A WORD FROM THE TOWN MANAGER



School Bus Subsidies - Update

Several months ago, you were probably aware of the push to get more Reed Union School District students using school buses, all with the goal of easing traffic congestion on Tiburon Boulevard. It was dubbed the Yellow Bus Challenge, and it was, by all reckoning, a somewhat hurried but bold effort to address traffic

woes before the start of the new school year. The premise was that deeply discounted (half-off) passes, coupled with additional bus route opportunities, might result in sufficient new riders to make a meaningful dent in traffic. Because the Town and Belvedere were proposing to subsidize this experiment, it was necessary to establish a minimum number of new bus riders to justify the expense of lowering everyone's pass price.

We fell short of our goal to eliminate 360 one-way car trips from the Boulevard, so the program was scrubbed and normal bus service resumed at regular prices for this school year. Despite that setback, we learned a lot and came away determined to regroup and try again for the next school year commencing in the fall of 2015.

That planning effort is now underway with an expanded School Bus Committee comprised of Tiburon, Belvedere and Reed Union School District participants. Once again the idea is to reduce the number of kids being driven to school by getting them onto buses. The committee is developing a survey of parents and working with a transportation expert on bus routing to explore ways to optimize bus ridership from almost all neighborhoods without kids having to spend too much time on the bus or at too high a price point. I anticipate that, come January 2015, the School Bus Committee will be in a position to discuss and recommend options for action. Stay tuned for more information on this, and, if you are a RUSD parent, please look for an email survey coming your way in the next two months and please respond when you receive it. Solid information will help us plan for success. And if we succeed in reducing traffic, the

What about...Seasonal Rentals?



We've heard a lot lately about "seasonal rentals", the situation where someone rents out his or her home to others on a daily or weekly basis. The popularity and easy use of websites like Airbnb and VRBO have increased the number

and frequency of seasonal rentals. What you may not know is that in Tiburon an owner must first obtain a Seasonal Rental Unit Permit before renting out his or her home on a repeat basis for any period less than 31 consecutive days. In addition to a \$100 permit fee and a \$50 annual renewal fee, the party renting out the space must obtain a business license for a seasonal rental and pay a 10% transient occupancy tax (TOT) on seasonal rental income.

The Town regulates seasonal rentals because they have the potential to create real problems for permanent residents in the surrounding neighborhood. These short-term rentals, especially of larger or underparked homes, often result in noisy parties, overflow parking on the streets and excess trash left out on the curb. Residents have also raised concerns about the frequent turnover of guests at these rentals, both in terms of security and how these uses impact the character of their neighborhood. The permit process allows for approval of seasonal rental units, but only under circumstances where the Town believes such uses will not have an adverse impact on neighborhoods.

If you are currently operating a seasonal rental unit or wish to do so in the future, please contact the Planning Division at Tiburon Town Hall and we will assist you with the permit process. Failure to obtain required permits will likely result in daily fines and other possible enforcement actions. If you wish to complain about a neighbor operating an unauthorized seasonal rental, or a permitted one that is causing problems, you may also contact the Planning Division at 435-7390 and we will take steps to bring the rental into compliance with Town regulations.

Richardson Bay Closed for Fall Migration

Richardson Bay Audubon Center & Sanctuary waters closed to motorized and human-powered boats on October 1.

The annual closure from October 1 through March 31 protects important migrating bird species that use the Bay for over-wintering. The waters are closed to all boat traffic and in-water activities (including kayaks & paddleboards).

The closure is mandated by an ordinance of the Marin County's Richardson Bay Regional Agency. Violators may be fined by the Marin County Sheriff's Department.

Area of Closure



Approximately 900 acres of Bay waters are covered by the ordinance, extending south from the edge of the Cove housing complex to the tip of Strawberry Point, east to Belvedere and north to Blackie's Pasture. Audubon manages this area as a wildlife sanctuary, focused on the waterbirds using the Bay.

The Sanctuary boundaries are designated by buoys and three permanent, marked pilings (black triangles on map above).

No boats or watercraft--including non-motorized boats such as kayaks, canoes, paddleboards and sailboats--are allowed within the Sanctuary waters during this critical season for migratory birds.

About Richardson Bay Audubon Center & Sanctuary

The Richardson Bay Audubon Center and Sanctuary is located on Greenwood Beach Road. Primarily a sanctuary providing habitat for migratory waterbirds and other wildlife, it also engages the community through conservation, restoration and education.

To celebrate the waterbirds of San Francisco Bay, the Center will be holding its 2nd Annual Waterbird Festival on January 31, 2015. There will be field trips, speakers and exhibits, many of which are free to the public. More information is available at the Center's [website](#).

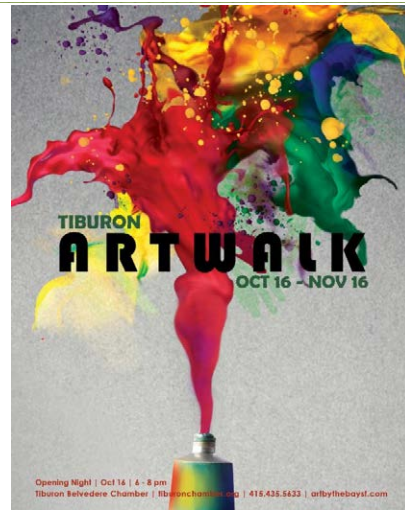

Here is a more complete list of materials you will need to make a journal as an altered book or a book art project:

White gesso (Gesso is a thick, water-base paint commonly formed of plaster and glue. It has a creamy, chalky consistency and is used to create a white foundation for our artwork); paint brush; exacto or craft knife and blades; ruler; pencil; scissors; water; paper towels or old rags; medium sand paper or sanding sponge (if you need to roughen the cover); craft glue; printed images of your own choice (5"x7" works best to cover the writing in the pages).

Latin American Art Lecture at Library

Latin American Contemporary Artists

Joan Palmero, well-known Town staff member and liaison to the Heritage & Arts Commission, will give another in a series of presentations on Latin American Artists on November 18 at the Library.

This presentation includes artists **Alfredo Ramos Martinez**, father of Mexican modernism, and **Rodolfo Morales**, earliest Mexican proponent of magic realism.

Joan is a Belvedere native and art devotee. Her many years spent in Mexico are the basis for her love and excitement about the art of Latin America. She loves to share this excitement with others. Here's what she says about the featured artists:

"What is 'Magic Realism'? Characterized as 'a sense of mystery juxtaposed with the normalcy of everyday objects', **Rodolfo Morales** has created a world where cathedrals are borne through the air by women of the town, where brides are surrounded by masses of flowers and veils of lace but the grooms are rarely visible, and where rows of people, shoulder to shoulder, compose the architecture of the buildings and walls.

Why might Morales have painted thus? Come find out!

Alfredo Ramos Martinez, Father of Mexican Modernism's closest friend, Poet Ruben Dario, is quoted as saying 'Ramos Martinez is one of those who paints poems. He does not copy, he interprets...'. We will examine the artist's wide range of painting techniques and learn why it is that he - not Diego Rivera - is considered to be the Father of Mexican Modernism.

A luscious, compelling palette of colors and innovative techniques await your review as we examine perhaps the first portraits to focus on Mexico's indigenous people."
