one program followed by 31% participating in 2-3 programs.

Satisfaction with Programs/Activities. Most respondents (79%) who participated in programs at The Ranch rated their overall satisfaction as either excellent (34%) or good (45%).

Organizations Used. Respondents were asked to select all of the organizations their household had used for programs/activities over the past year. Private clubs (48%), the Town of Tiburon (48%), and Marion County (43%) were the three organizations used most.

Communication Methods. Respondents most often report learning about The Ranch’s recreation programs and activities via the Ark/IJ Newspaper (47%), emails from The Ranch (29%), or the town weekly newsletter (Tiburon Talk) (28%). These are also the three communication methods respondents would most prefer the town use to communicate with them.

Overall Importance. Most respondents (91%) say it is either very important (71%) or somewhat important (20%) for the Town of Tiburon to provide high quality parks, recreation facilities, and programs.

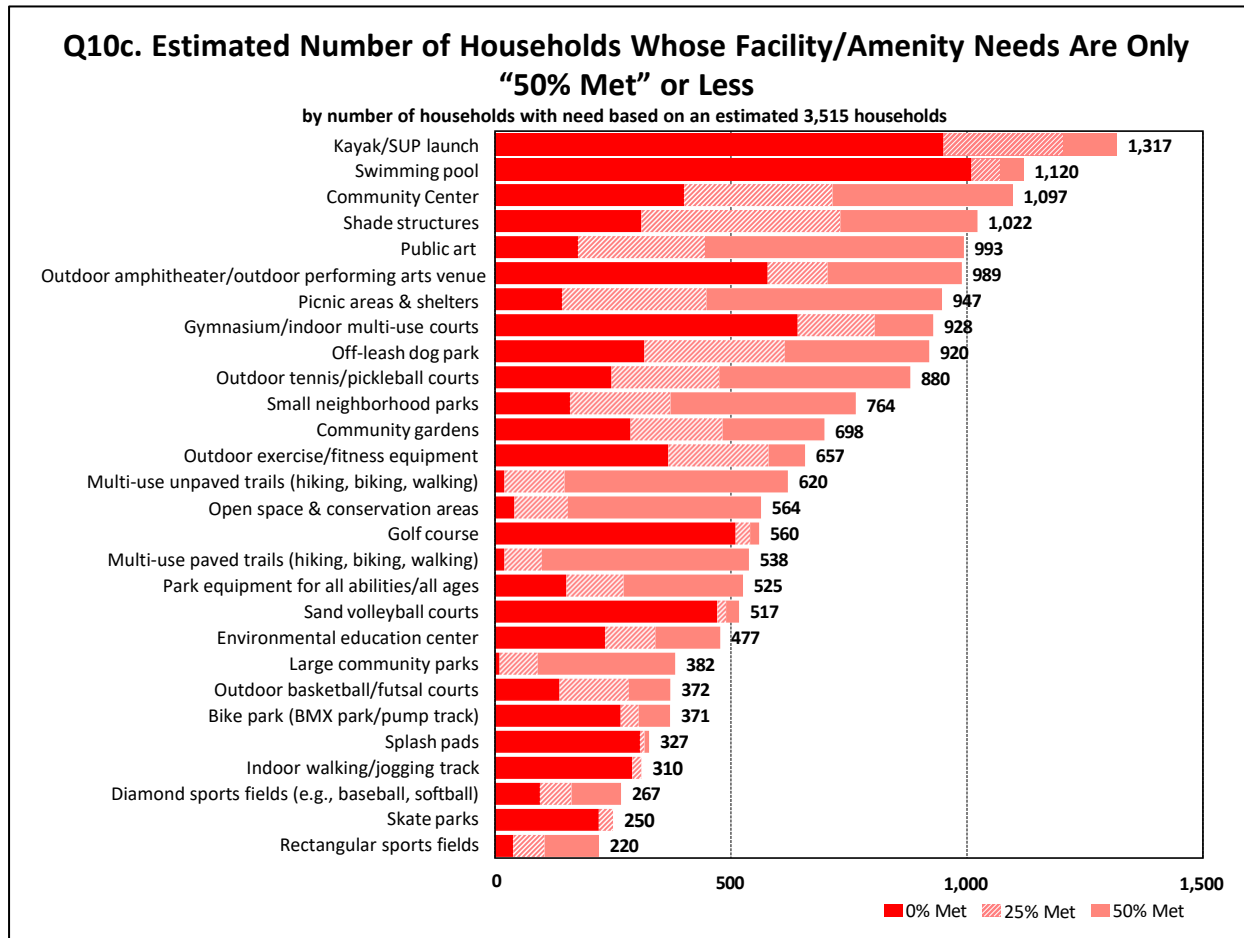
Parks and Recreation Facilities/Amenities Needs and Priorities

Amenity/Facility Needs: Respondents were asked to identify if their household had a need for 28 facilities/amenities and to rate how well their needs for each were currently being met. Based on this analysis, ETC Institute was able to estimate the number of households in the community that had the greatest “unmet” need for various facilities/amenities.

The three parks/facilities with the highest percentage of households that have an unmet need:

1. Kayak/SUP launch – 1,317 households
2. Swimming pool – 1,120 households
3. Community Center – 1,097 households

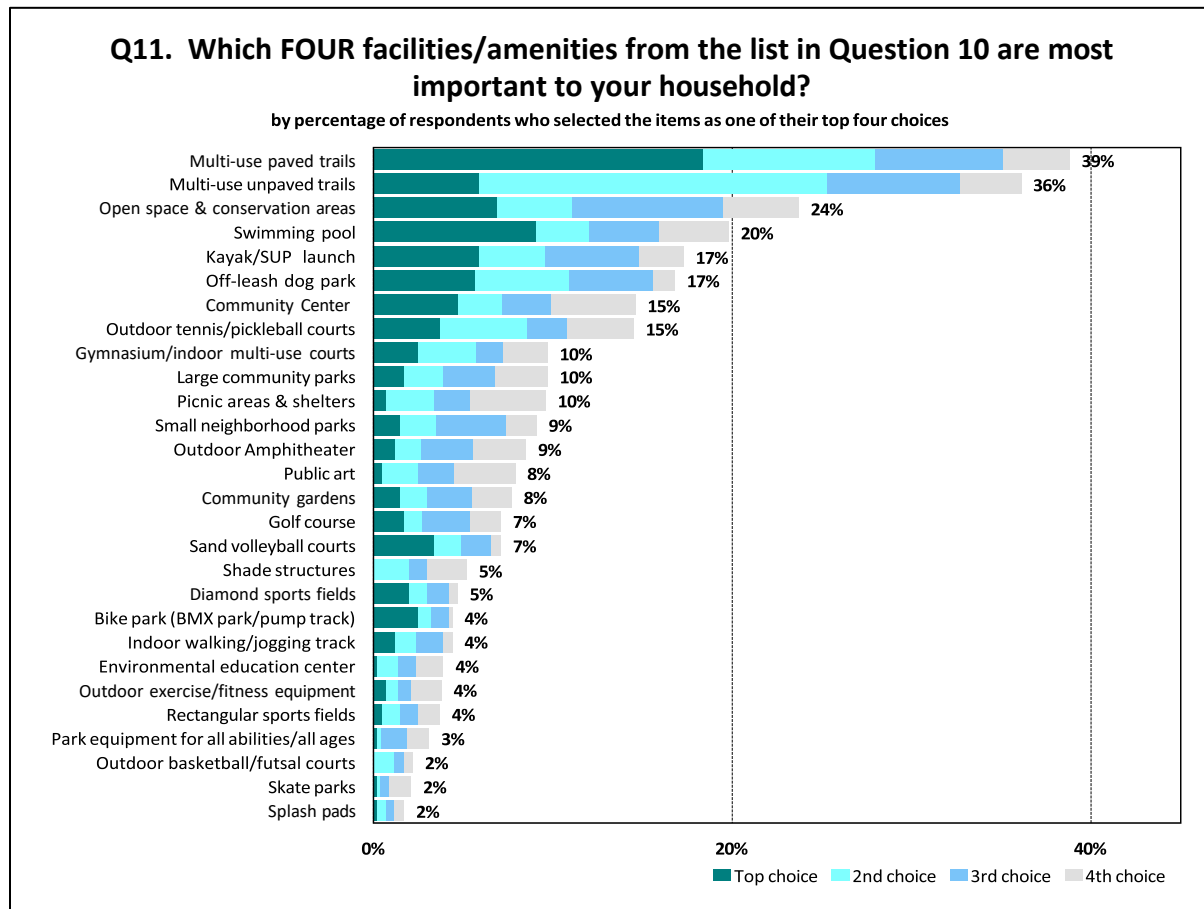
The estimated number of households that have unmet needs for each of the 28 facilities/amenities assessed is shown in the chart below.



Amenities/Facilities Importance: In addition to assessing the needs for each amenity/facility, ETC Institute also assessed the importance that residents placed on each item. Based on the sum of respondents' top four choices, these were the four amenities/facilities ranked most important to residents:

1. Multi-use paved trails (39%)
2. Multi-use unpaved trails (36%)
3. Open space and conservation areas (24%)
4. Swimming pool (20%)

The percentage of residents who selected each amenity/facility as one of their top four choices is shown in the chart below.

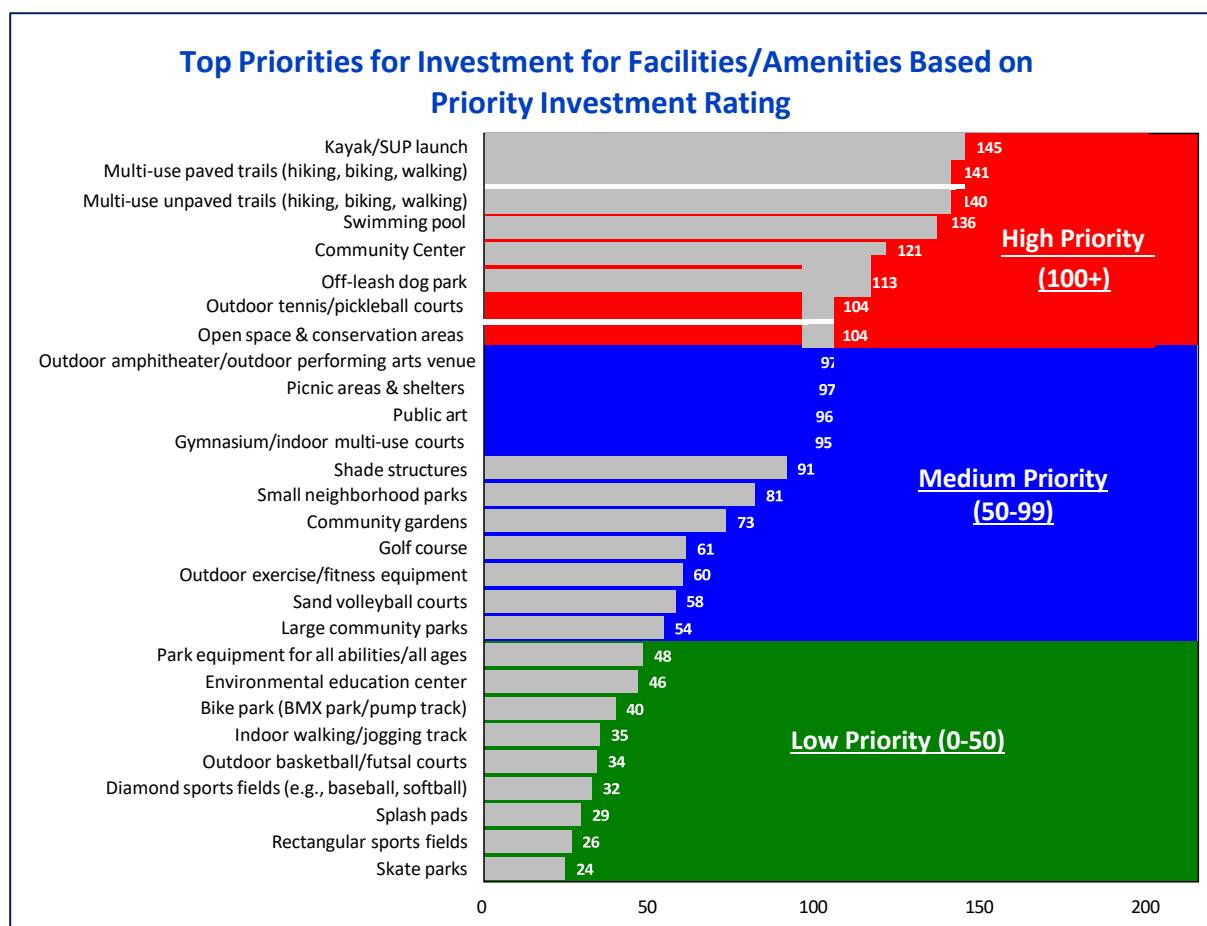


Priorities for Facility Investments: The **Priority Investment Rating (PIR)** was developed by ETC Institute to provide organizations with an objective tool for evaluating the priority that should be placed on recreation and parks investments. The Priority Investment Rating (PIR) equally weighs (1) the importance that residents place on amenities/facilities and (2) how many residents have unmet needs for the amenity/facility. [Details regarding the methodology for this analysis are provided in Section 3 of this report.]

Based the Priority Investment Rating (PIR), the following amenities/facilities were rated as high priorities for investment:

- Kayak/SUP launch (PIR=145)
- Multi-use paved trails (PIR=141)
- Multi-use unpaved trails (PIR=140)

- Community center (PIR=121)
- Off-leash dog park (PIR=113)
- Outdoor tennis/pickleball courts (PIR=104)
- Open space & conservation areas (PIR=104)

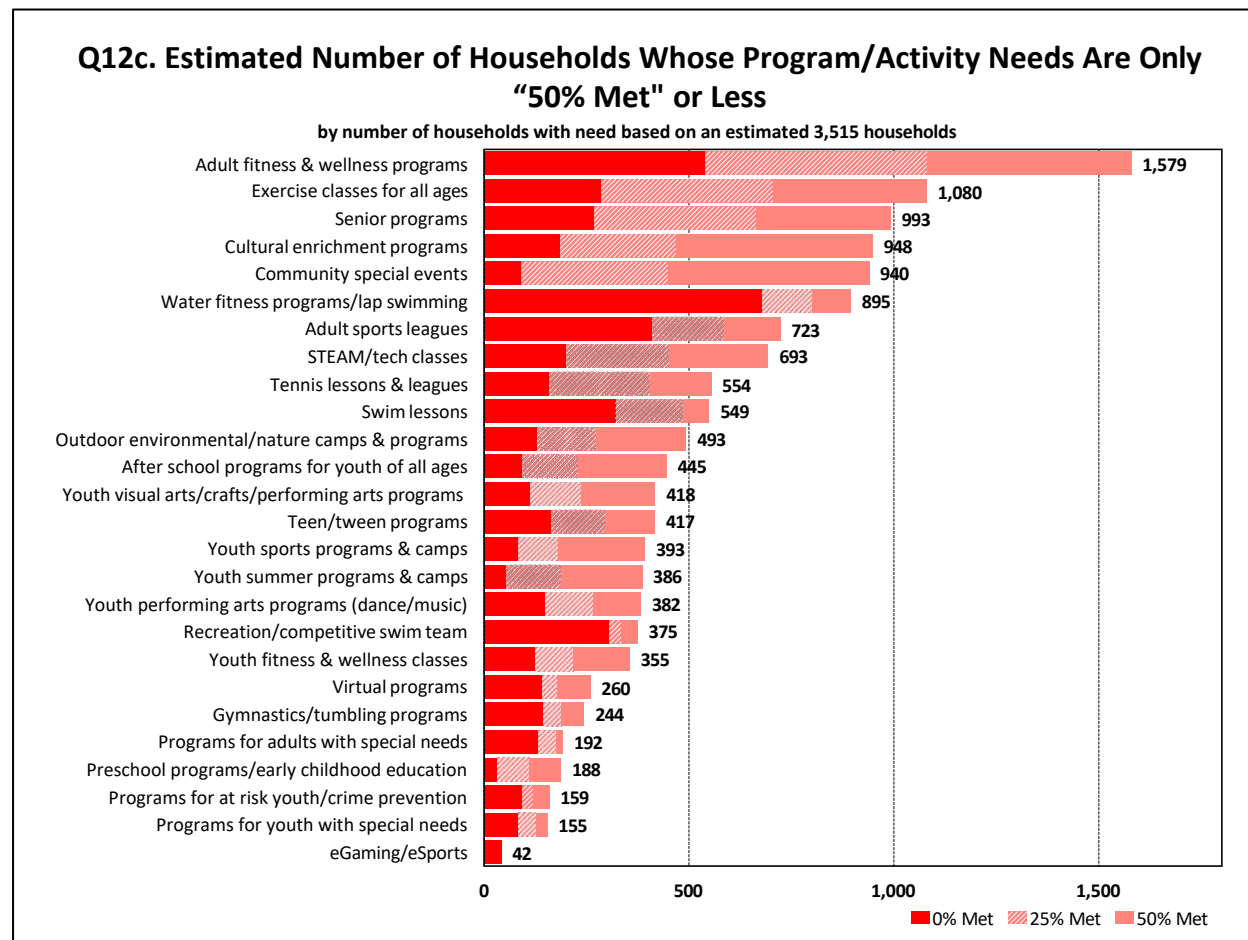
Recreation Program/Activity Needs and Priorities

Activity/Program Needs: Respondents were asked to identify if their household had a need for 26 activities/programs and to rate how well their needs for each were currently being met. Based on this analysis, ETC Institute was able to estimate the number of households in the community that had the greatest “unmet” need for various activities/programs.

The three activities/programs with the highest percentage of households that have an unmet need:

1. Adult fitness and wellness programs – 1,579 households
2. Exercise classes for all ages – 1,080 households
3. Senior programs – 993 households

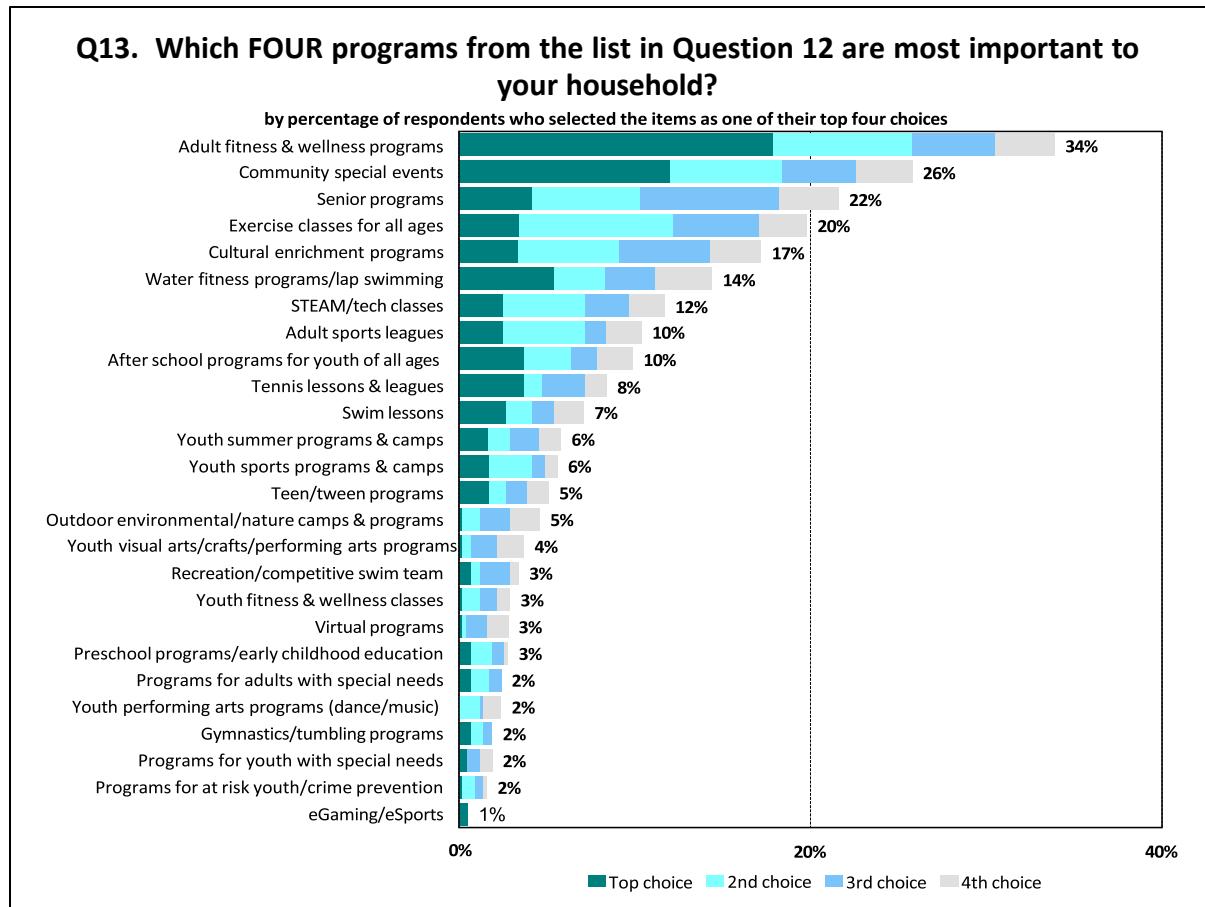

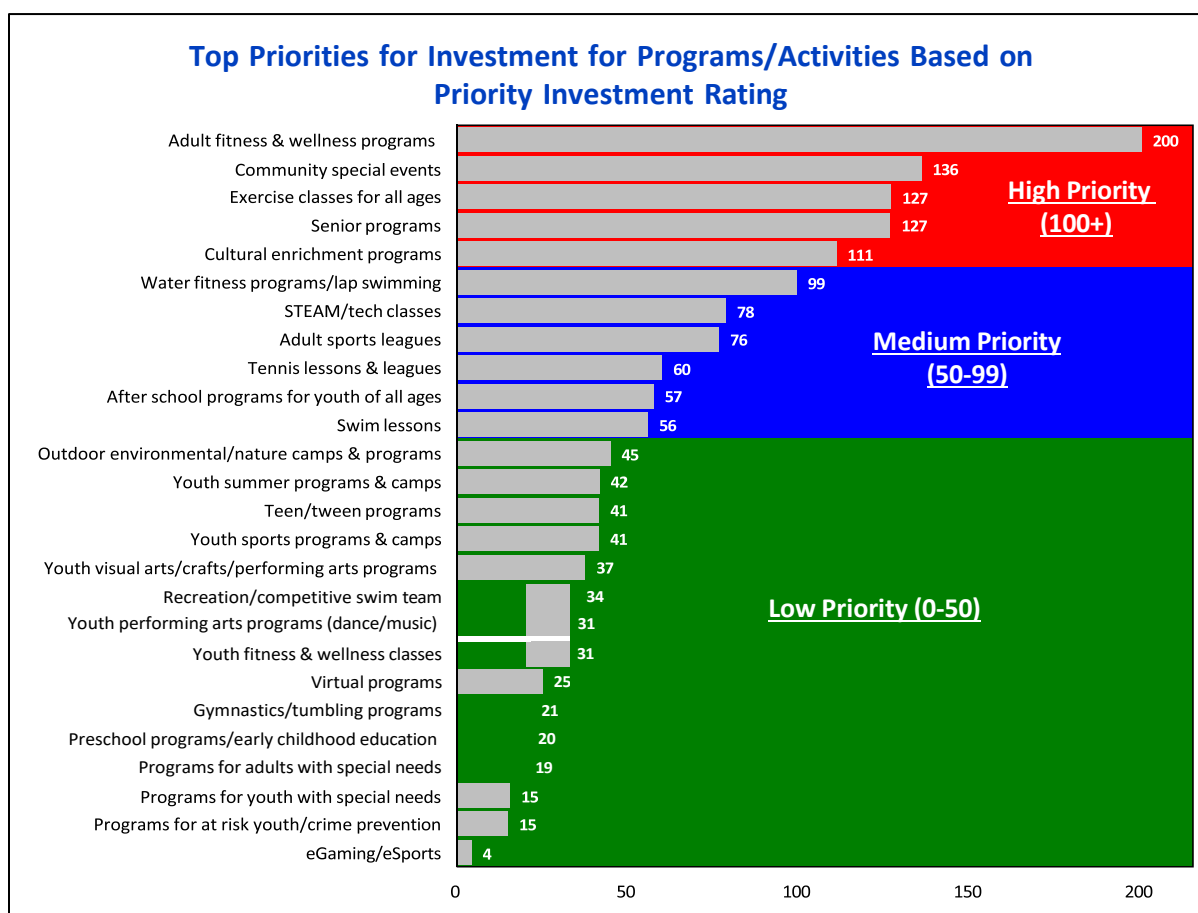

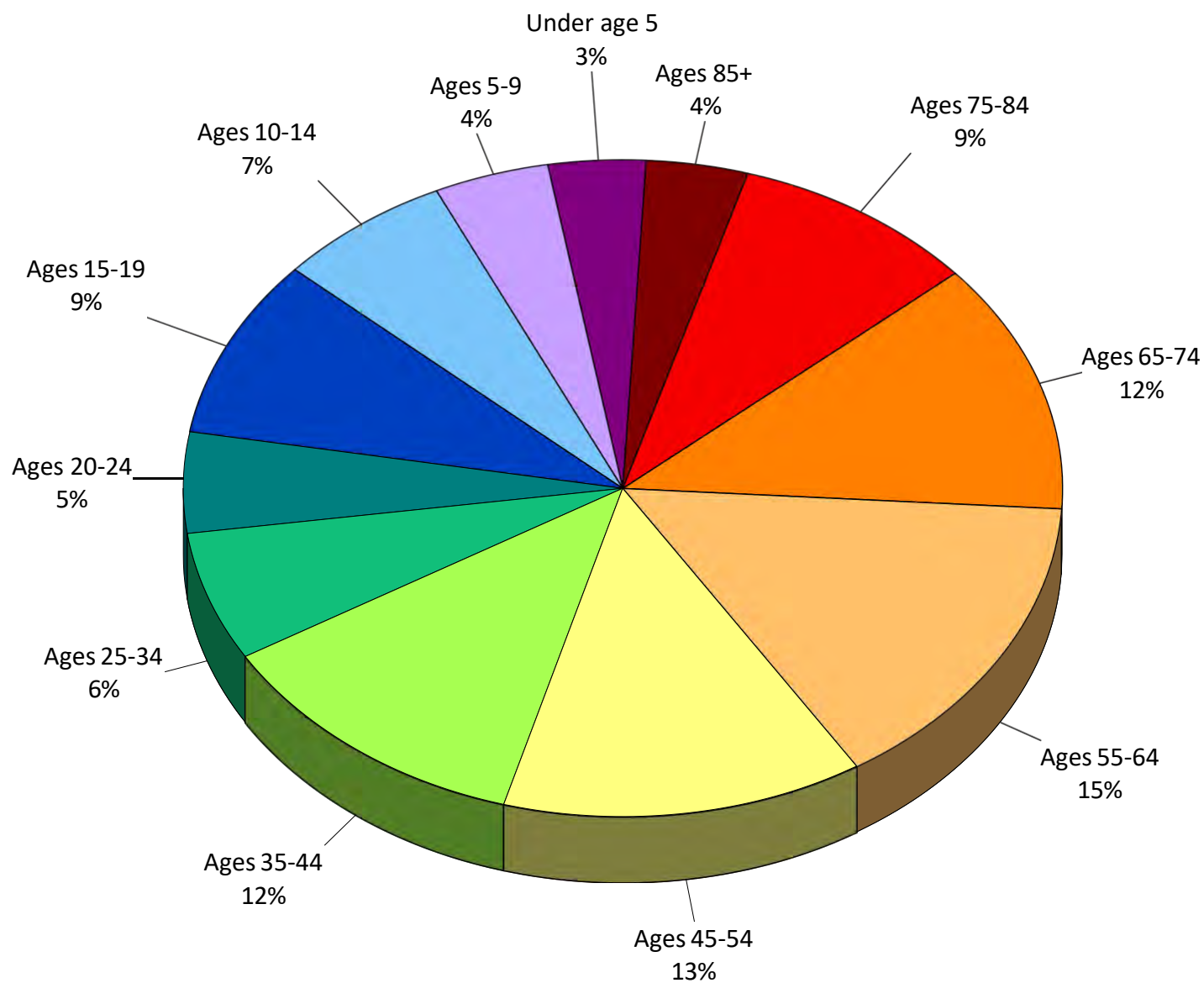

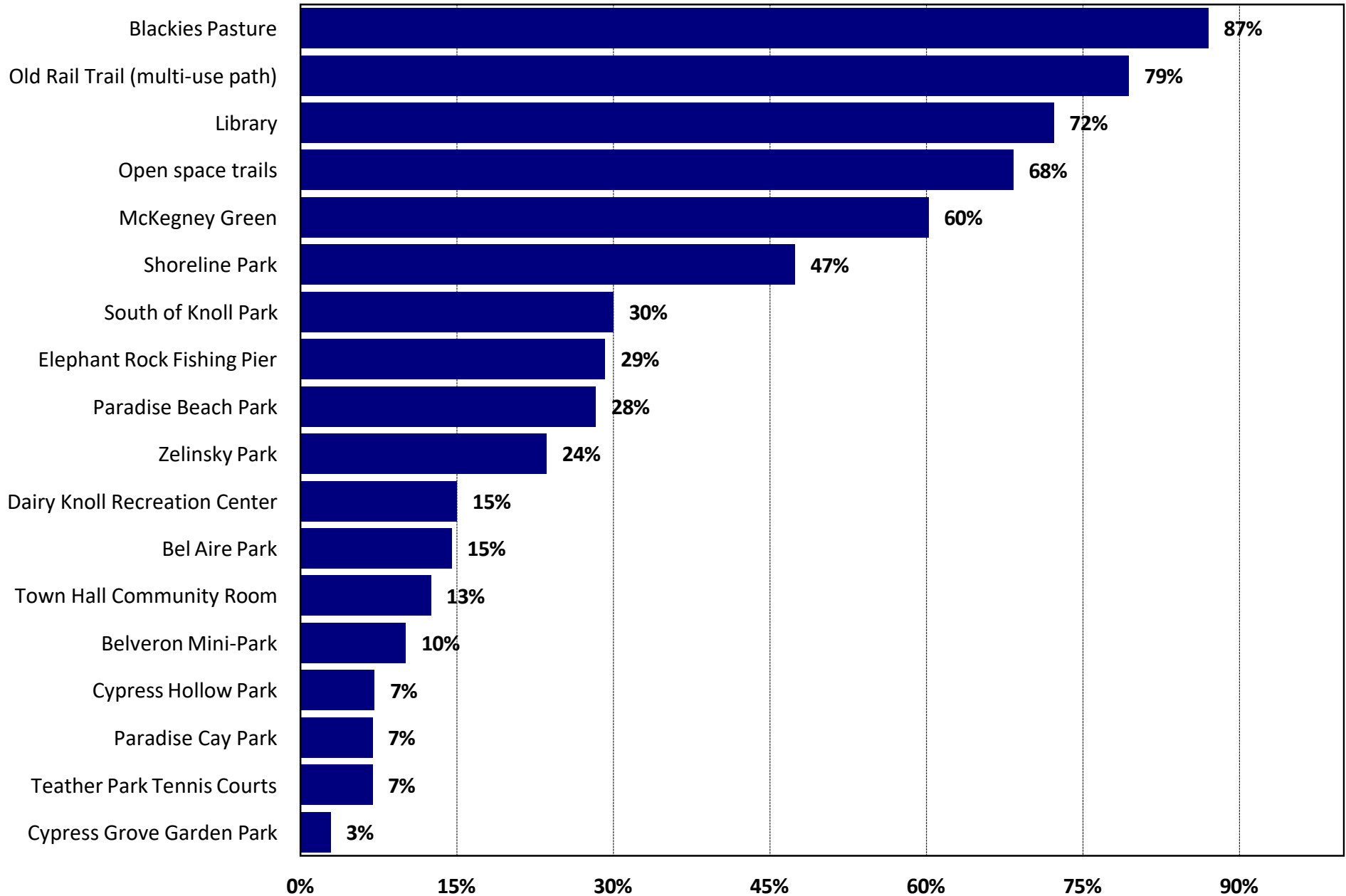
Q1. Including yourself, how many people in your household are in the following age groups?

by percentage of persons in household



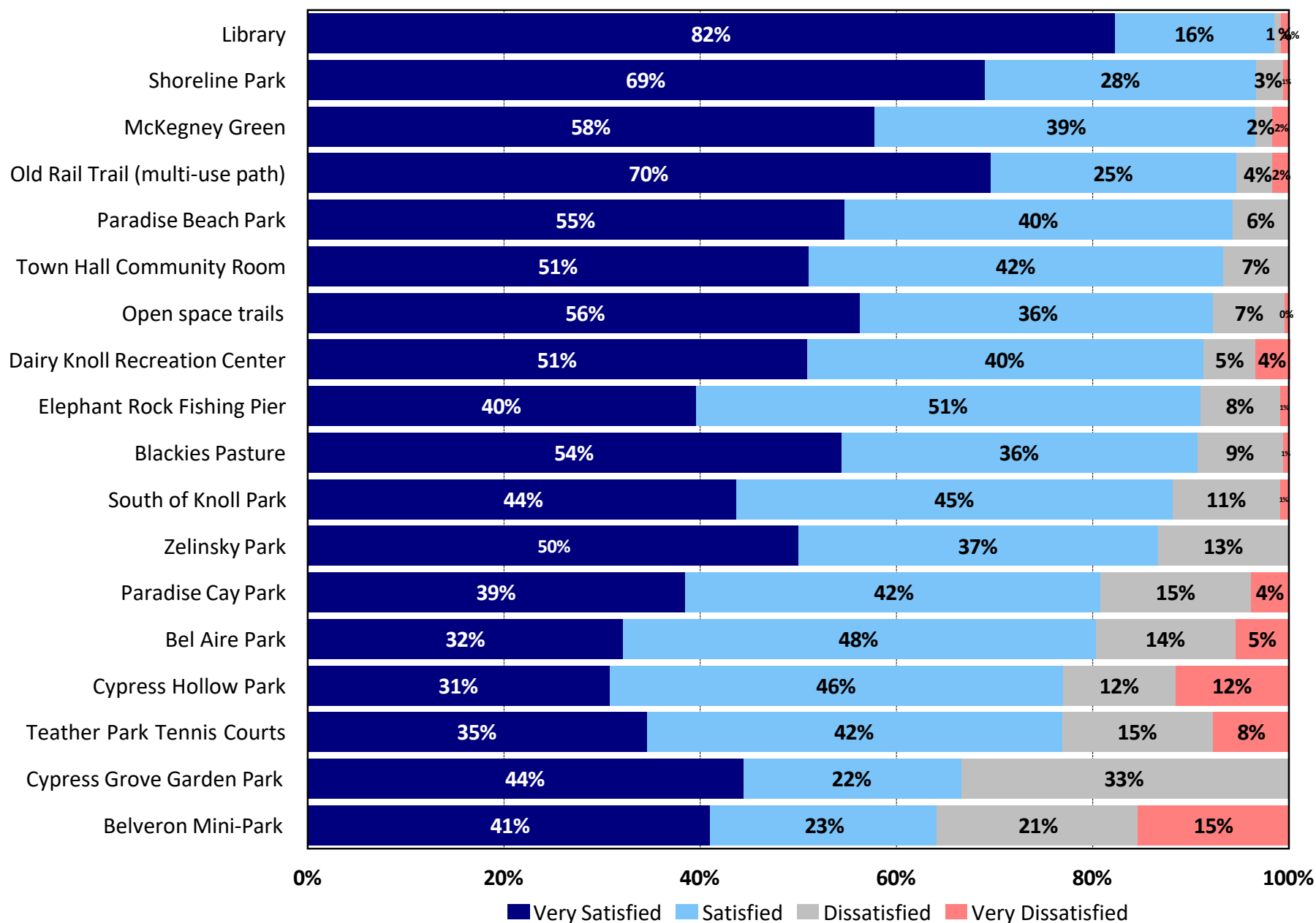
Q2. Please indicate if you or any members of your household have used any of the following Town of Tiburon parks and recreation facilities in the past 12 months.

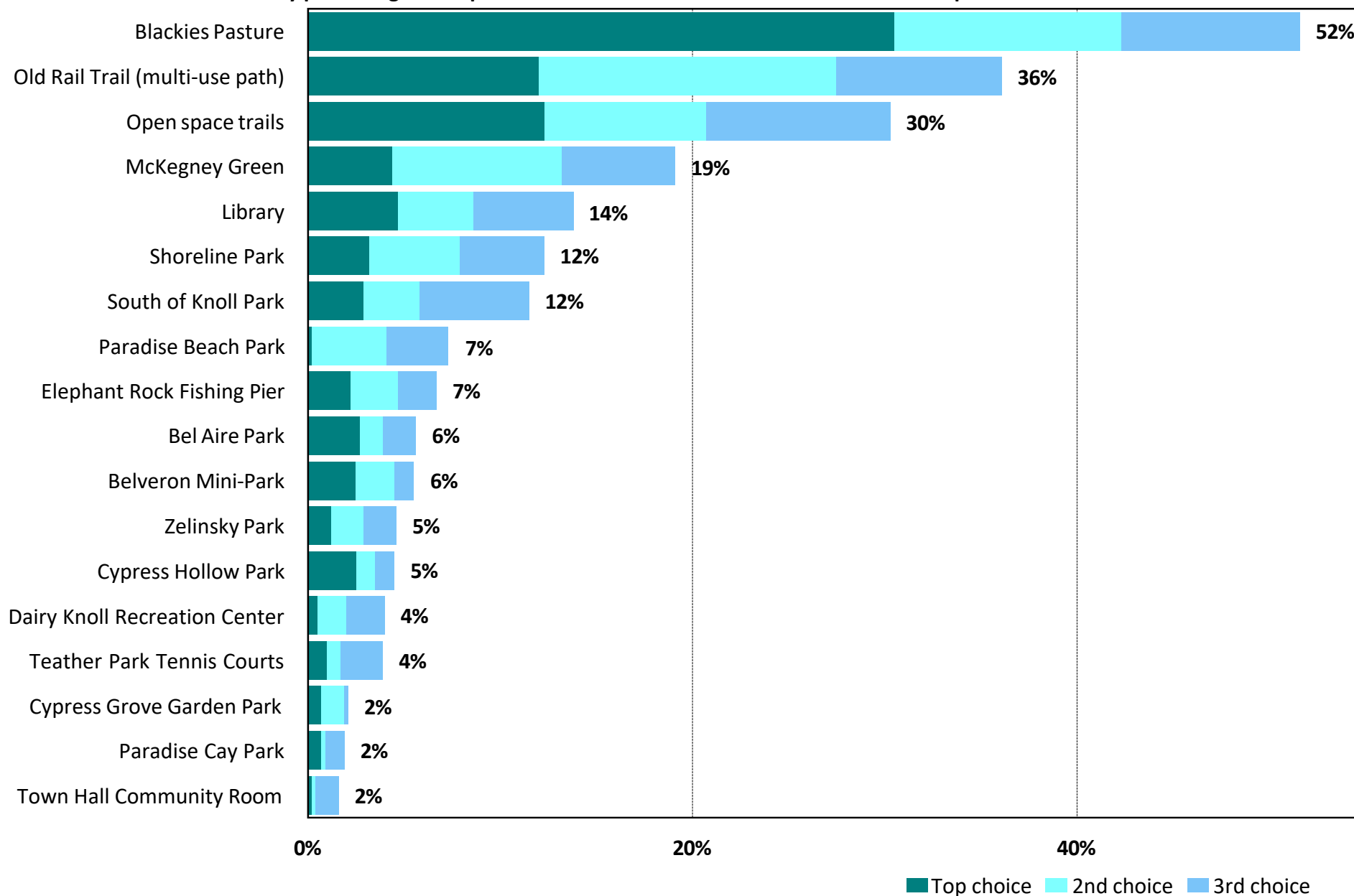
Q2. Rating Satisfaction with Parks/Facilities

by percentage of respondents who reported using the park/facility in the last year (excluding "N/A")



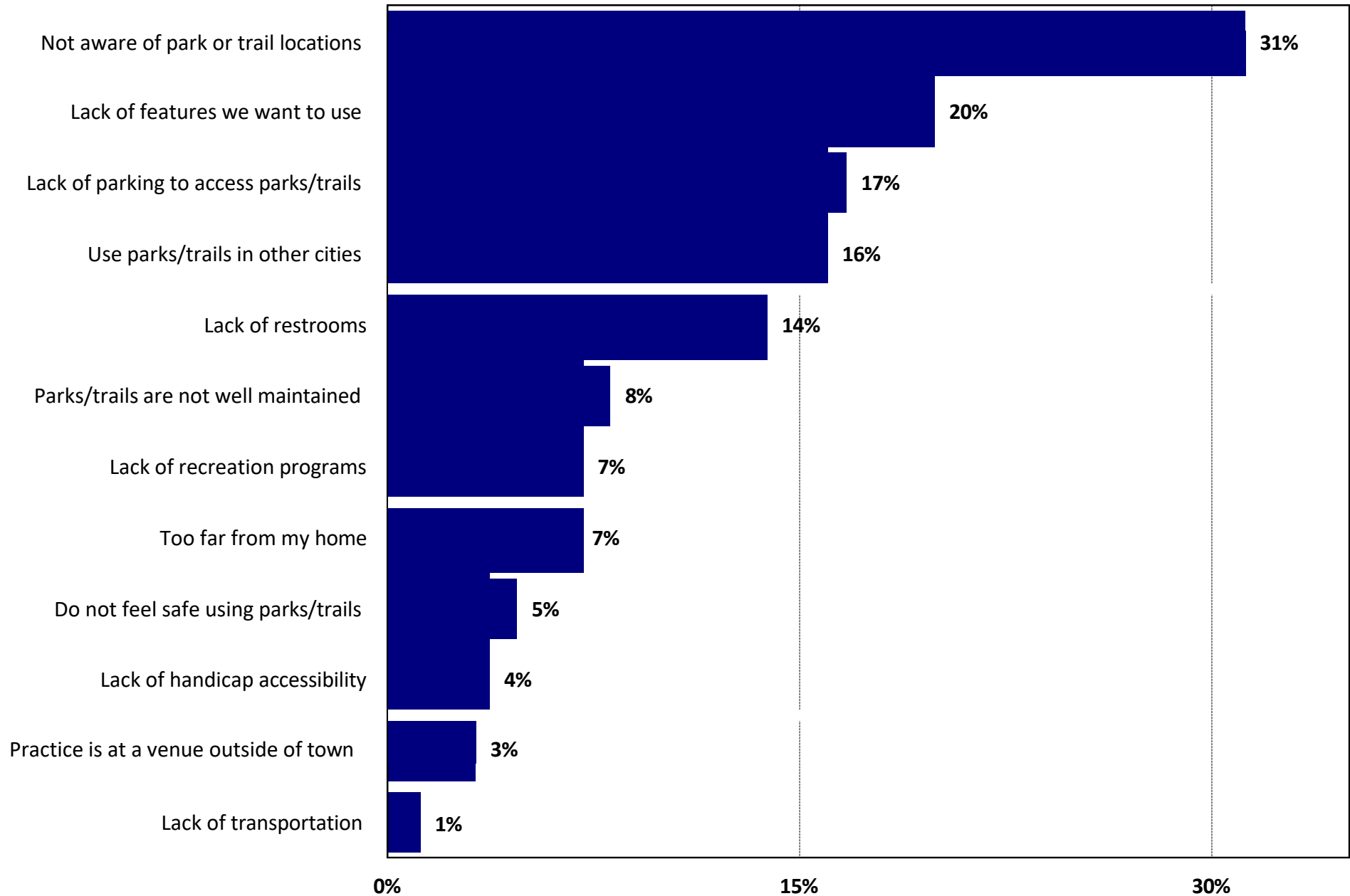
Q3. Which THREE parks/facilities from the list in Question 2 should receive the most attention from the town in the next TWO years?

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top three choices



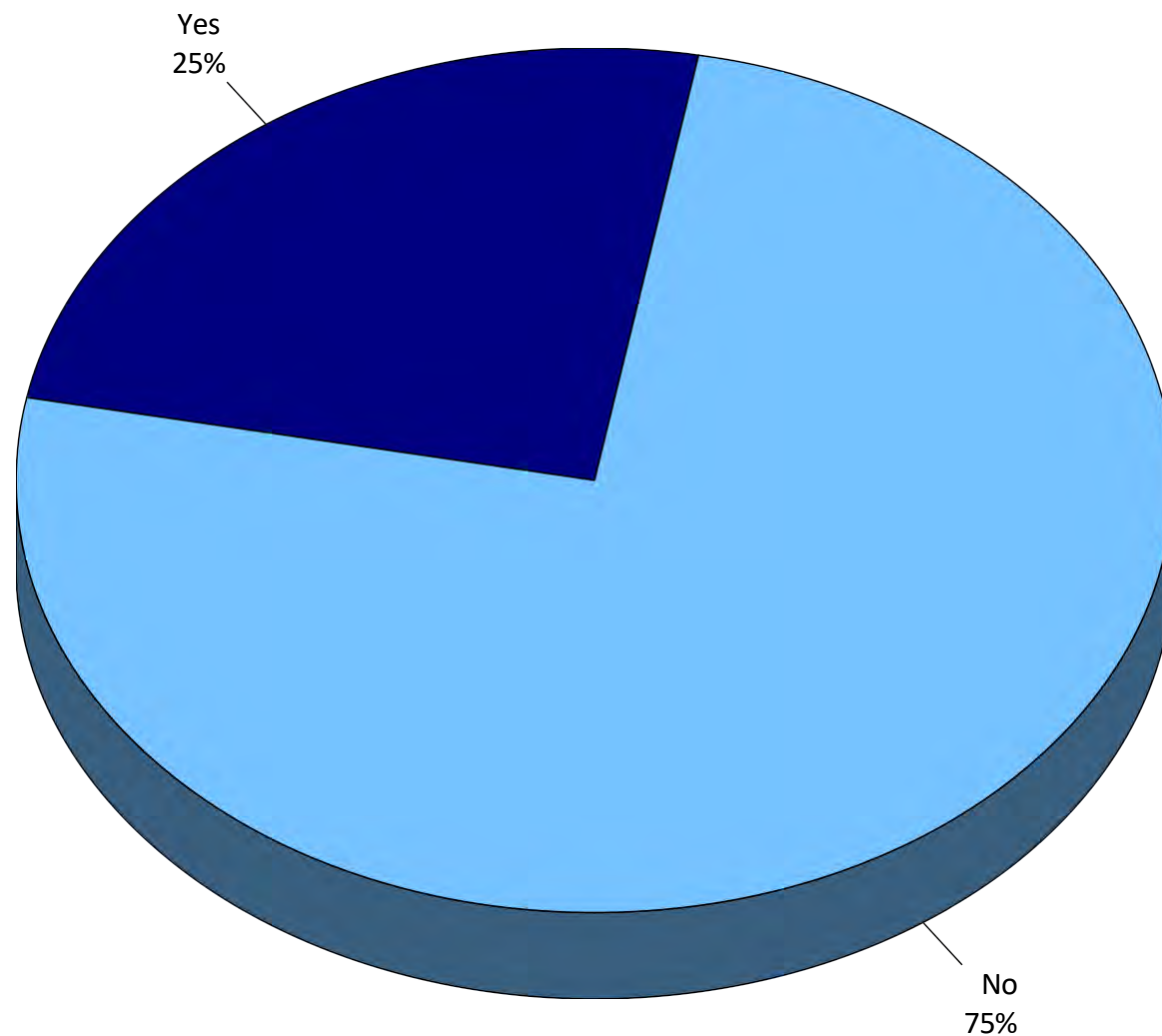
Q4. Please CHECK ALL the following reasons that prevent you/your household from using the parks/facilities more often.

by percentage of respondents (multiple selections could be made)



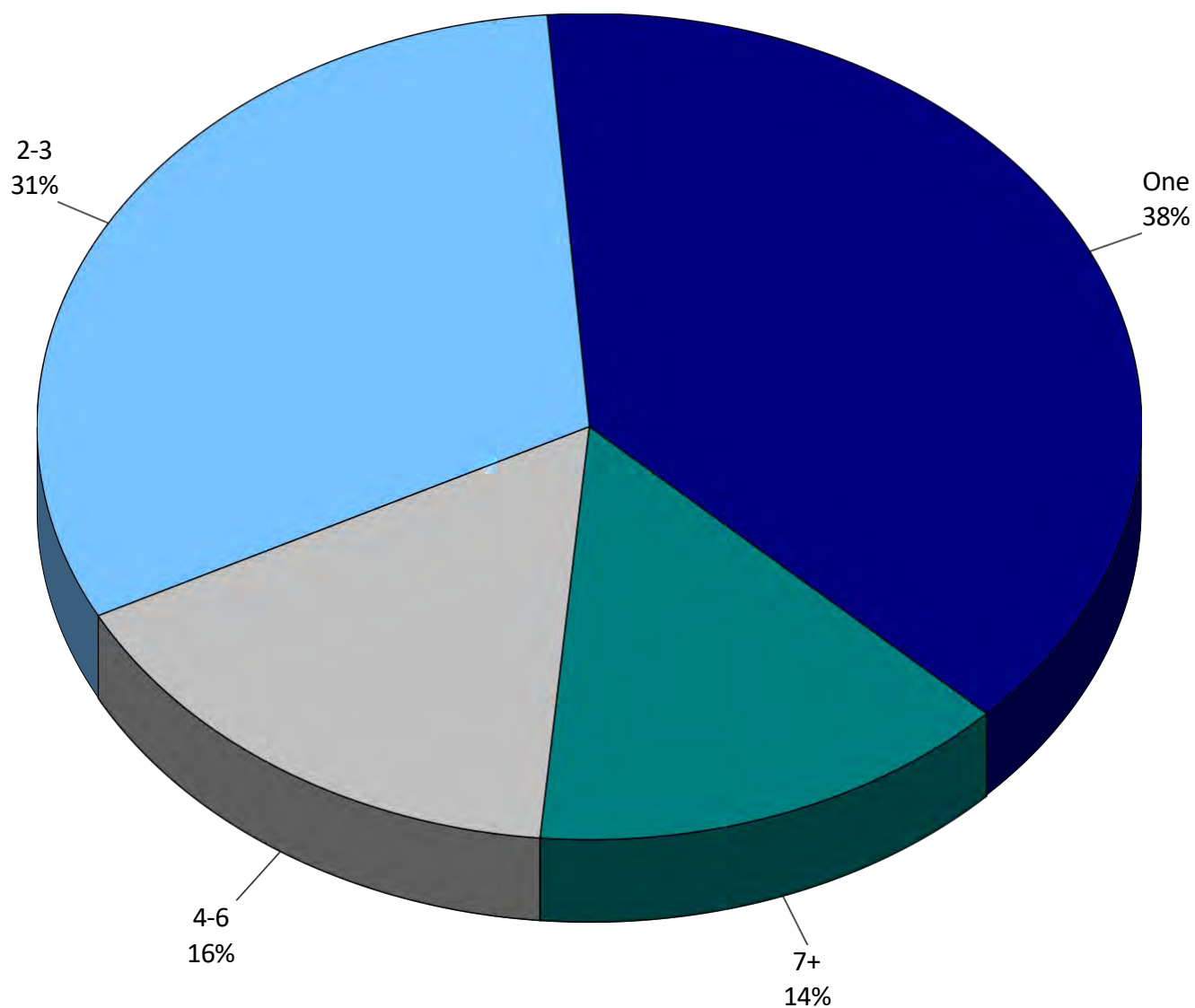
Q5. Has your household participated in any recreation programs/activities offered by the Belvedere Tiburon Joint Recreation Committee (The Ranch) in the past 12 months?

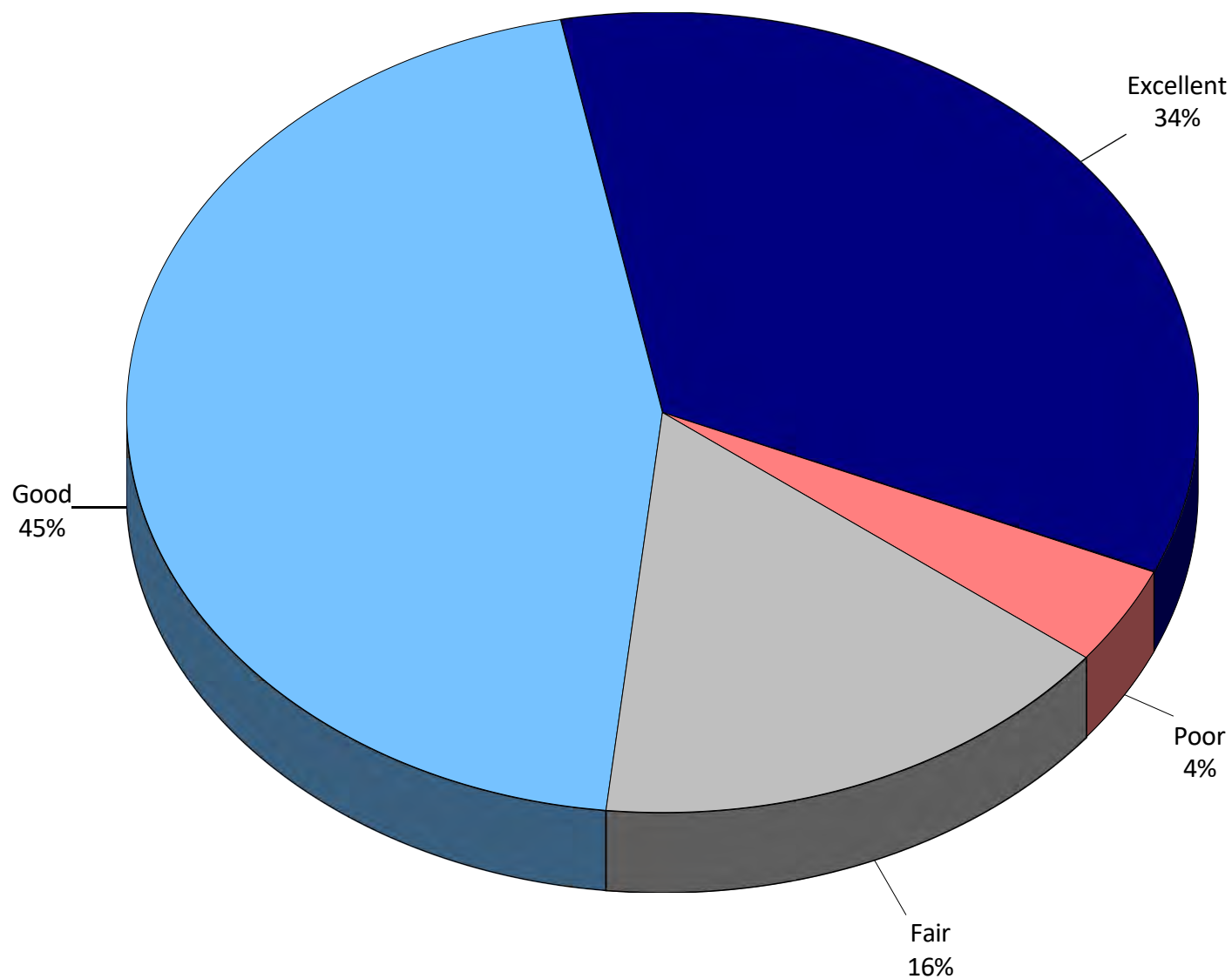
Q5a. How many programs and/or activities offered by The Ranch have you or members of your household participated in during the past 12 months?

by percentage of respondents (excluding "not provided")



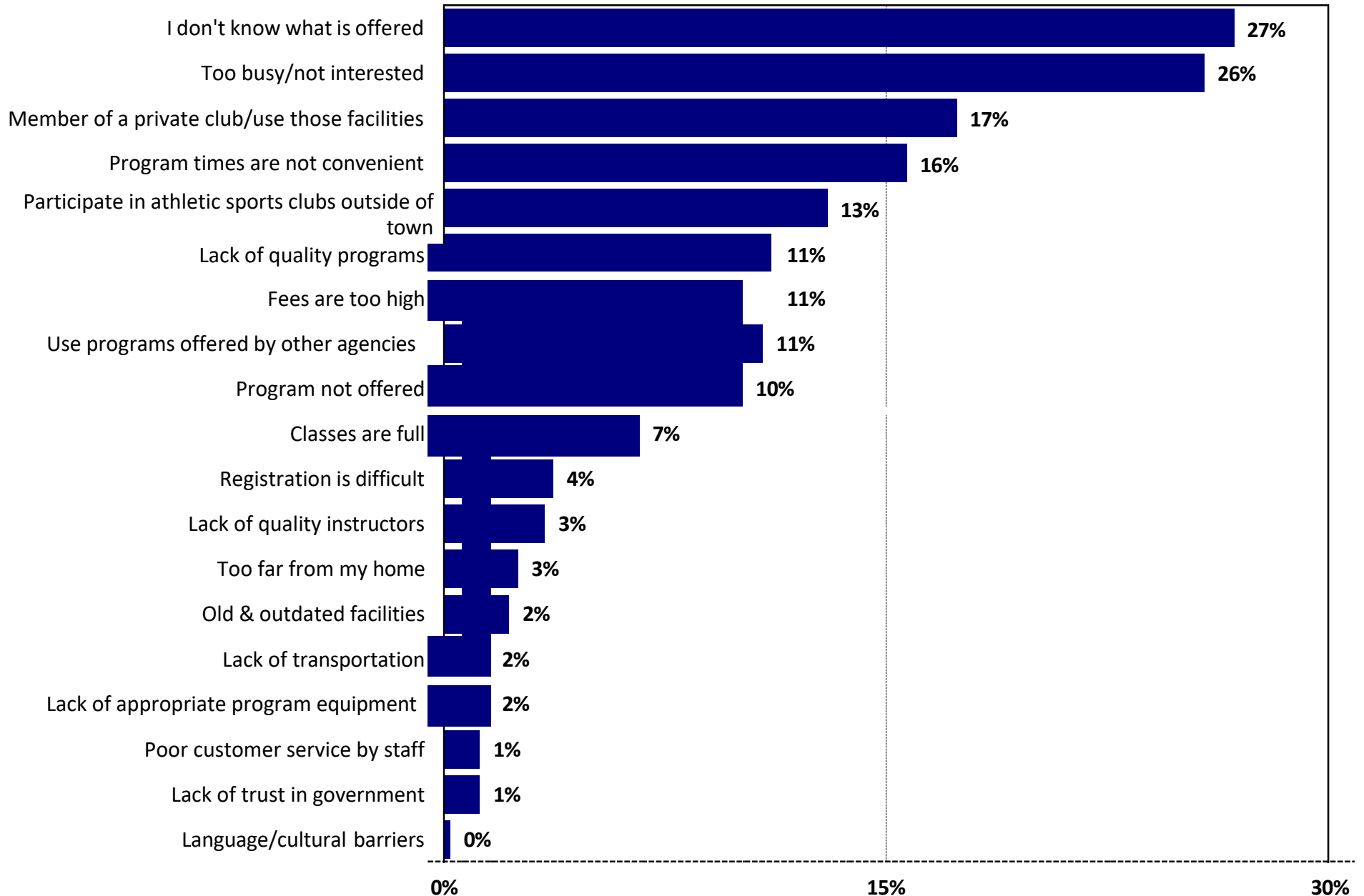
Q5b. How would you rate the overall quality of The Ranch programs/activities in which your household has participated?

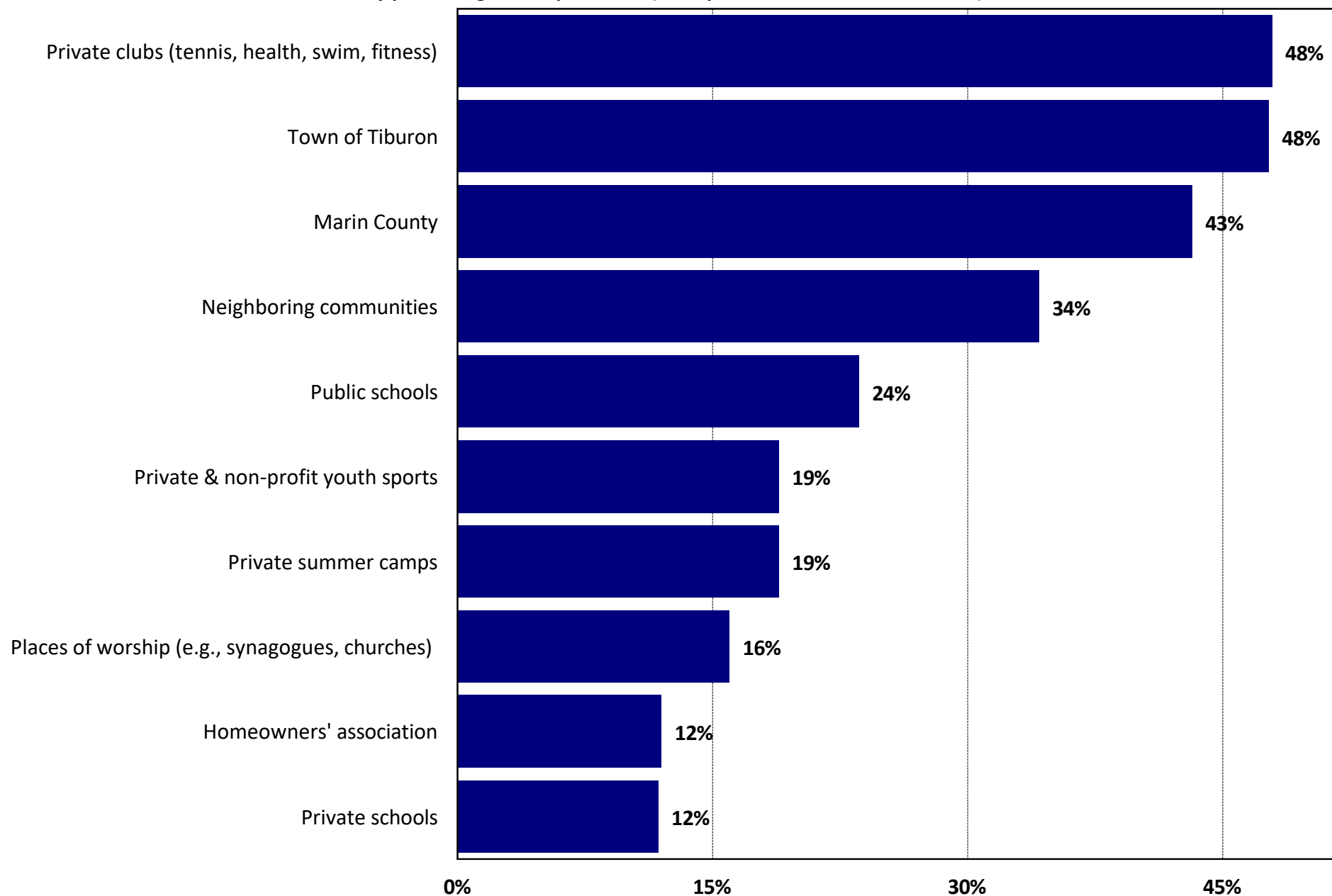
Q6. Please CHECK ALL the following reasons that prevent you/your household from participating in The Ranch programs/activities more often.

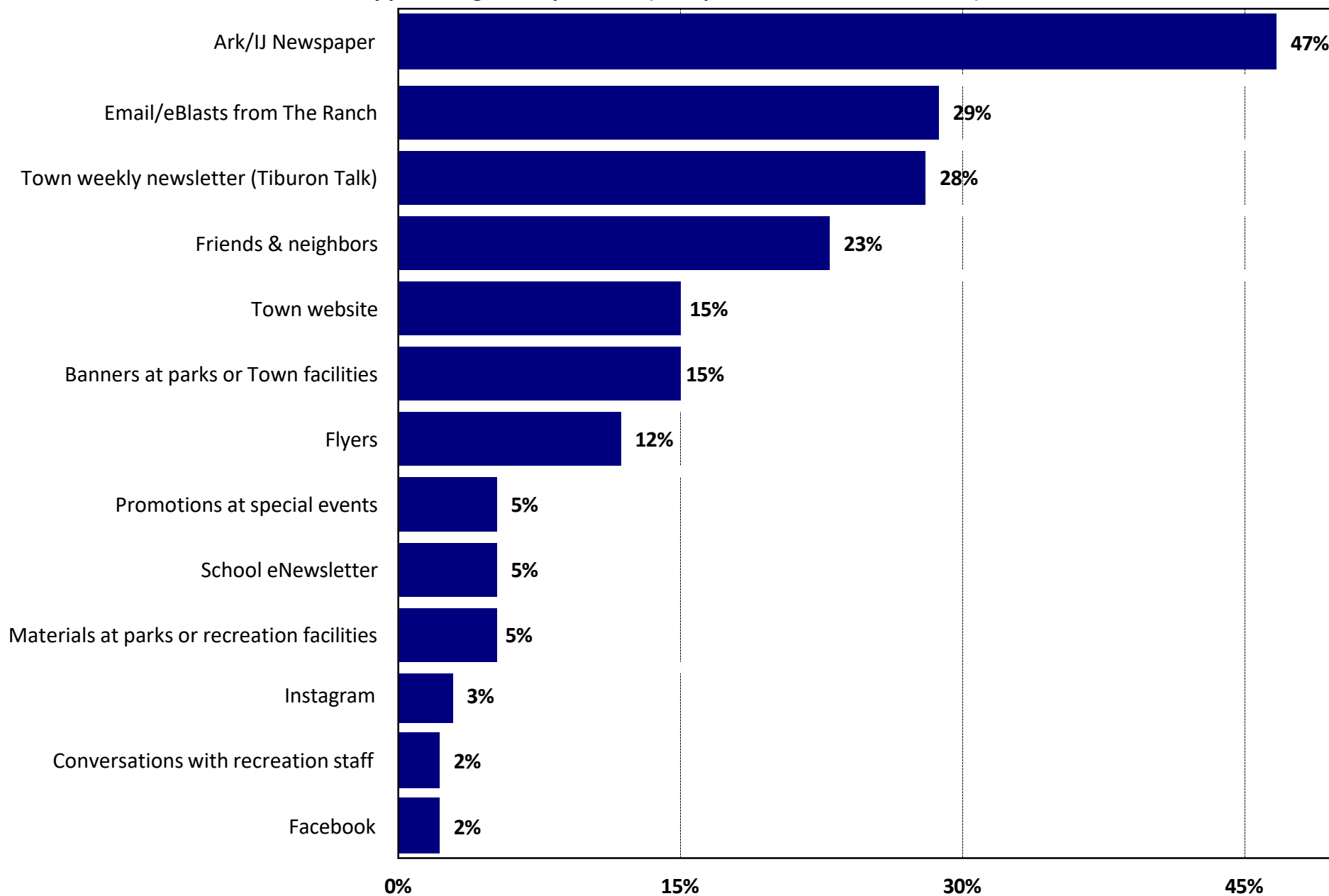
Q7. Please CHECK ALL of the organizations that you/your household have used for programs/activities in the past 12 months.

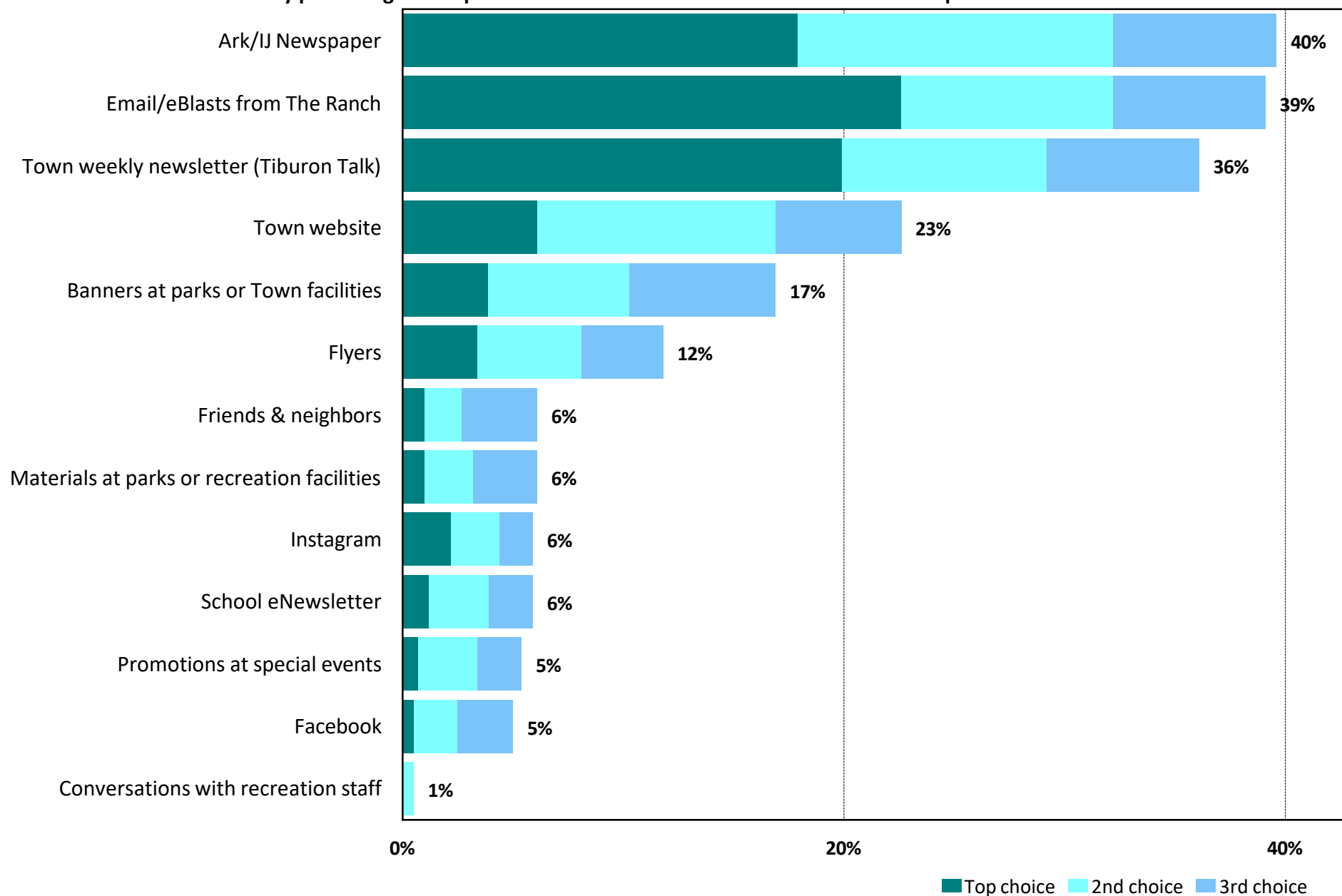
Q8. Please CHECK ALL of the ways you learn about The Ranch recreation programs and activities.

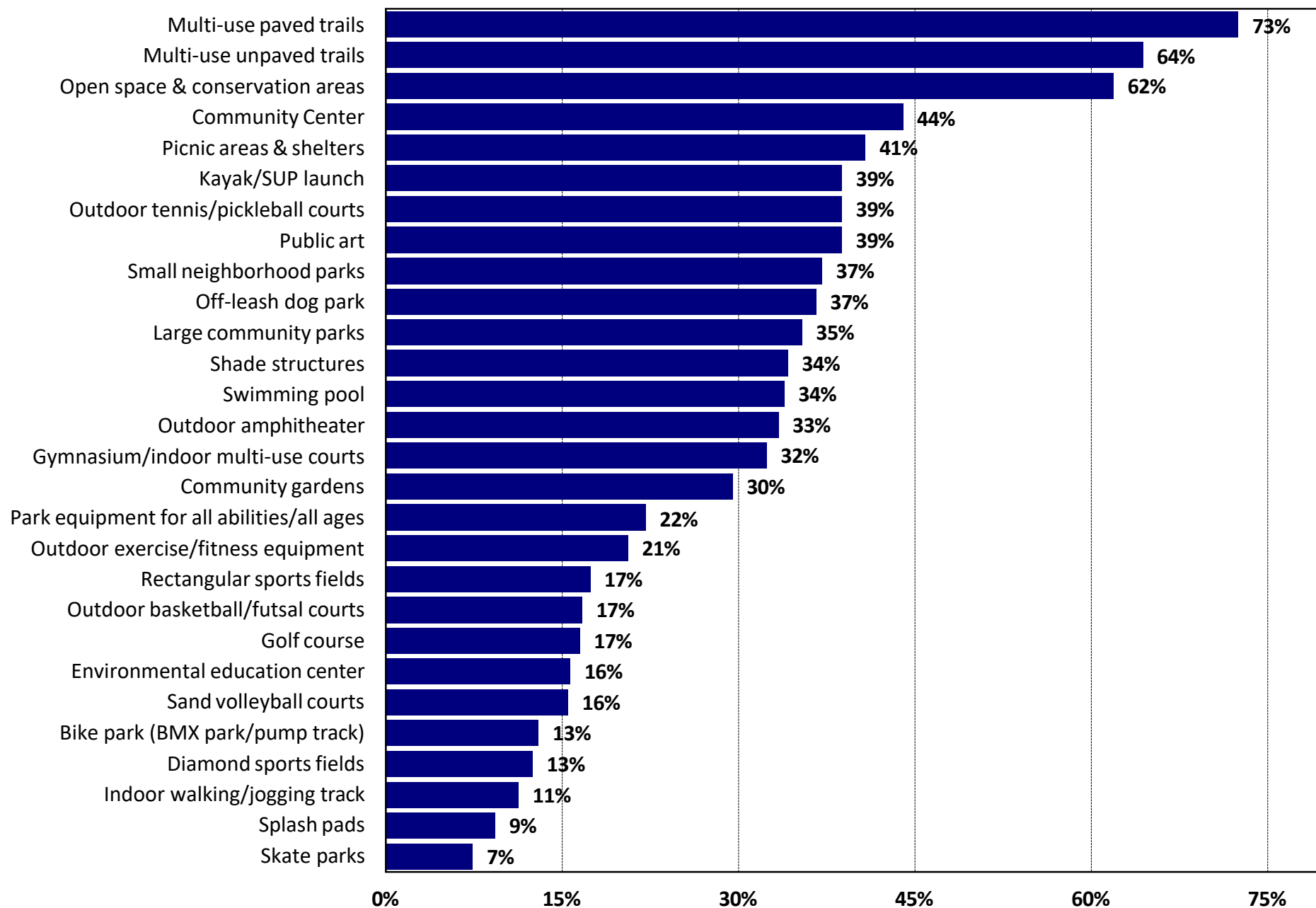
Q9. Which THREE methods of communication would you MOST PREFER the Town use to communicate with you about recreation programs/activities?

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top three choices



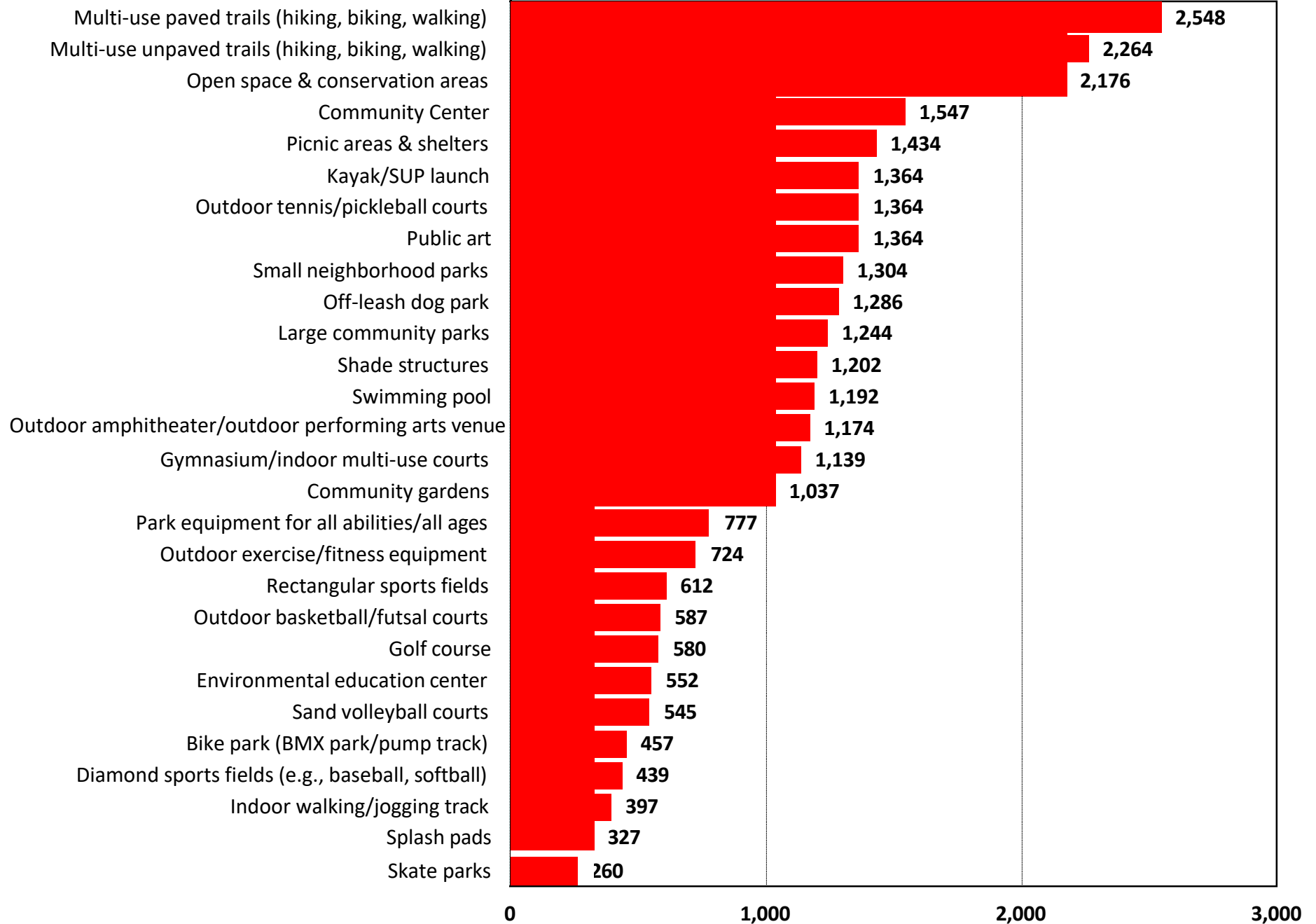
Q10. Need for Facilities/Amenities

by percentage of respondents who indicated need



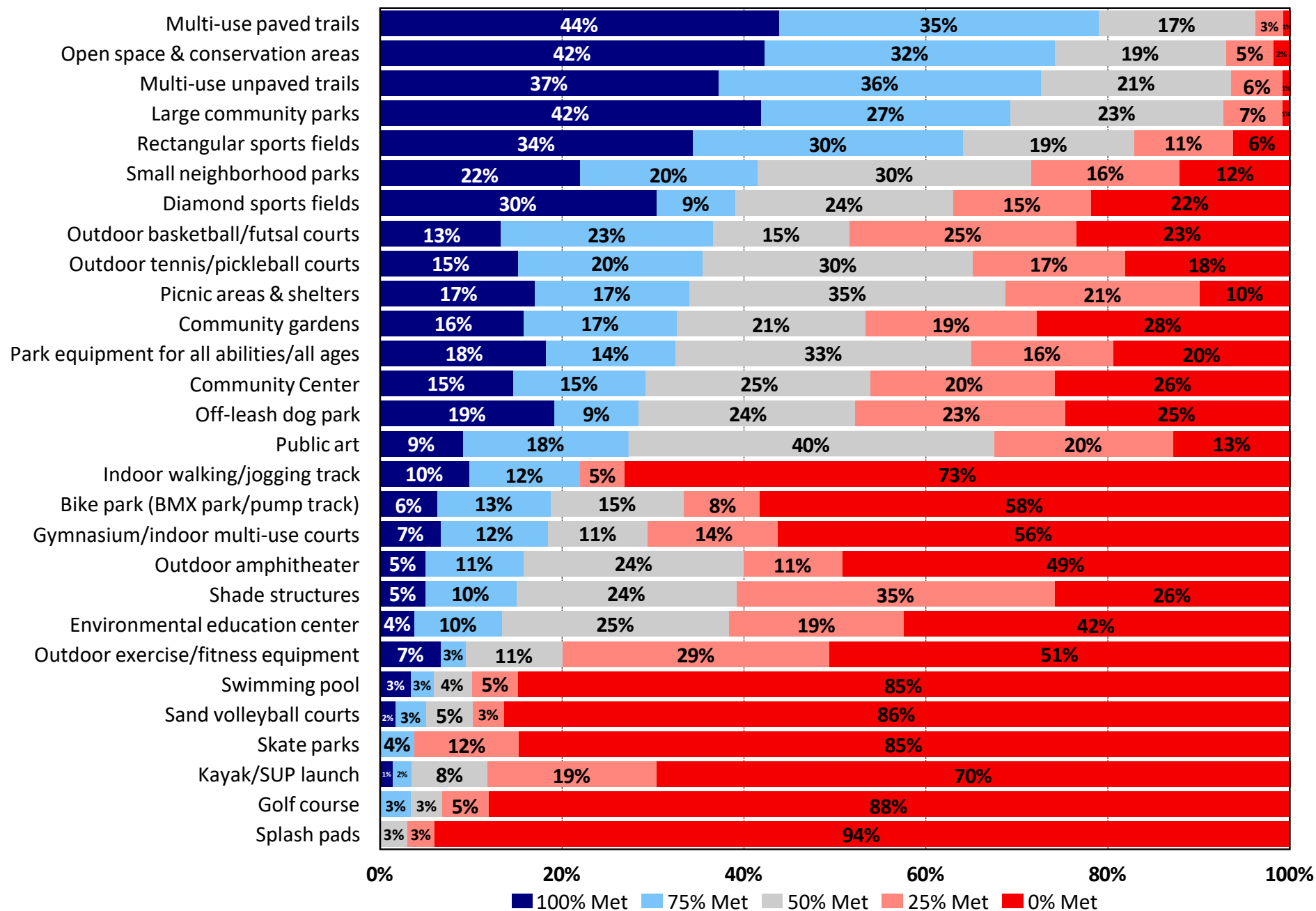
Q10. Estimated Number of Households Who Have a Need for Amenities/Facilities

by number of households based on an estimated 3,515 households



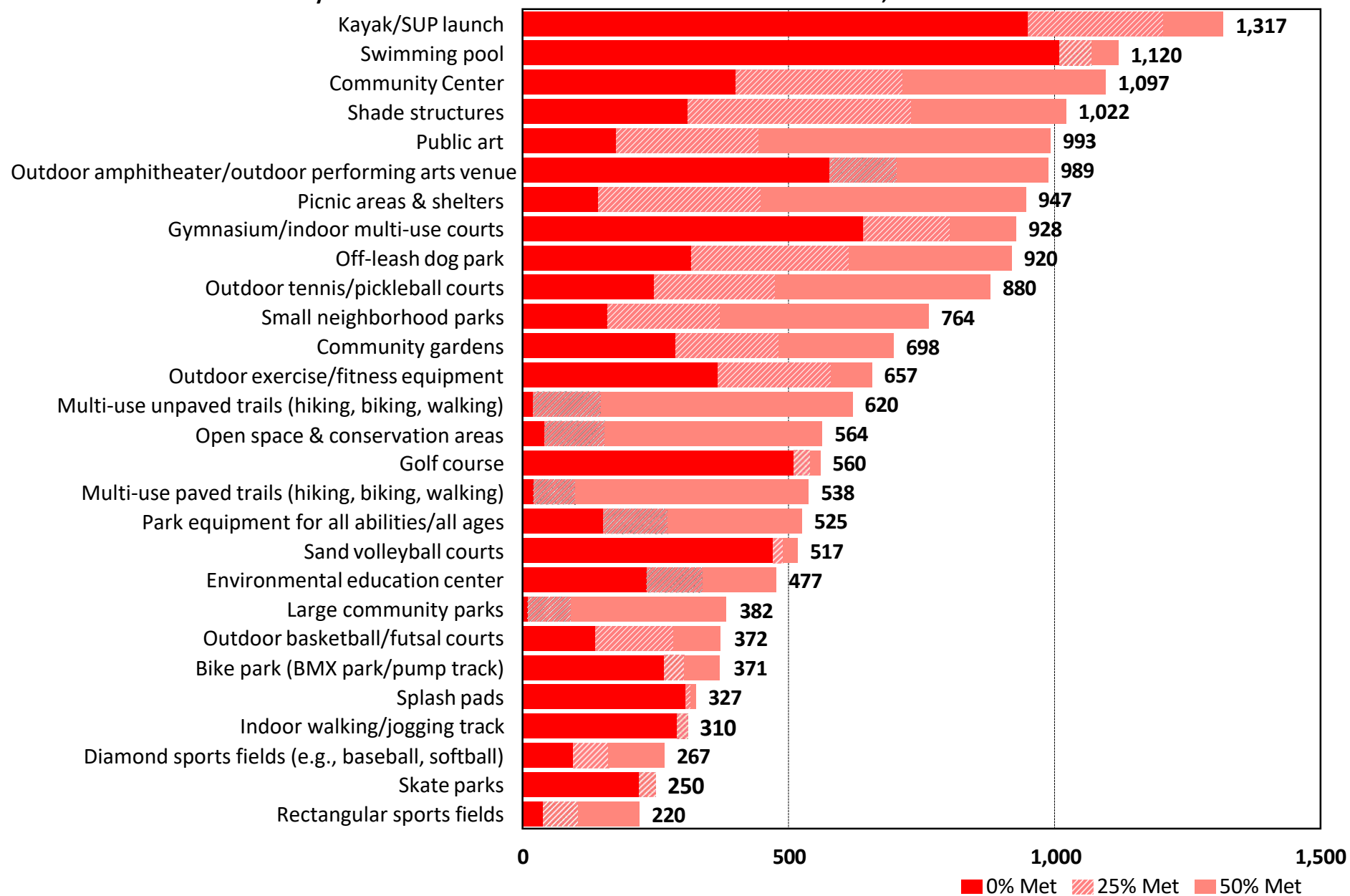
Q10. Please rate how well your needs for facilities/amenities are met.

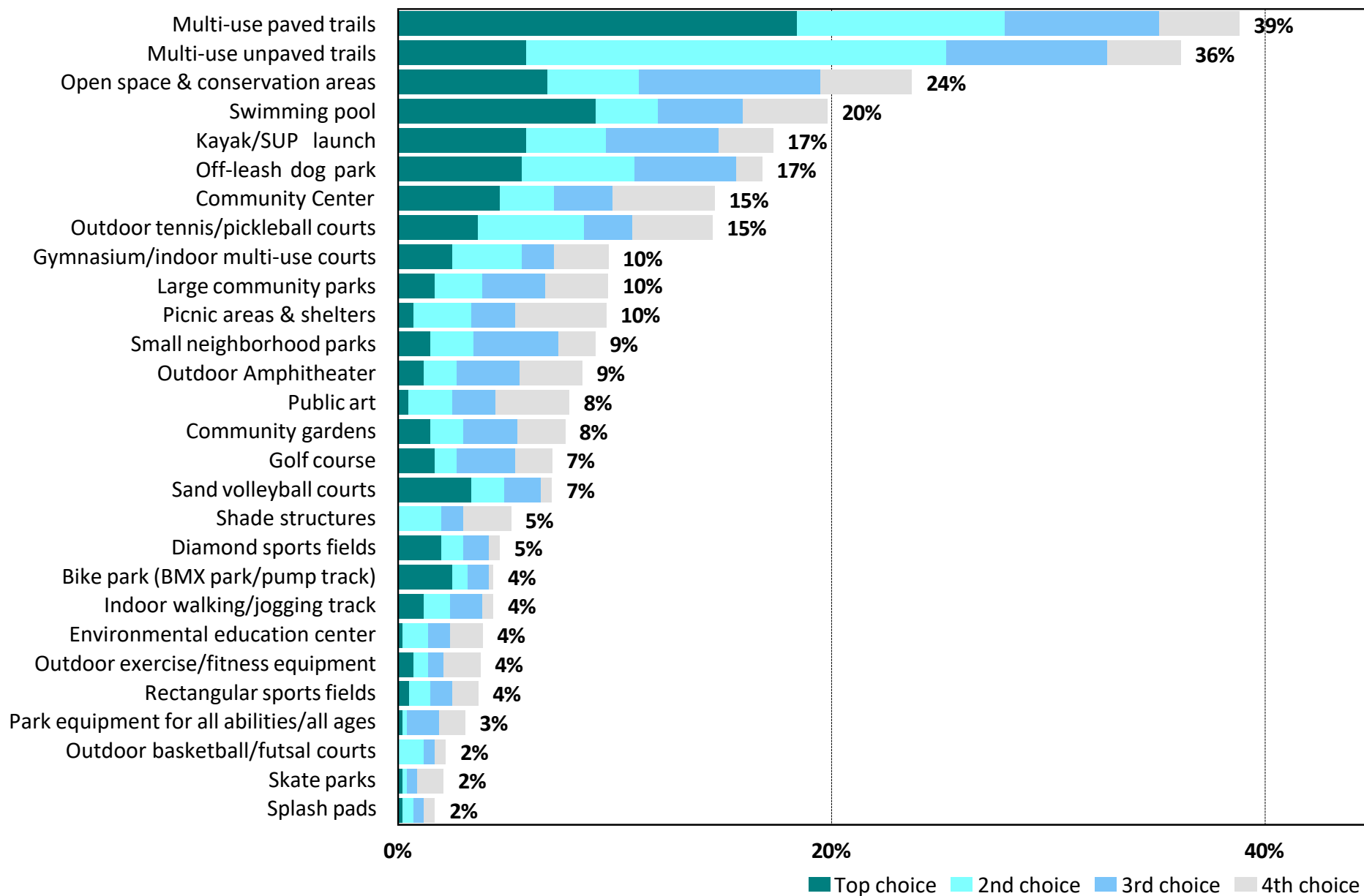
Q10c. Estimated Number of Households Whose Facility/Amenity Needs Are Only “50% Met” or Less

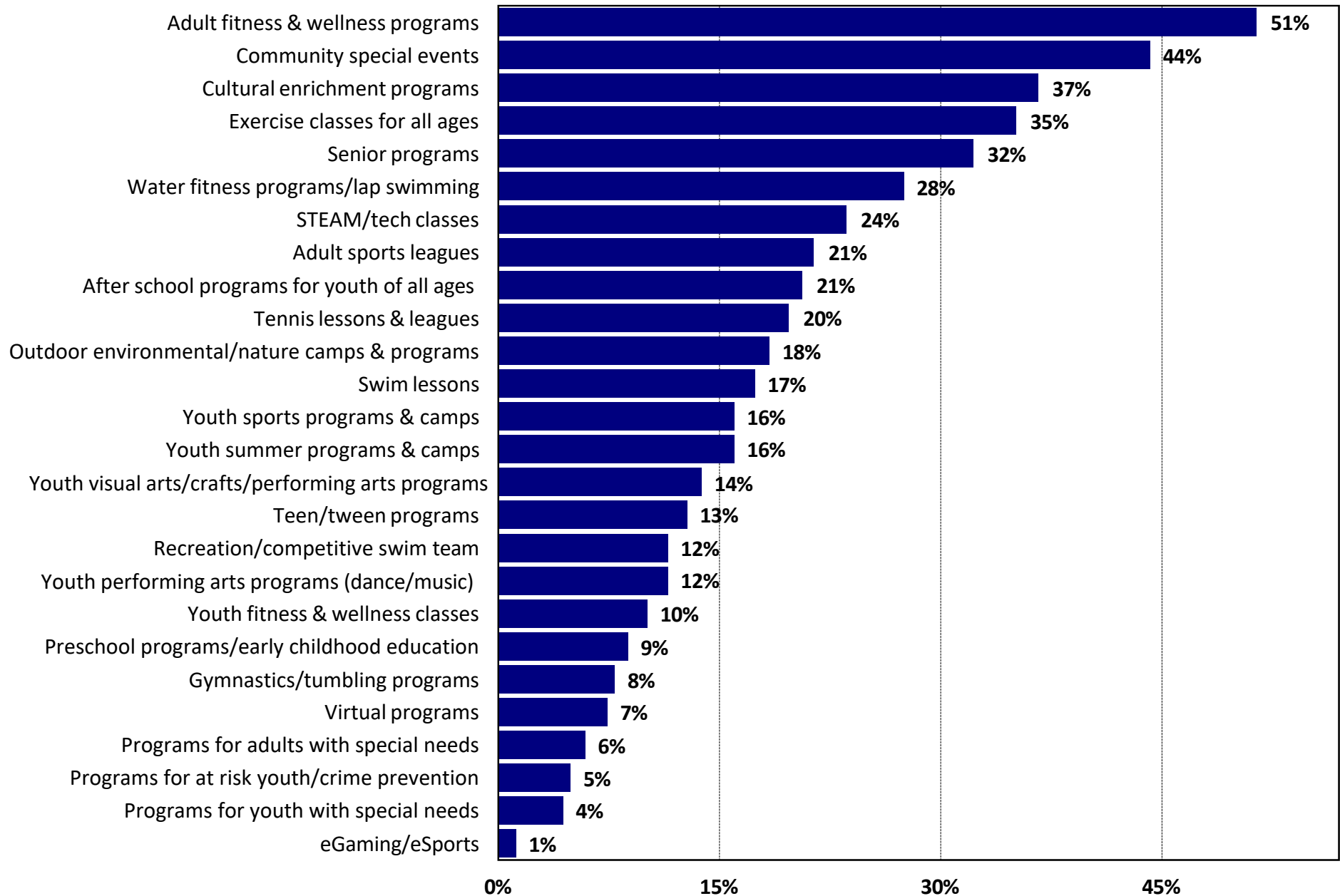
Q11. Which FOUR facilities/amenities from the list in Question 10 are most important to your household?

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices



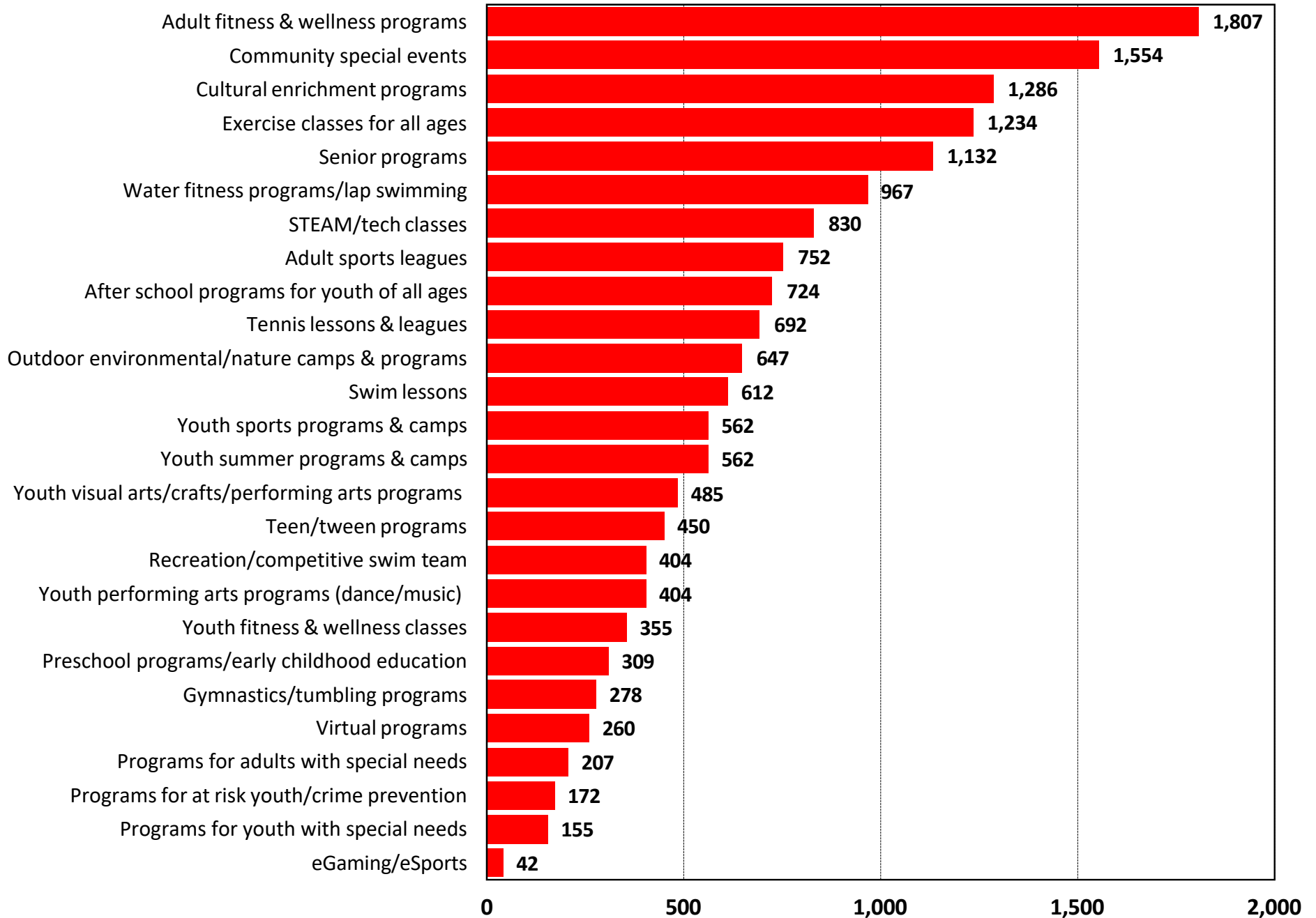
Q12. Please indicate if you/your household have a need for each of the programs/activities listed below.

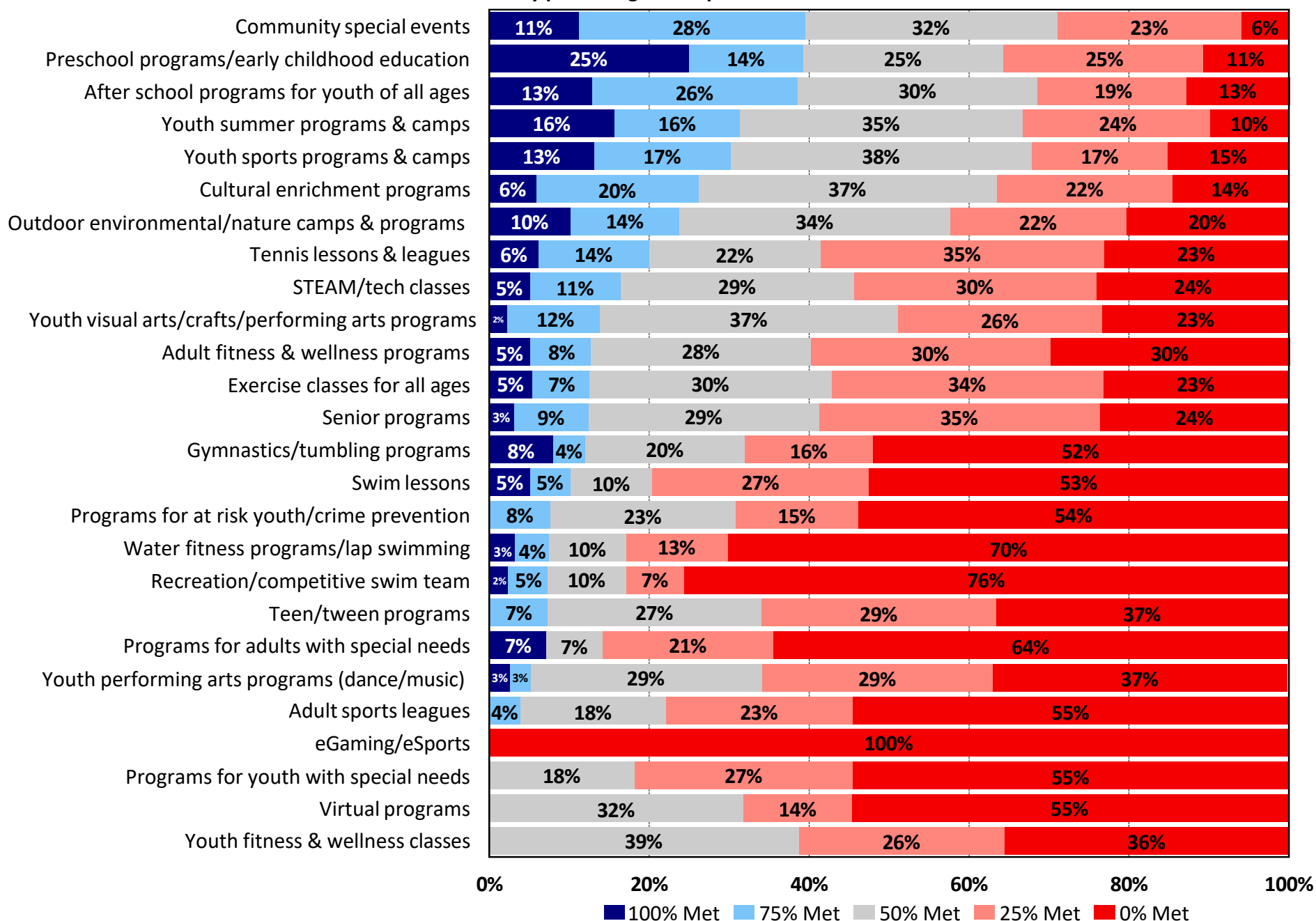
Q12. Estimated Number of Households Who Have a Need for Programs/Activities

by number of households based on an estimated 3,515 households



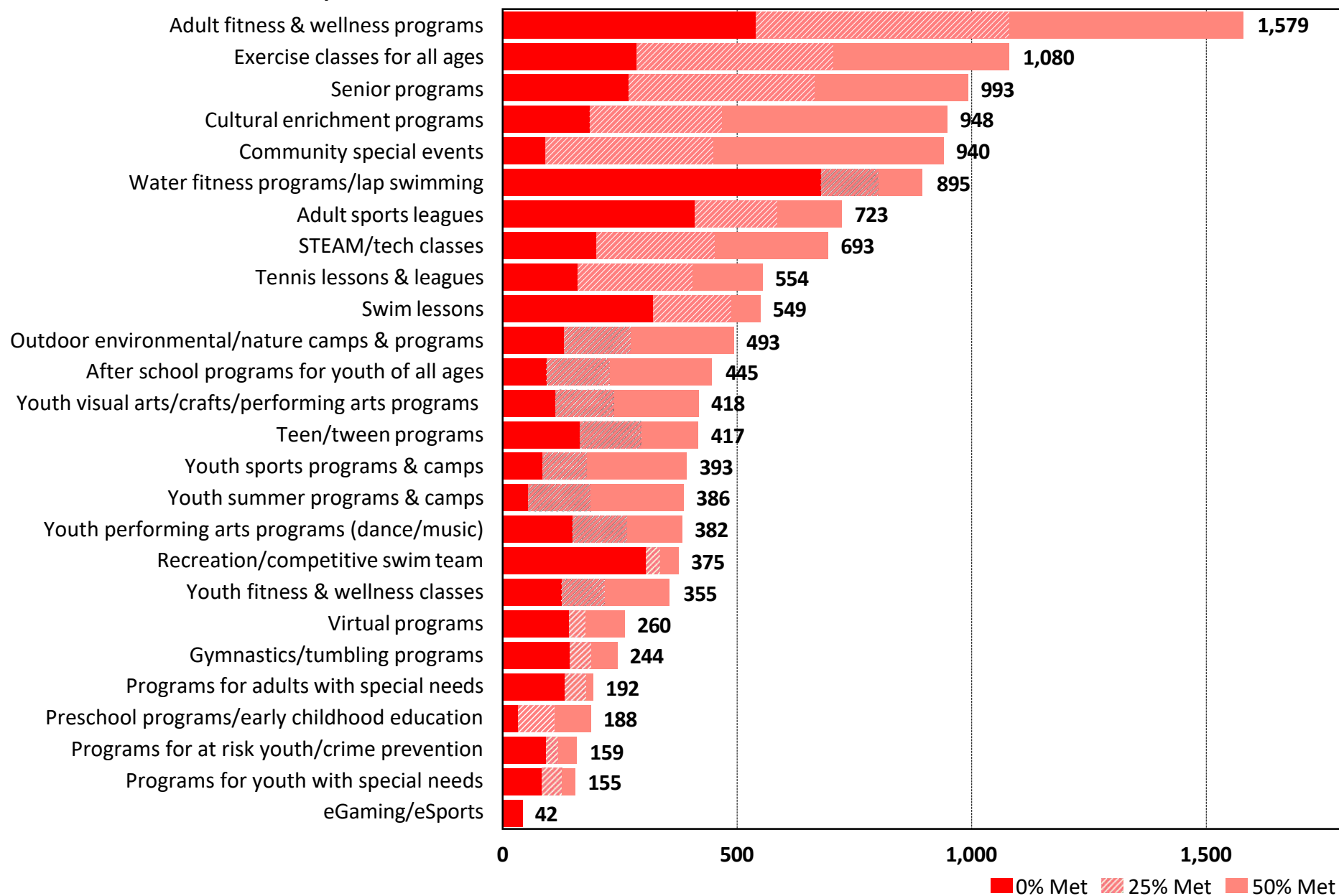

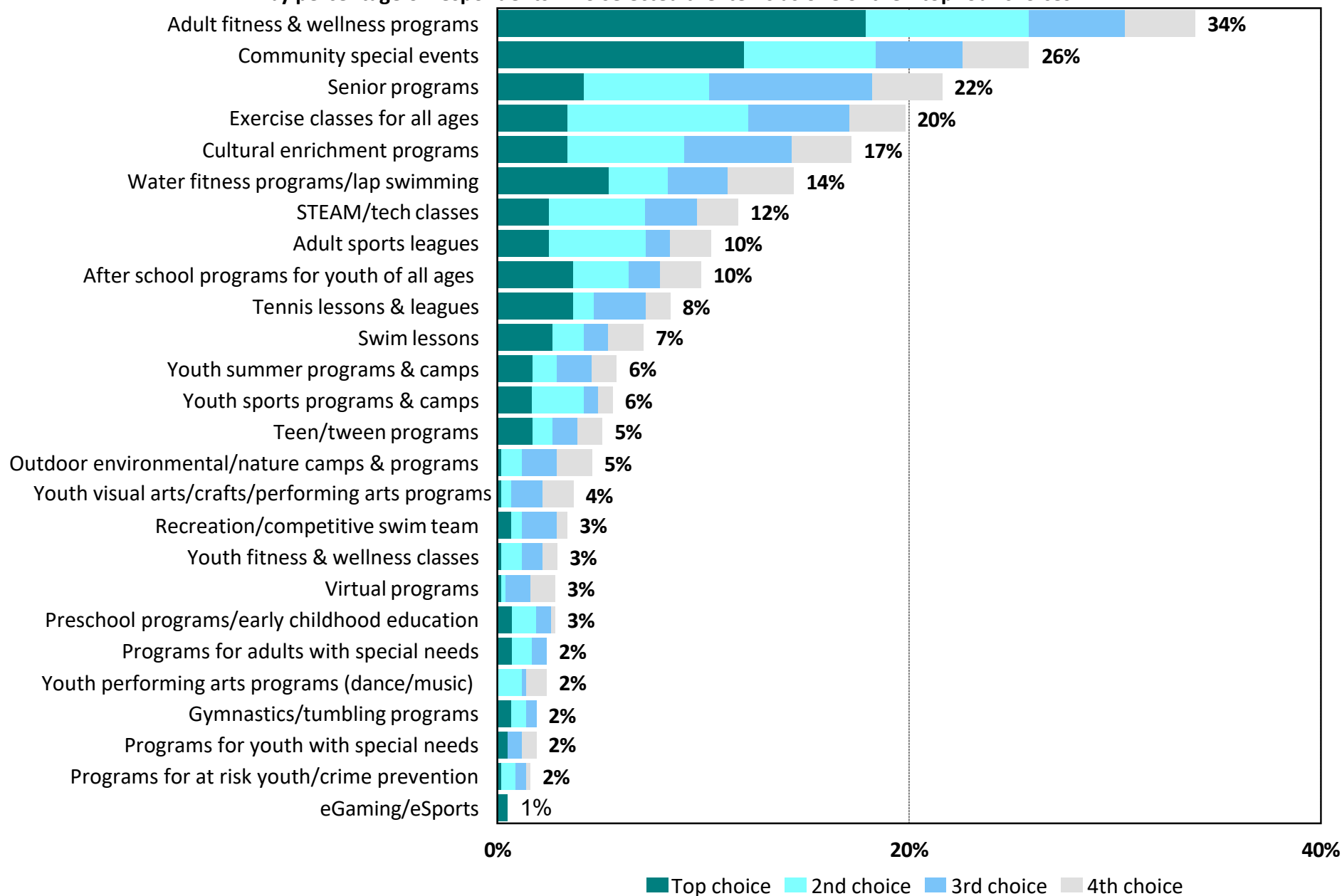
Q12c. Estimated Number of Households Whose Program/Activity Needs Are Only "50% Met" or Less

by number of households with need based on an estimated 3,515 households



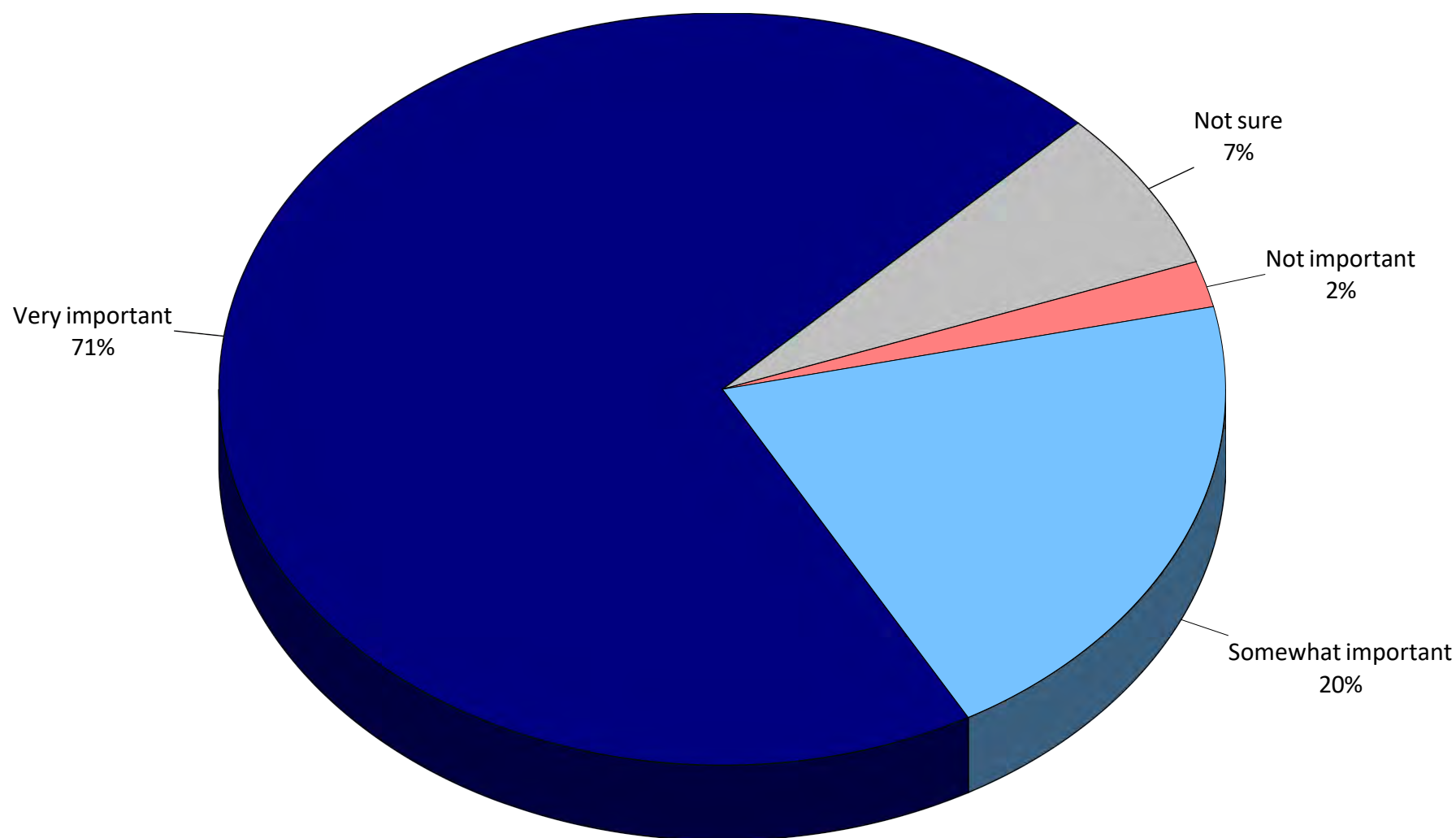
Q13. Which FOUR programs from the list in Question 12 are most important to your household?

by percentage of respondents who selected the items as one of their top four choices



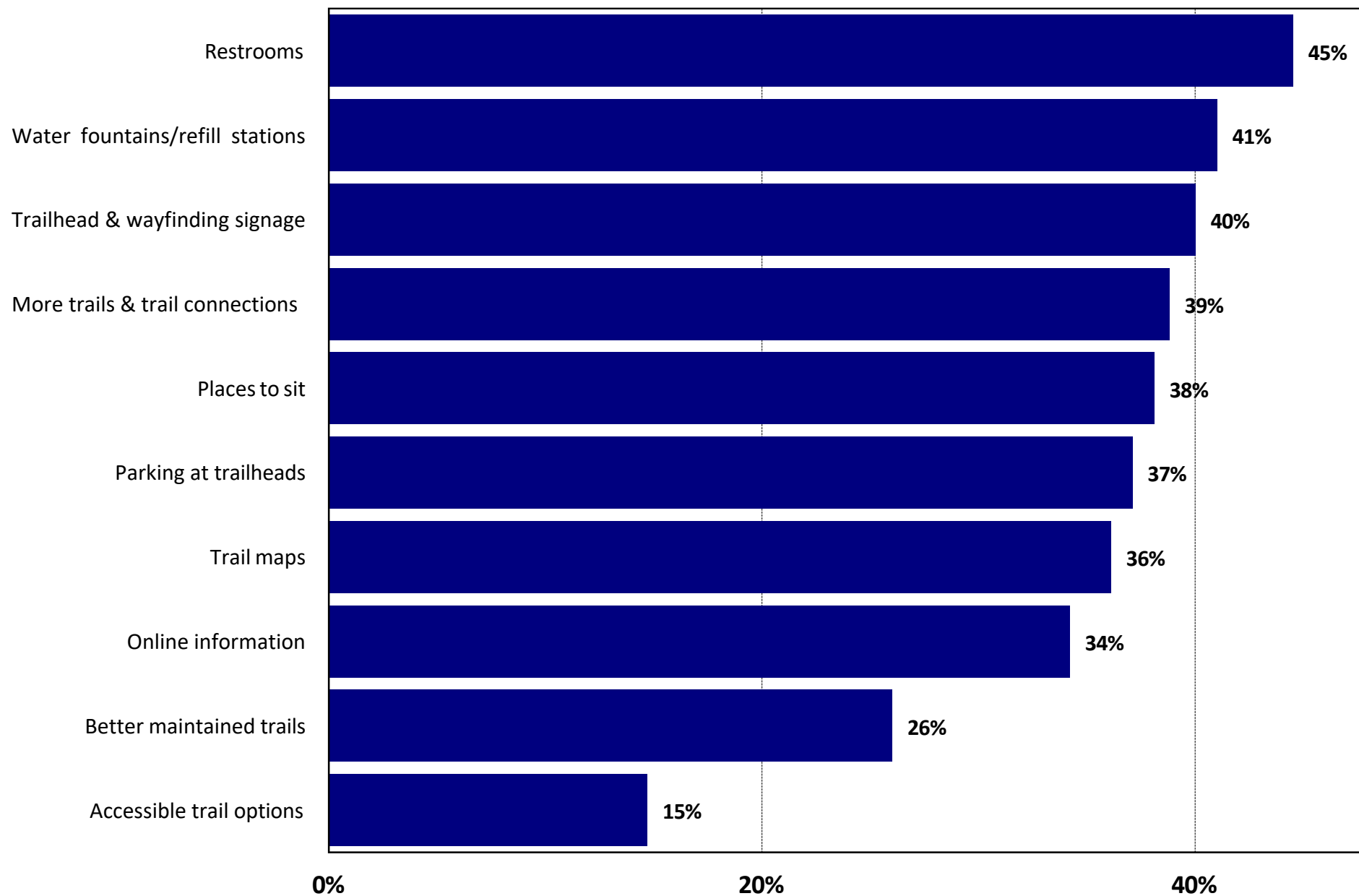
Q14. How important do you feel it is for the Town of Tiburon to provide high quality parks, recreation facilities and programs?

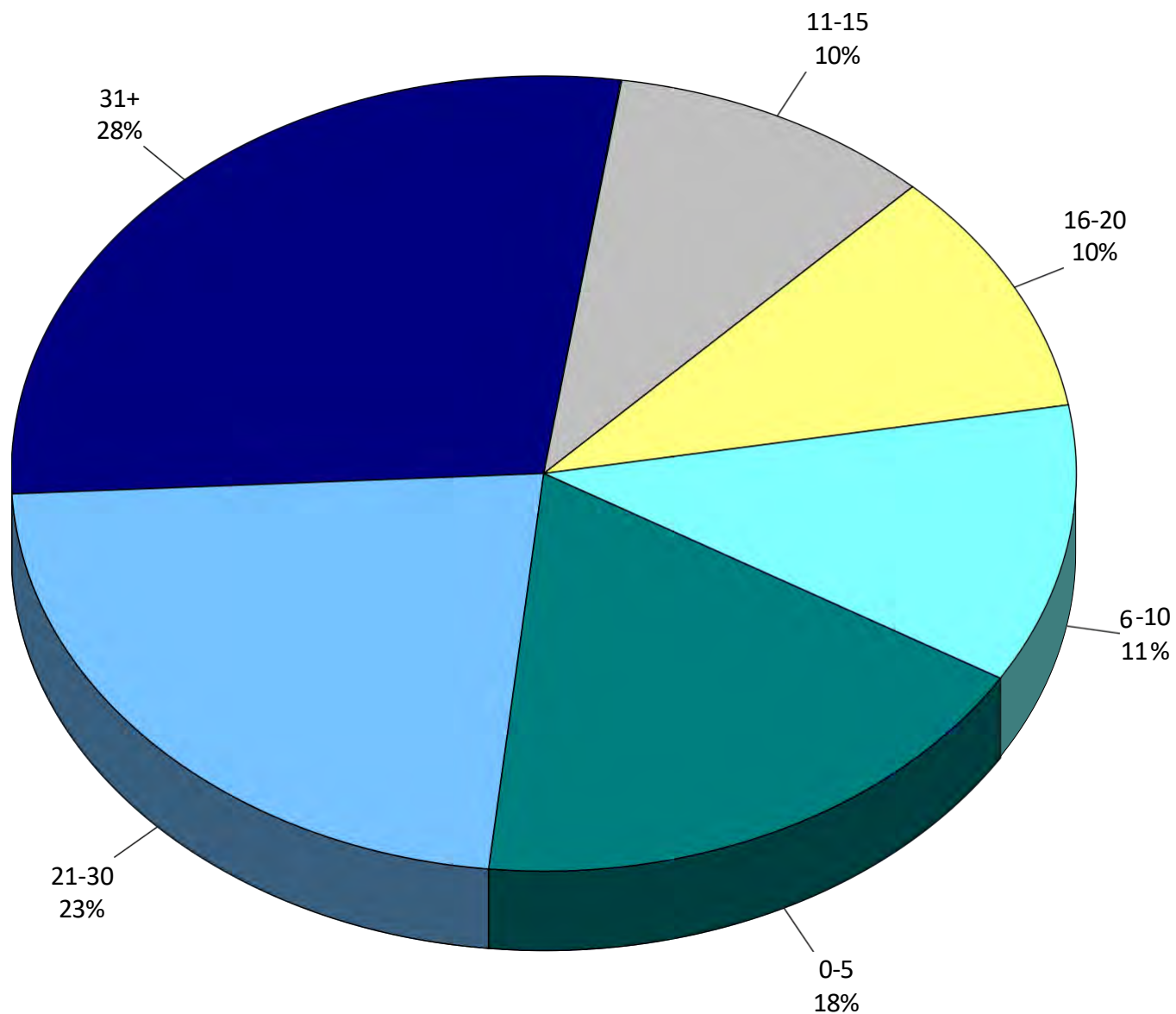
Q15. Please CHECK ALL of the potential improvements to open space that would make these more attractive for you to use.

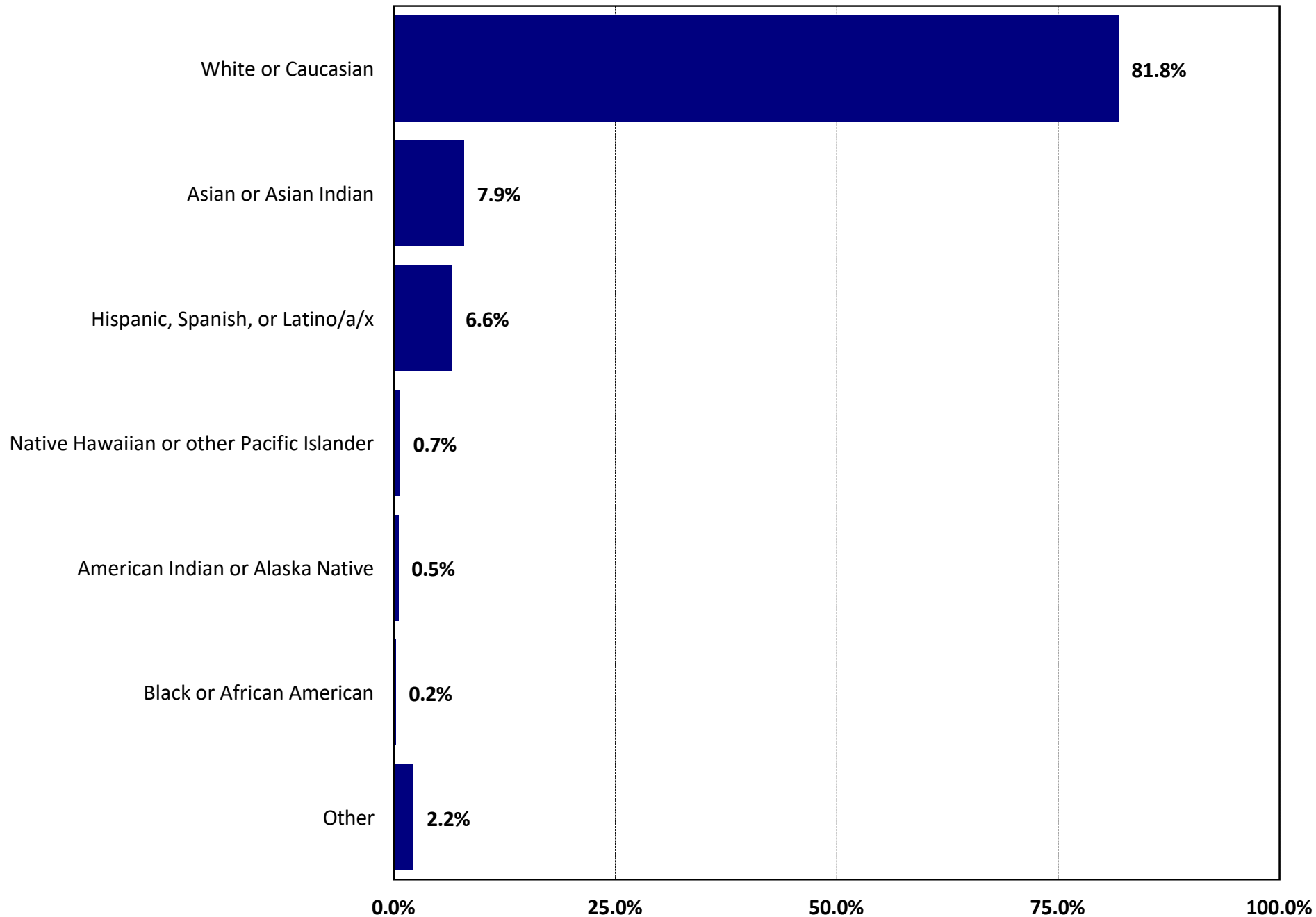
Q16. How many years have you lived in the Town of Tiburon?

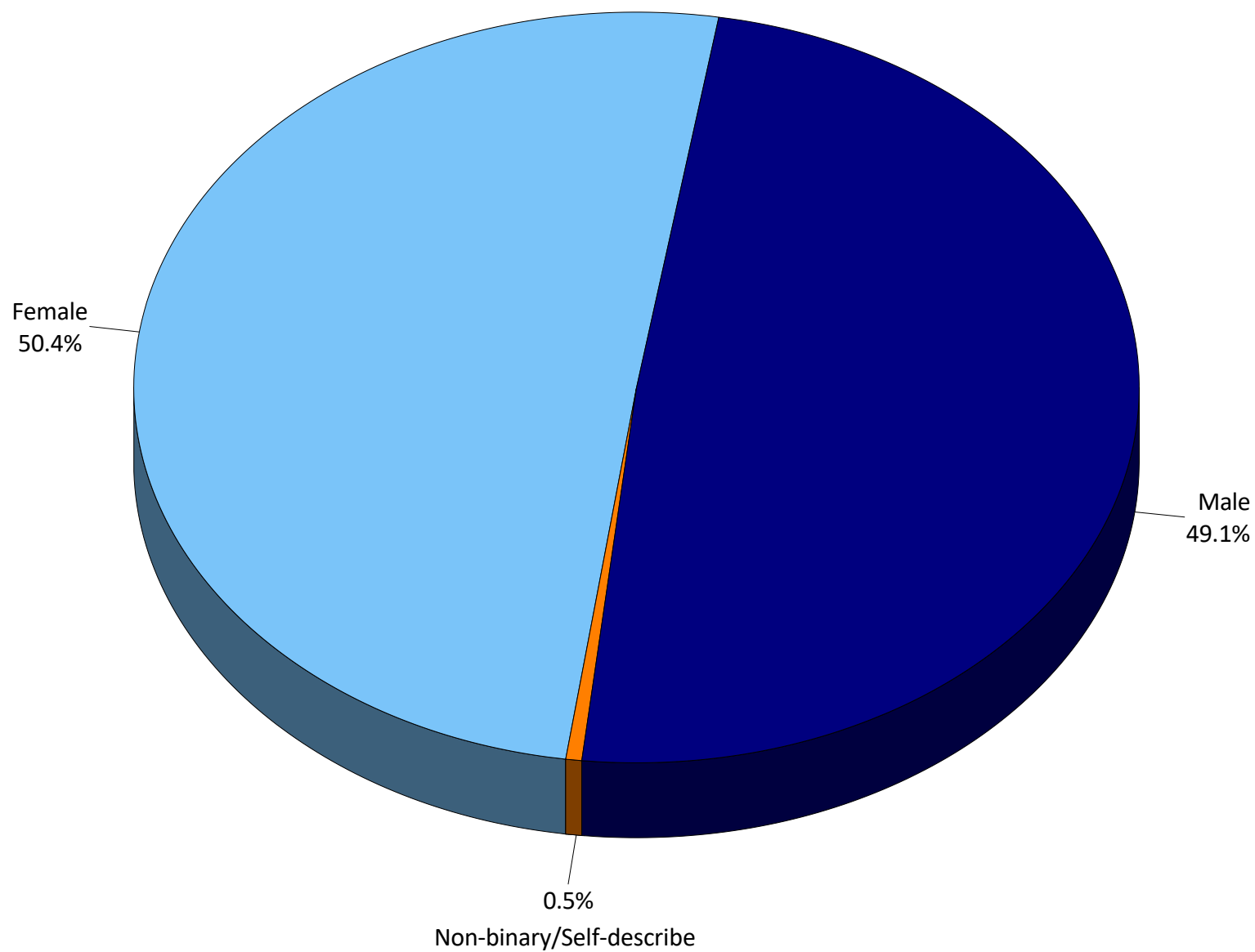
Q17. Which of the following best describes your race?

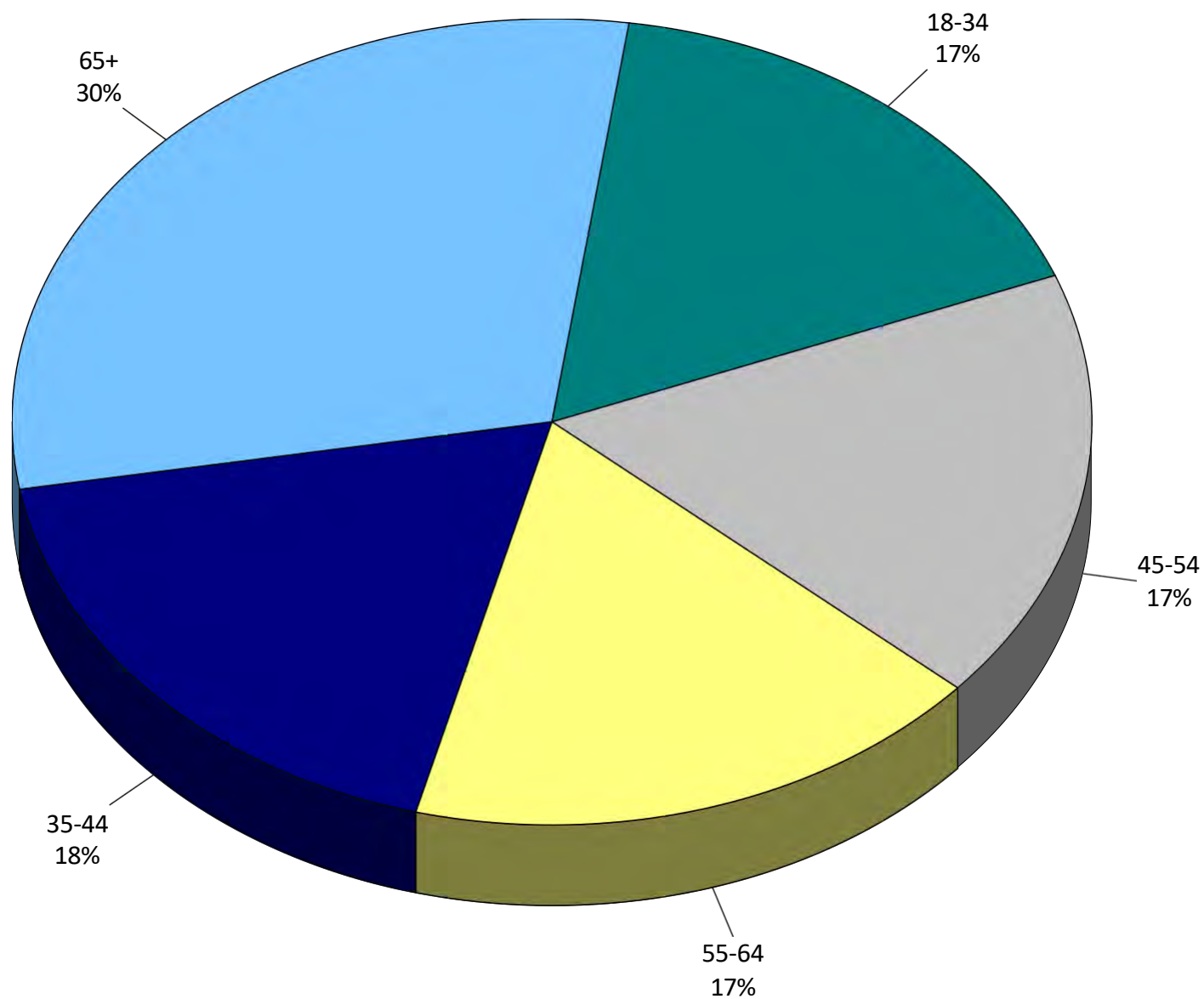

Priority Investment Rating

The **Priority Investment Rating (PIR)** was developed by ETC Institute to provide governments with an objective tool for evaluating the priority that should be placed on parks and recreation investments. The Priority Investment Rating was developed by ETC Institute to identify the facilities and programs residents think should receive the highest priority for investment. The priority investment rating reflects the importance residents place on items (sum of top 4 choices) and the unmet needs (needs that are not met or only partly met) for each facility/program relative to the facility/program that rated the highest overall. Since decisions related to future investments should consider both the level of unmet need and the importance of facilities and programs, the PIR weights each of these components equally.

The PIR reflects the sum of the Unmet Needs Rating and the Importance Rating as shown in the equation below:

$$\text{PIR} = \text{UNR} + \text{IR}$$

For example, if the Unmet Needs Rating for Community Gardens were 98.9 (out of 100) and the Importance Rating for Community Gardens were 21.6 (out of 100), the Priority Investment Rating for Community Gardens would be 120.5 (out of 200).

How to Analyze the Charts:

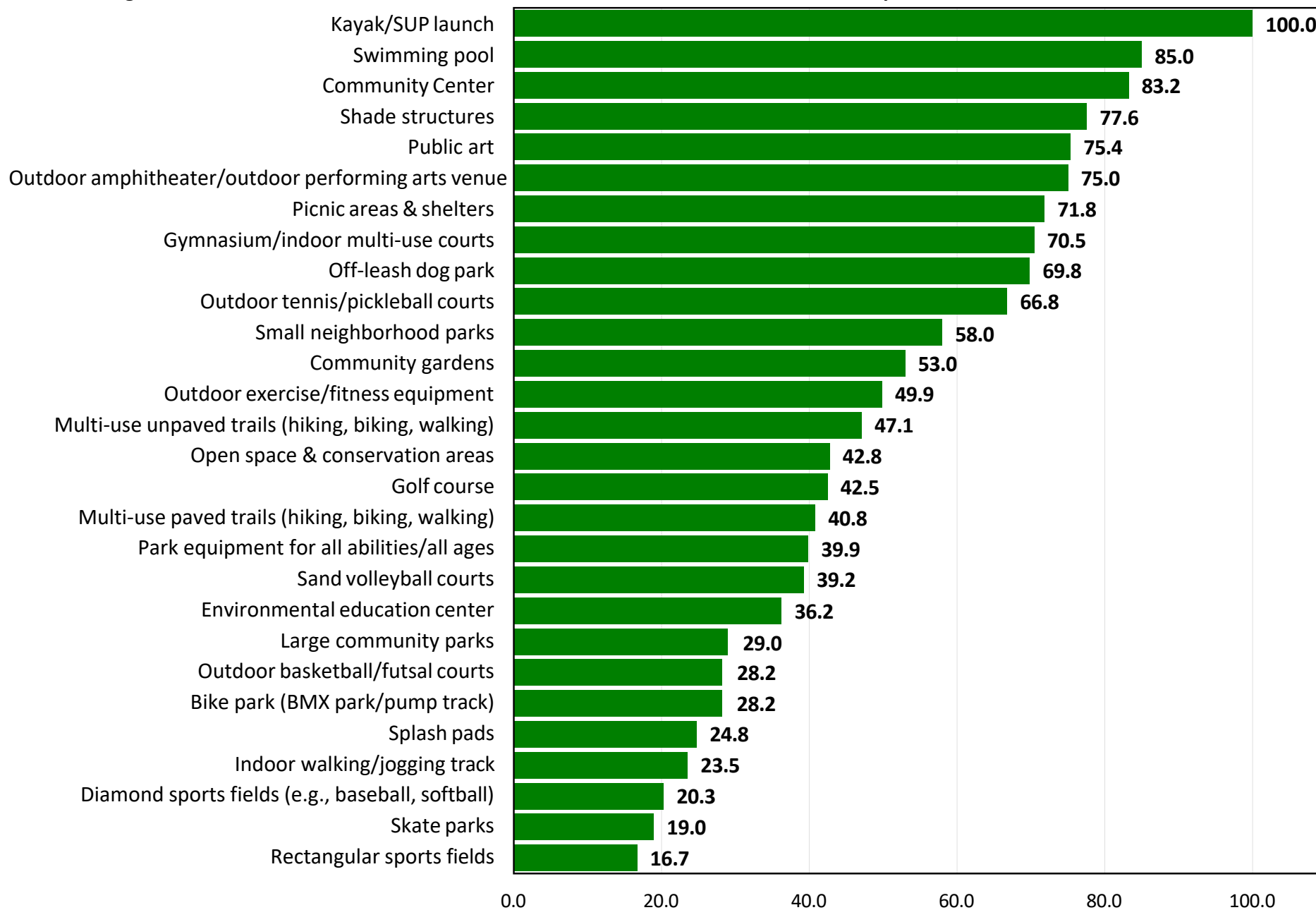
- **High Priority Areas** are those with a PIR of at least 100. A rating of 100 or above generally indicates there is a relatively high level of unmet need and residents generally think it is important to fund improvements in these areas. Improvements in this area are likely to have a positive impact on the greatest number of households.
- **Medium Priority Areas** are those with a PIR of 50-99. A rating in this range generally indicates there is a medium to high level of unmet need or a significant percentage of residents generally think it is important to fund improvements in these areas.
- **Low Priority Areas** are those with a PIR below 50. A rating in this range generally indicates there is a relatively low level of unmet need and residents do not think it is important to fund improvements in these areas. Improvements may be warranted if the needs of very specialized populations are being targeted.

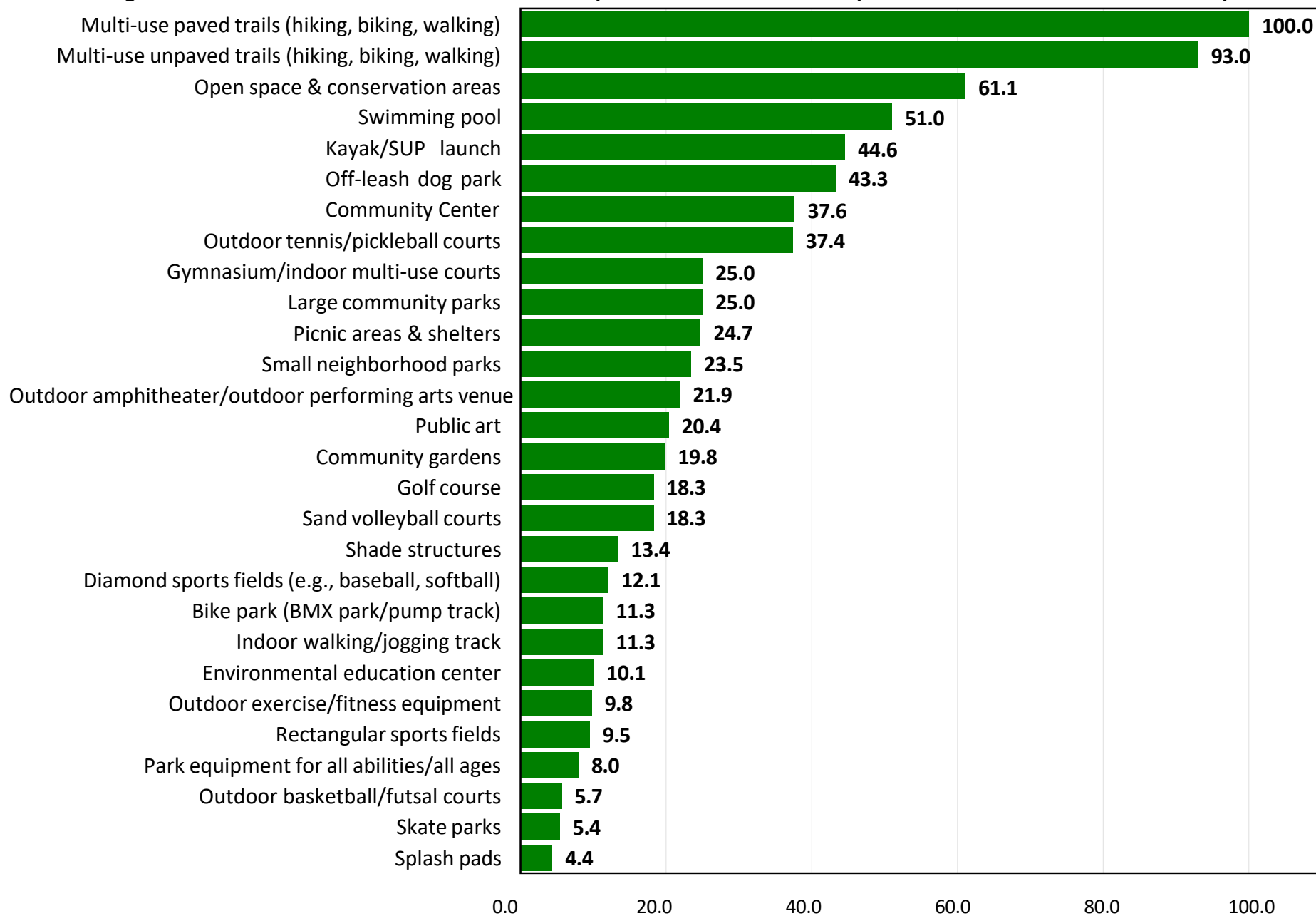

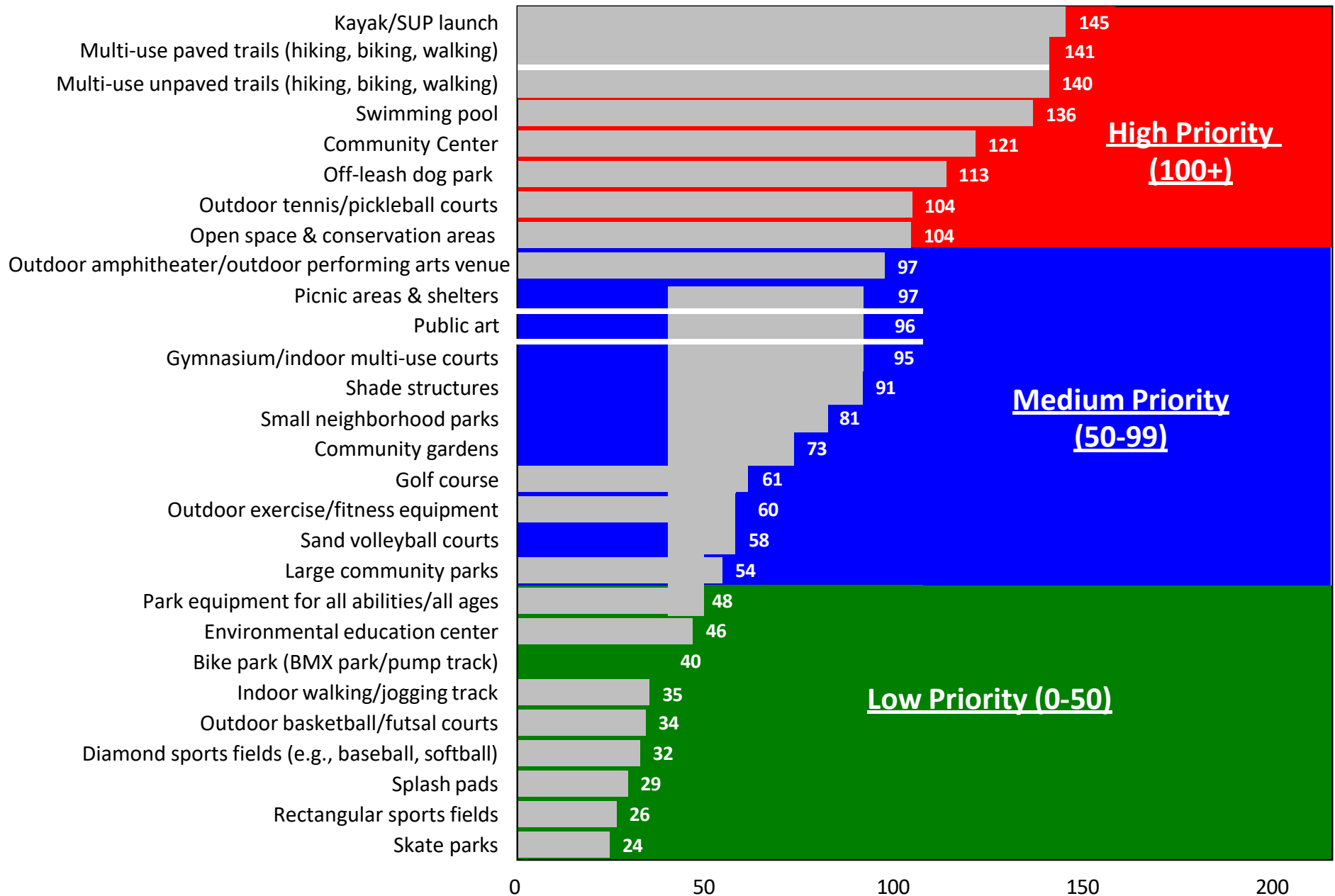
Importance Rating for Facilities/Amenities

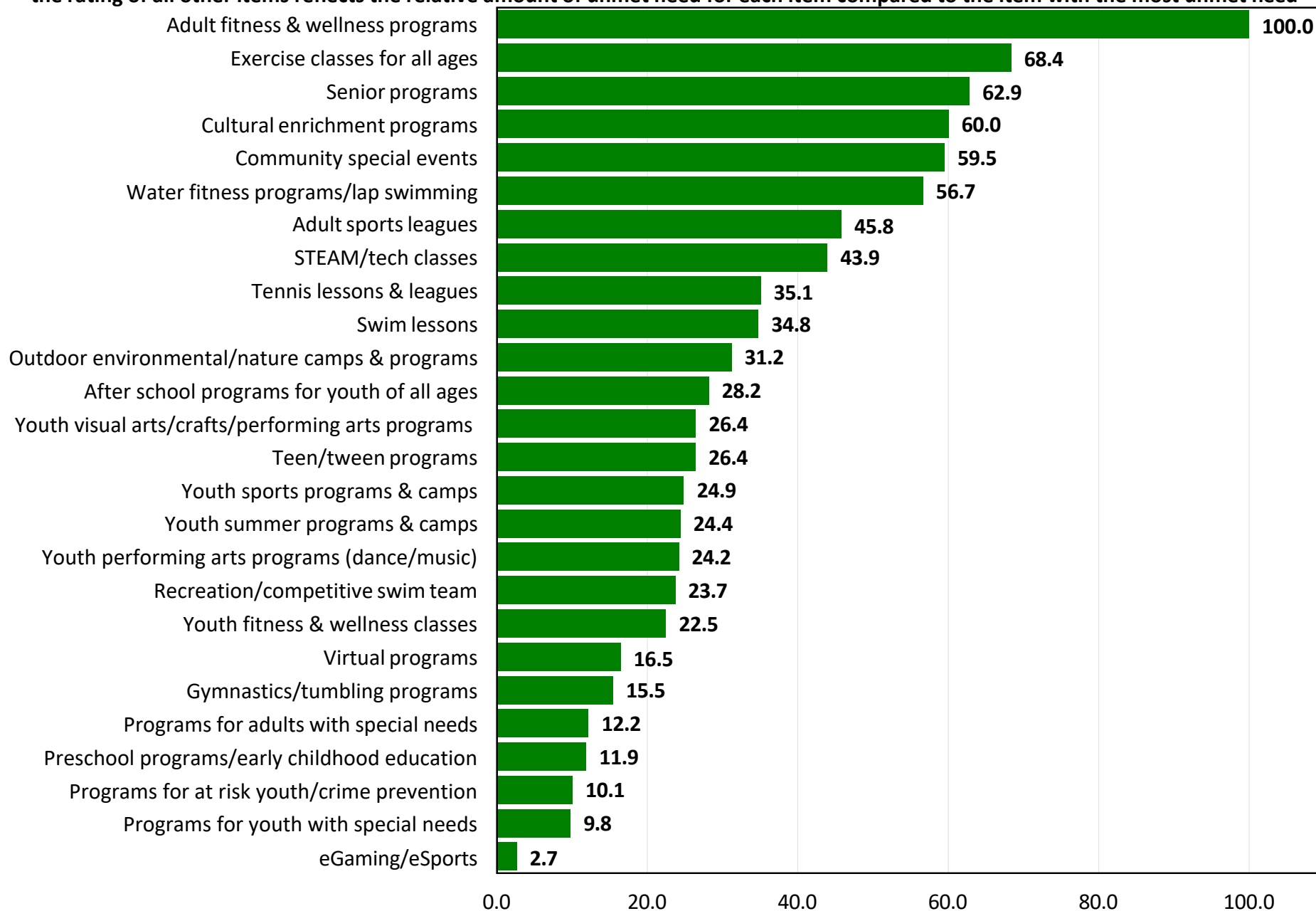
Top Priorities for Investment for Facilities/Amenities Based on Priority Investment Rating

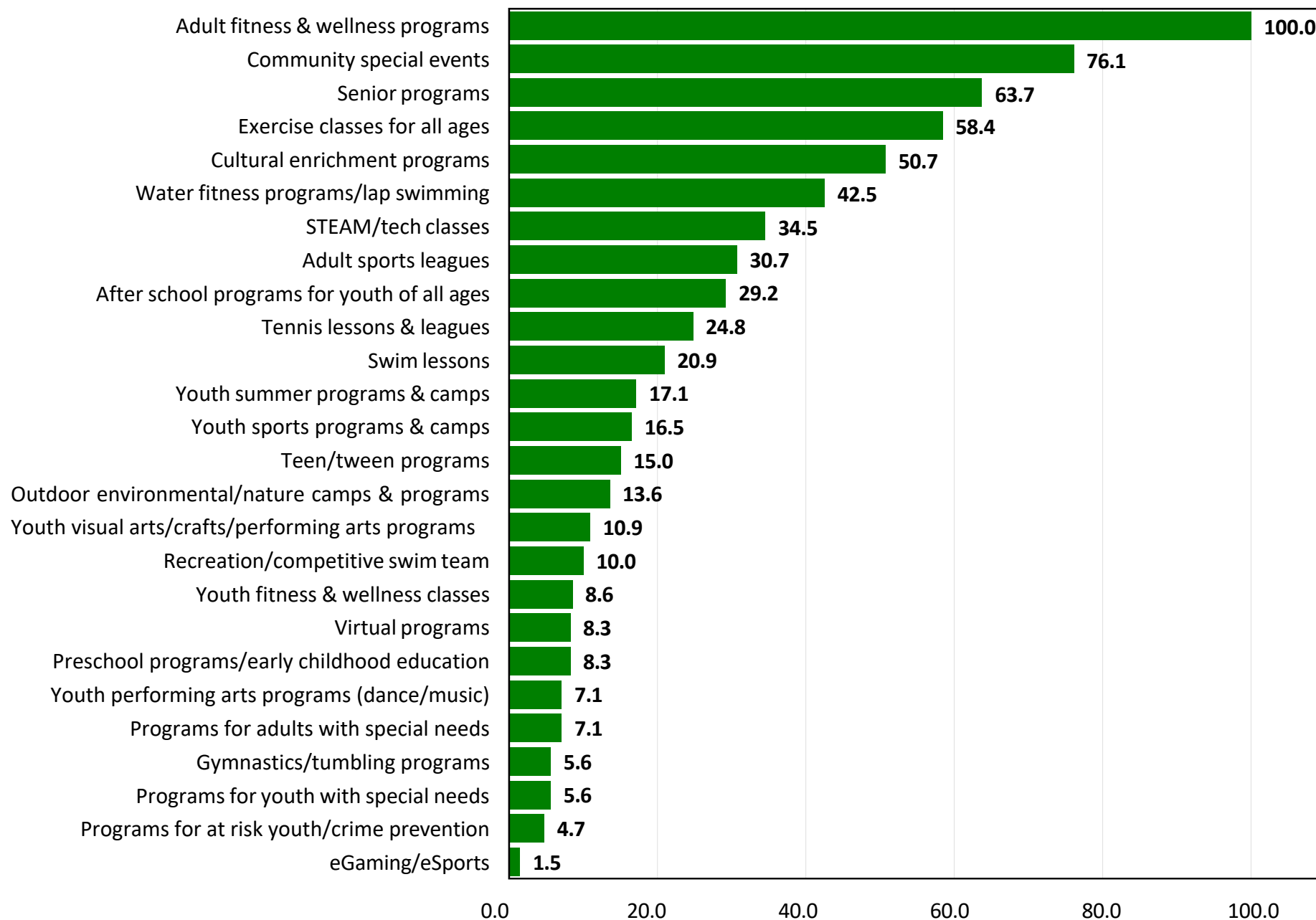

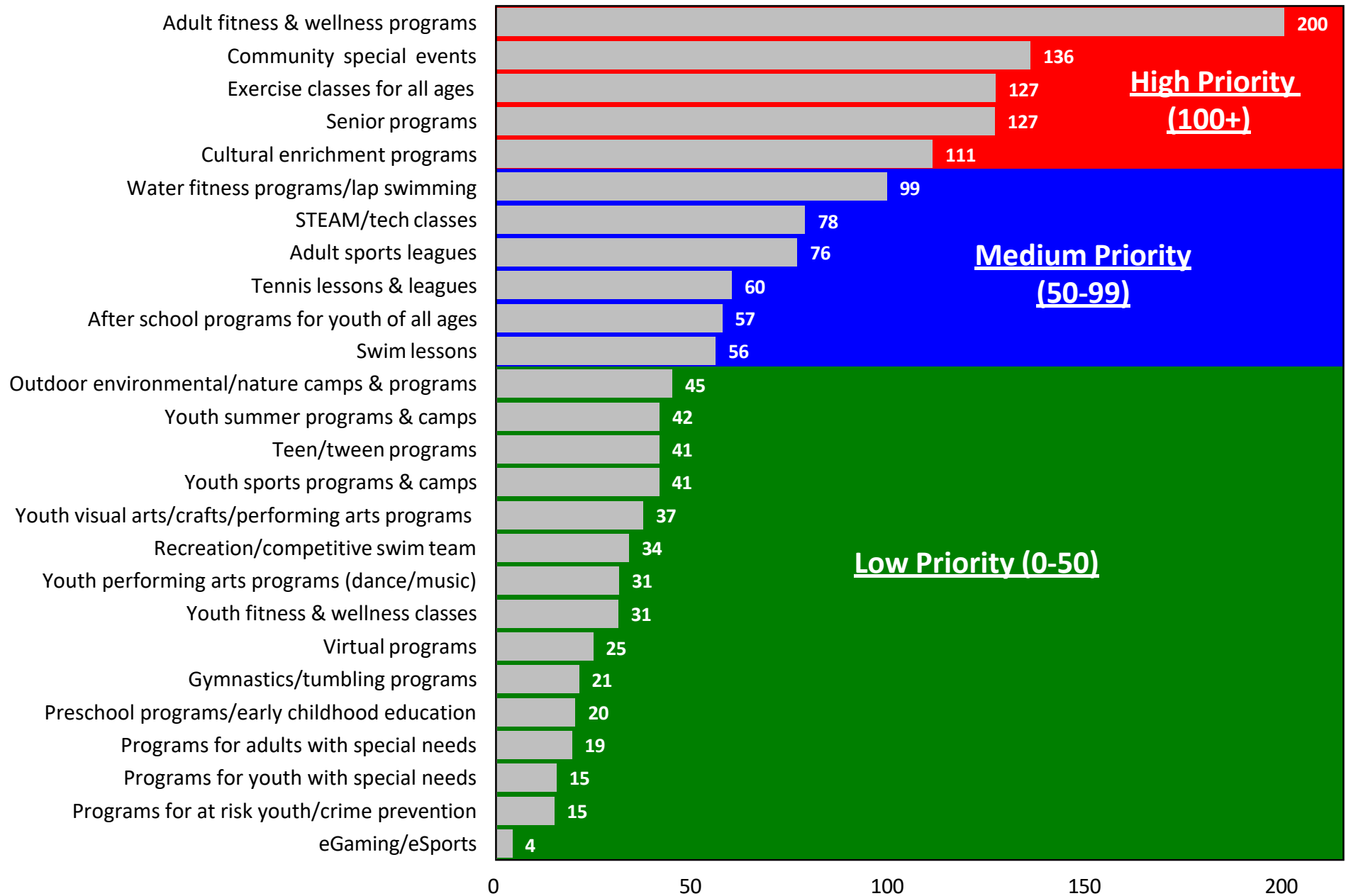
Importance Rating for Programs/Activities

Top Priorities for Investment for Programs/Activities Based on Priority Investment Rating





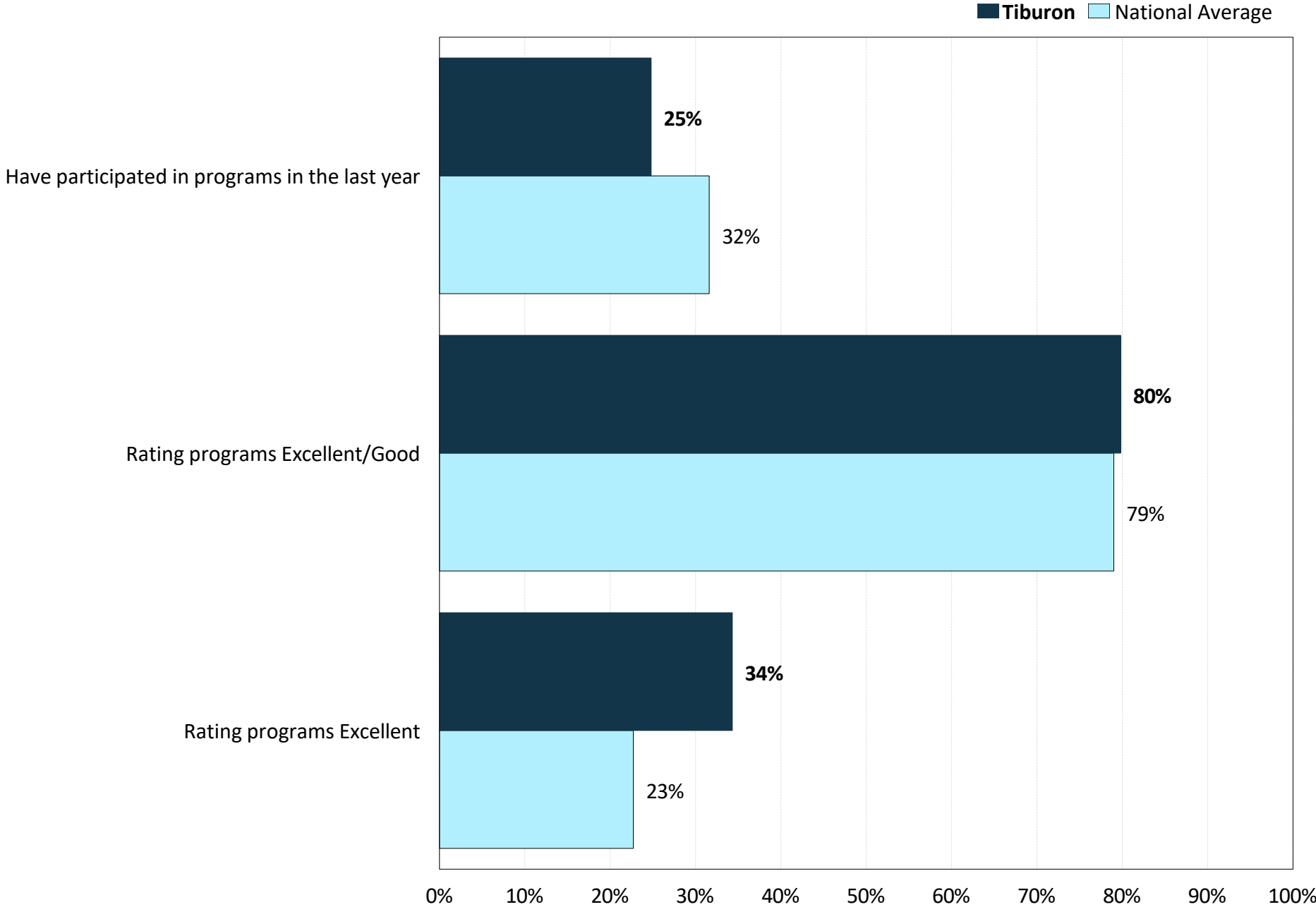

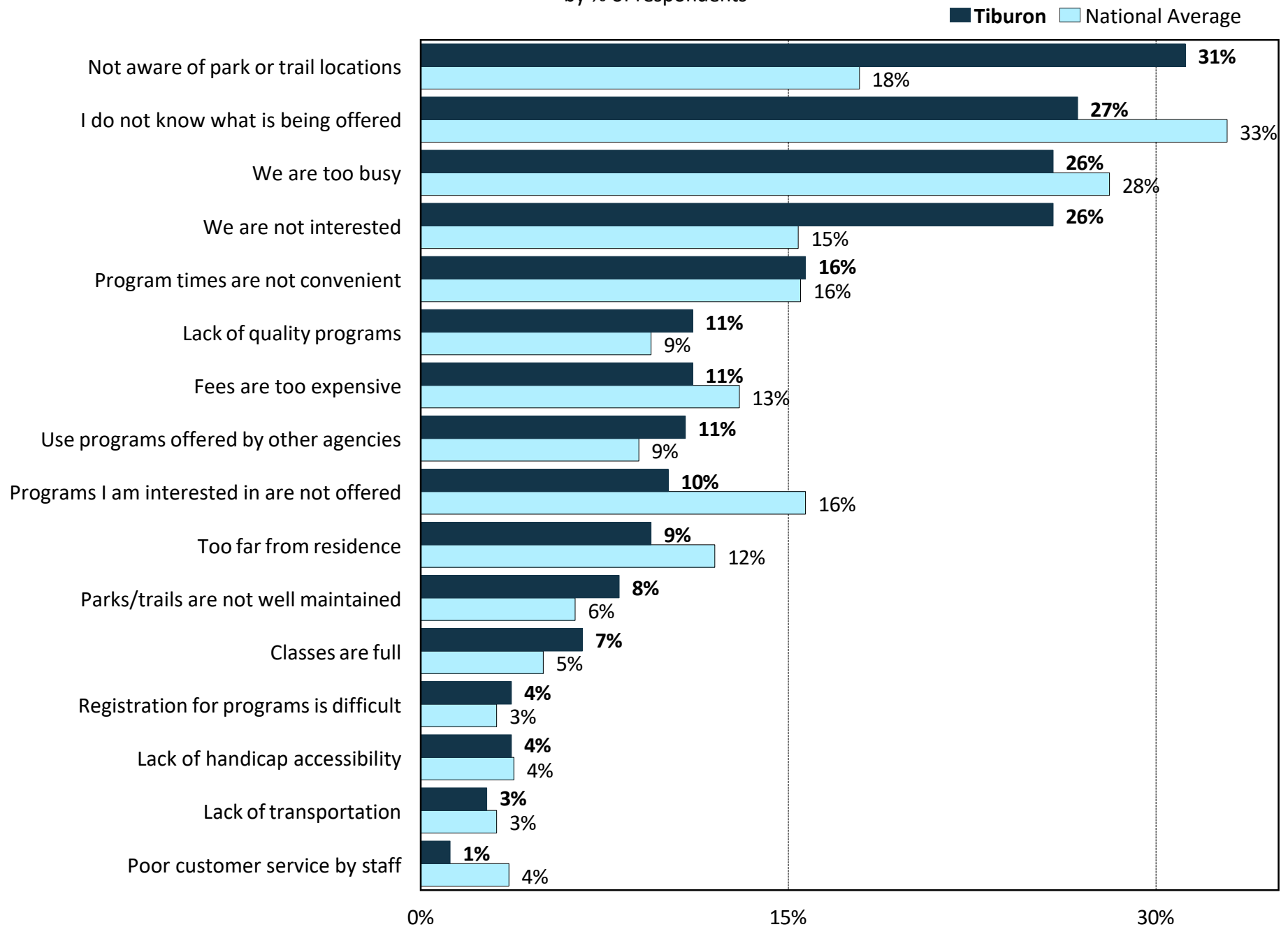
Use of Recreation Programs

by percentage of respondents



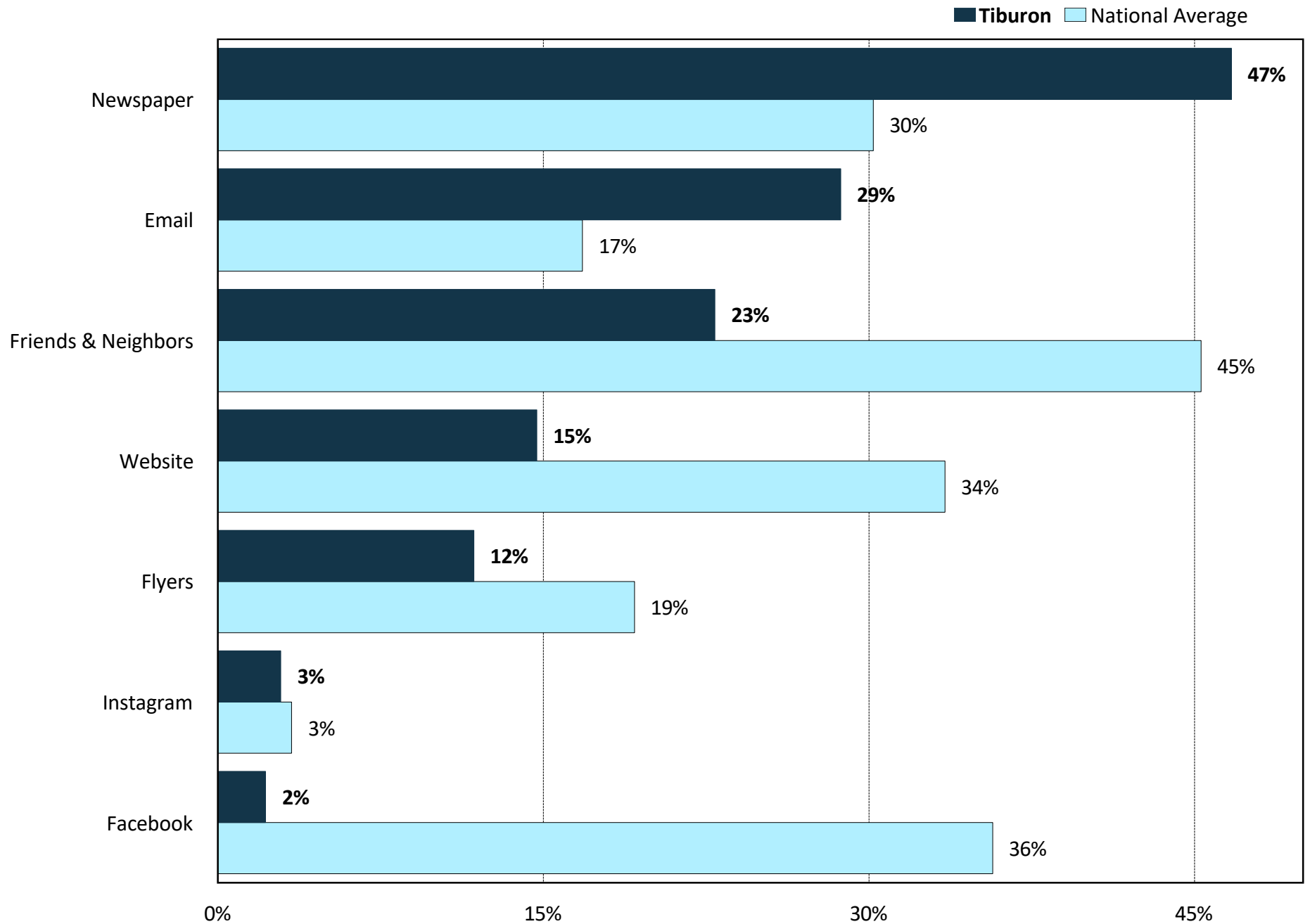
Barriers to Parks and Recreation Use

by % of respondents



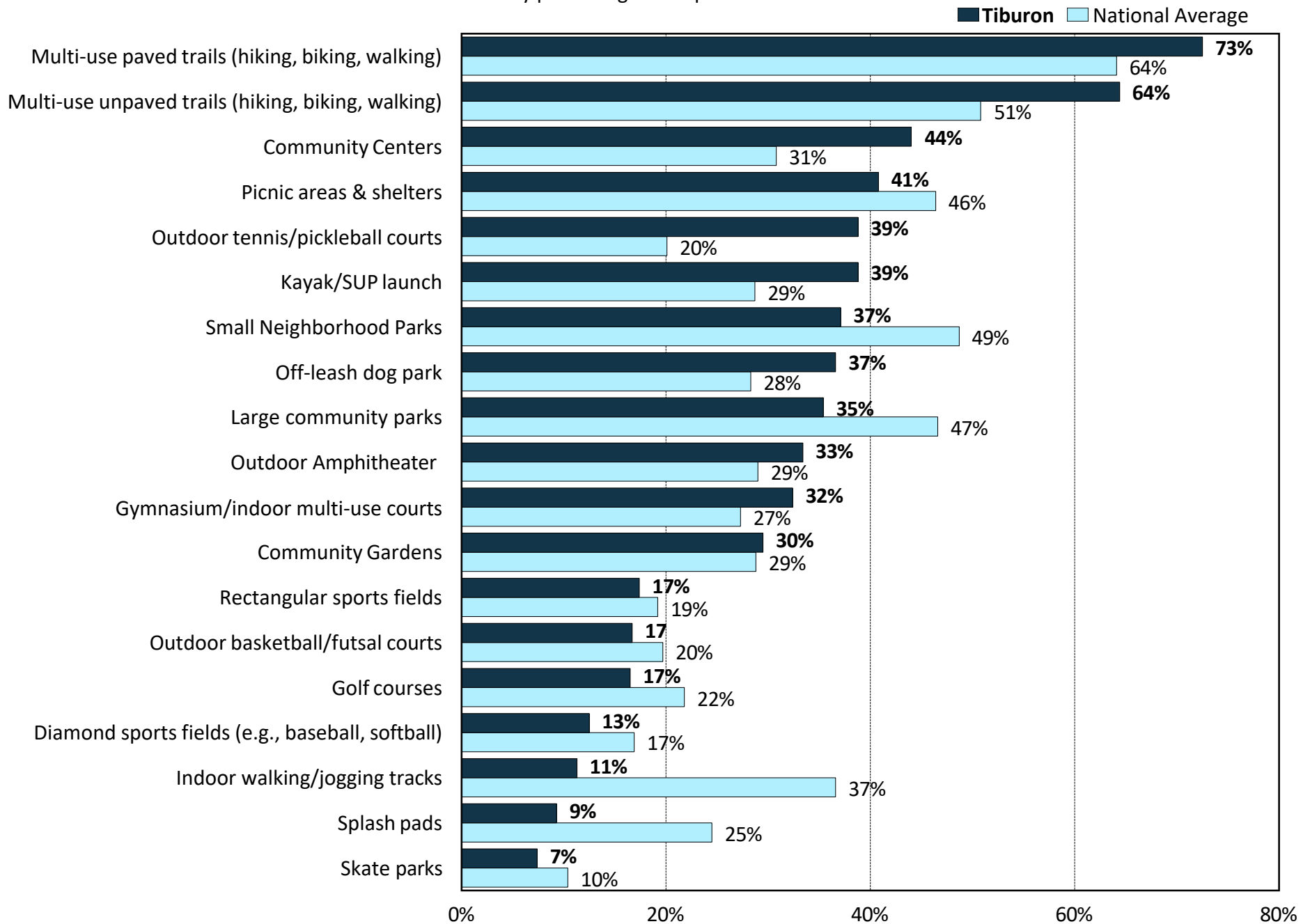

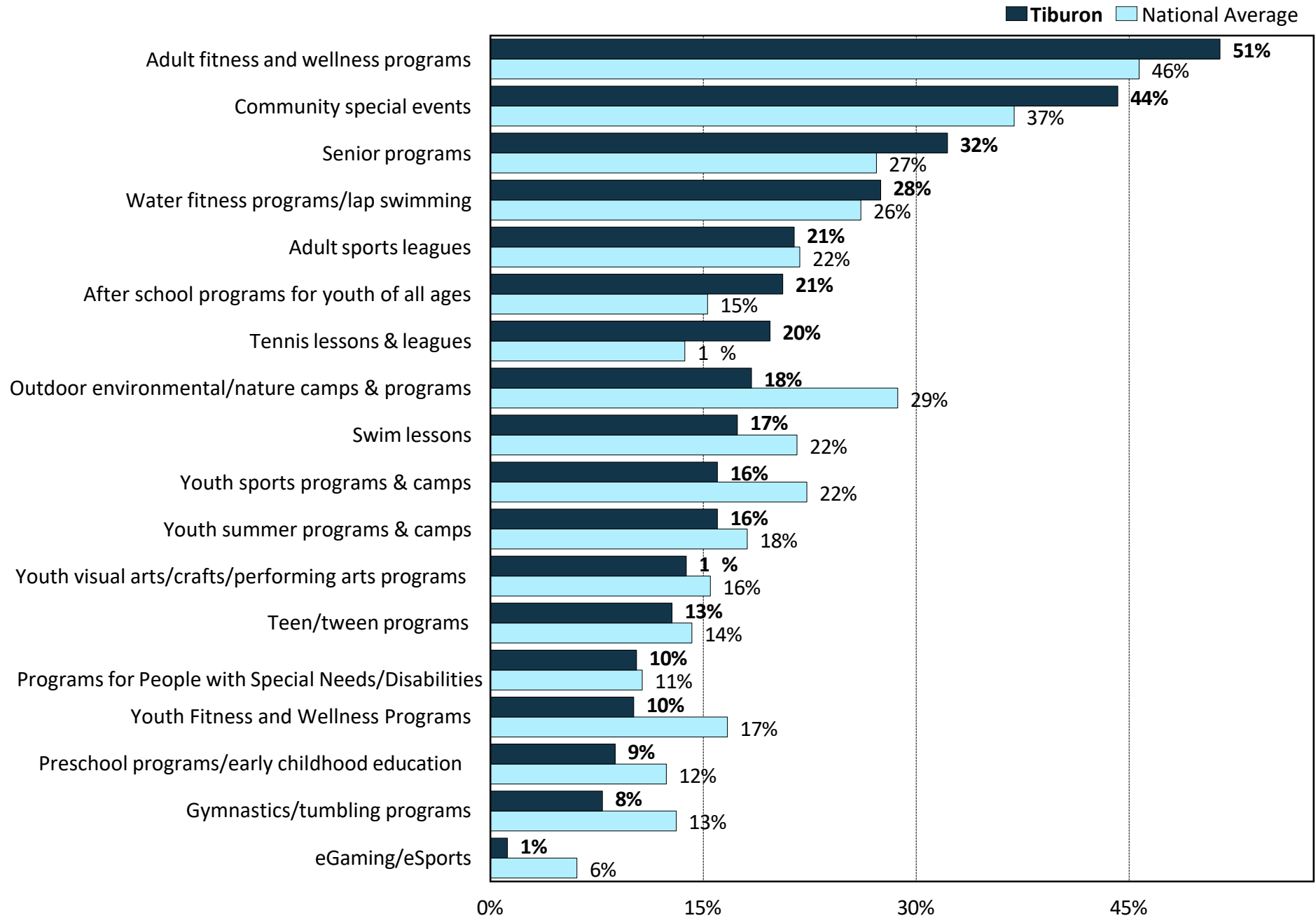

by percentage of respondents



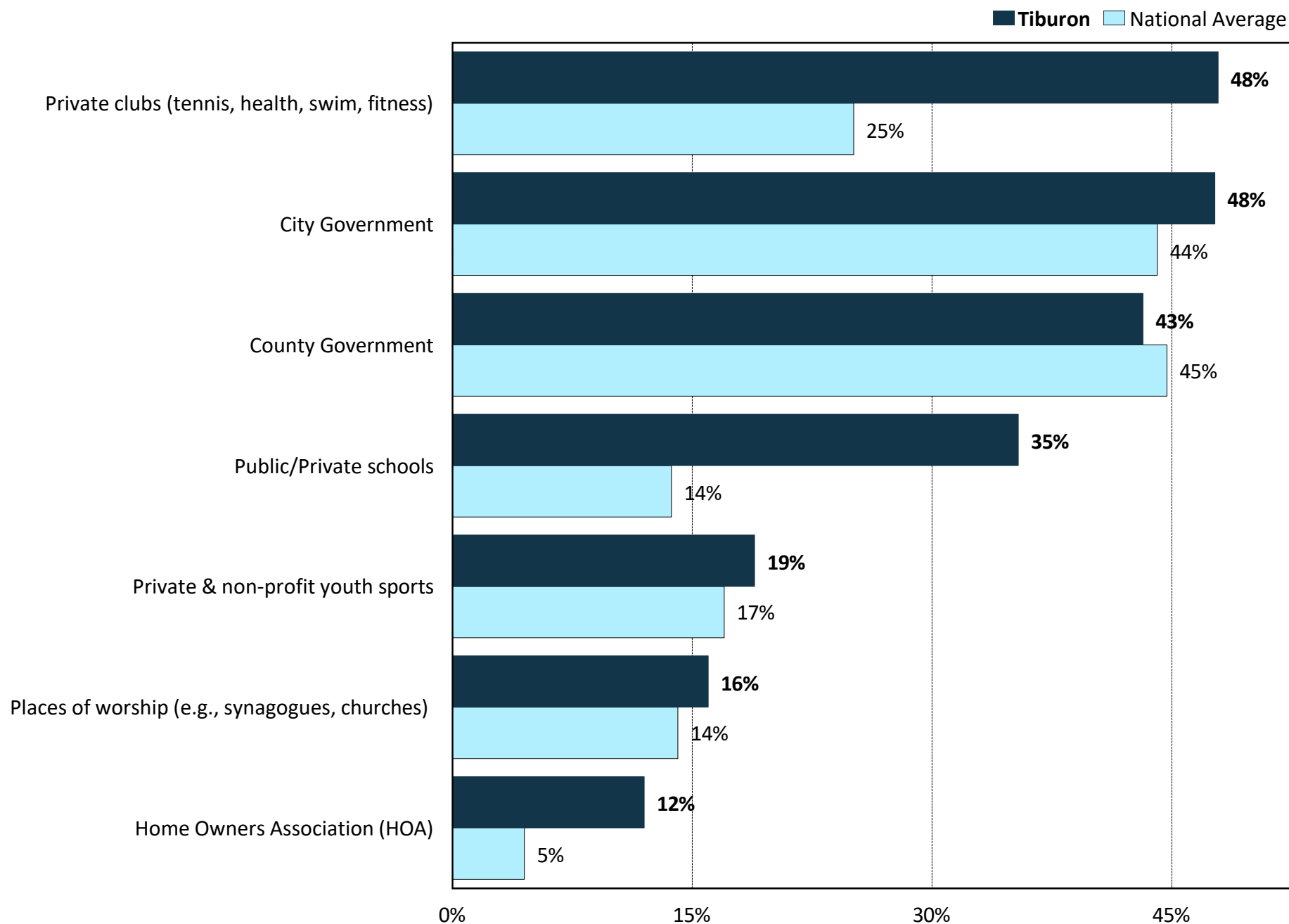
Respondents with Need for Recreation Programs

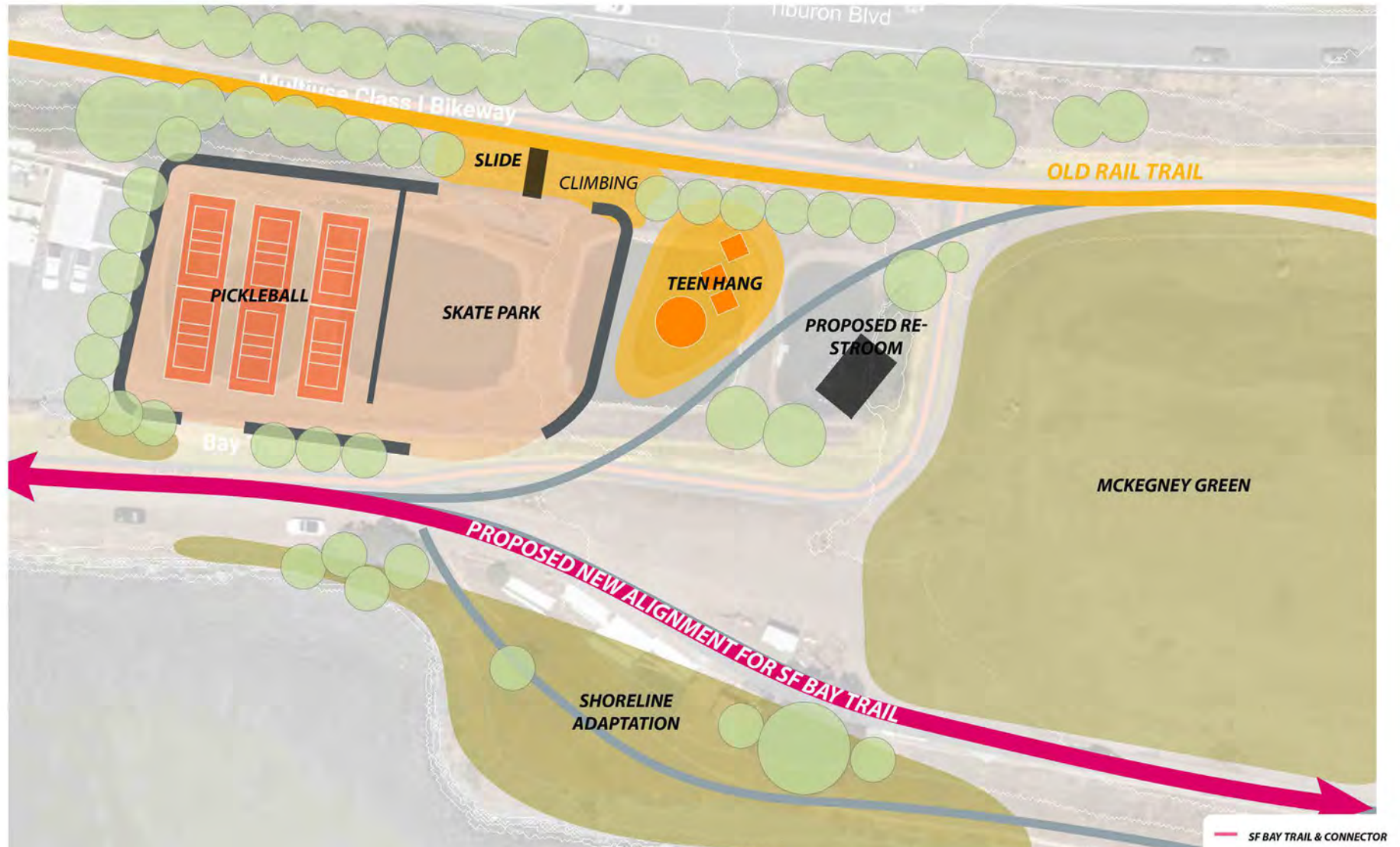

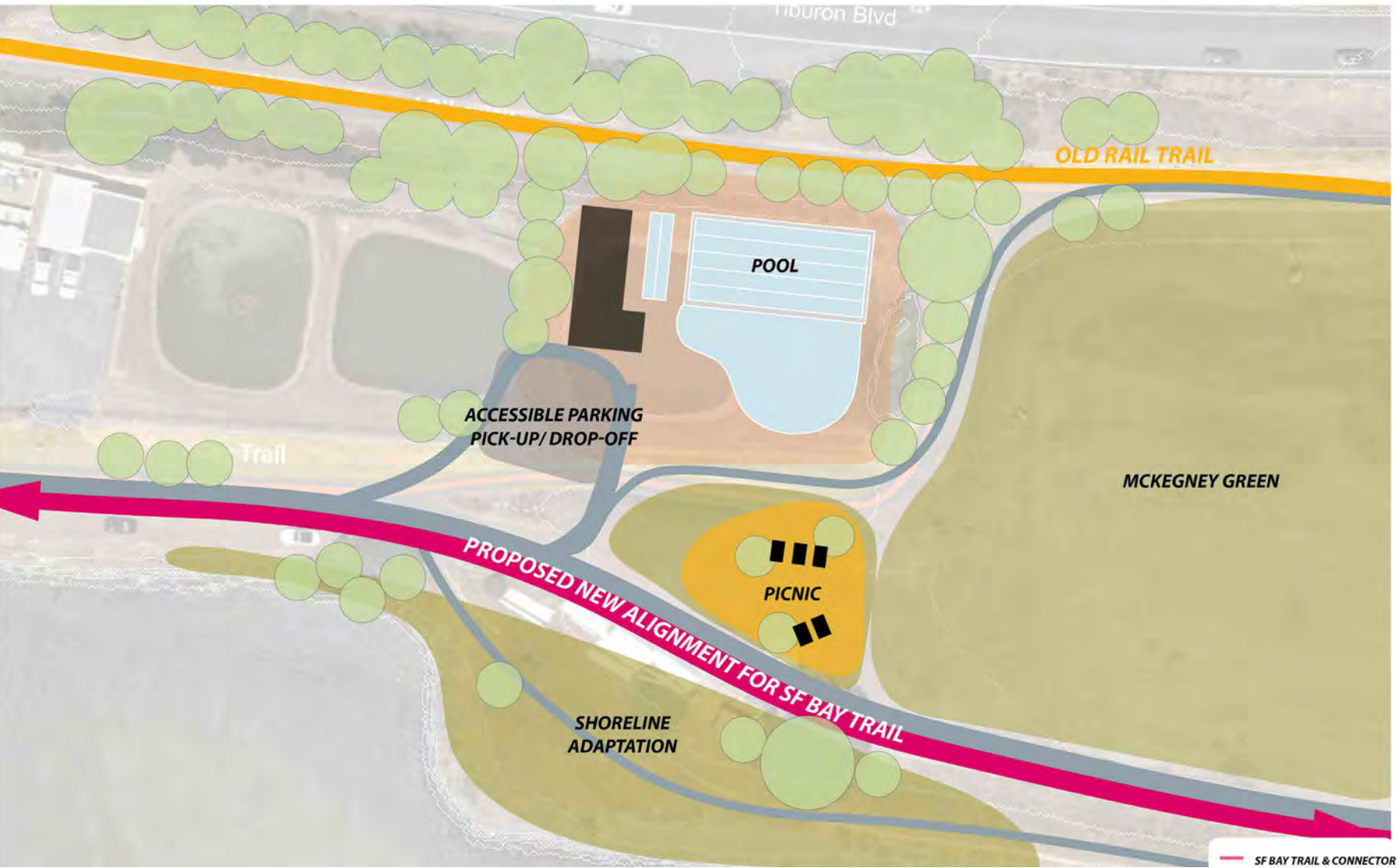
